Ottawa, Sept. 6.—The rumor that Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Everything Nearing Readi Liberal leader, will abandon North York and run in some other seat at the coming general election, has brought forth a statement from Mr. King himself. "It is a natural thing to expect all kinds of rumors on the eve of general elections," said Mr. King this morning. "As to where or how this particular rumor originated, am completely in the dark. I am completely in the dark. No doubt, if the rumor could be traced to its source, it would be found that the "wish is father to the thought.' Certainly I have made no such intimation to anyone, nor do I imagine that anything of the kind has been suggested by the Liberals of North York."

Mr. King is opposed in North York, by J. H. Burnaby, president of the United Farmers of Ontario, who has declined to retire in the Liberal leader's favor. The sitting member is J. A. M. Armstrong, a Conservative, who will probably run again in a three-cornered fight. Mr. King was nominated on the Liberal ticket over a year ago. In past days the seat was held by Hon. William Mulock and Sir Allen Aylesworth, Liberals.

#### A BETTER UNDERSTANDING.

It will be recollected that during the recent visit to Toronto of the Hon. L. A. Taschereau, Premier of Quebec, he made an eloquent plea for a better understanding between the English and French speaking Canadians, and appealed for mutual sympathy in the scrutinizing of racial peculiarities. This plea, so earnestly put forth, has not been lost sight of, and it is gratifying to find that a resolution bearing on the matter is being presented at the meeting of the Canadian Bar Association at Ottawa today.

The resolution is as follows:

"Whereas, it is in the best interests of Canada as a whole that there should be a better understanding between the English and French speaking Canadians, and, whereas, the lawyer has in the past taken an active part in bringing about useful reforms, and in helping humanity to solve its difficult problems; therefore, be it resolved, that the Canadian Bar Association urge the members of the legal profession throughout Canada to use their influence to bring about a better understanding between the English and French speaking Can-

pressed by Premier Meighen, the Hon. L. A. Taschereau, and the Hon. E. C. Drury. Mr. Meighen expresses the opinion that "the most thorough understanding een the two races is most desirable, and that for his own part he has never lost an opportunity to further this object." We assume from this that Mr. Meighen does not approve of some of the things said by his supporters regarding the people of Quebec, as, for example, in connection with the result of the Yamaska election.

Referring to the project, the Premier of Quebec expresses most hearty approval, and Premier Drury no less enthusiastic. Mr. Drury says: "It seems me that no more useful work can be done at the moment in Canada than the attaining of better understanding and more friendly and sympathetic relations between the people of the two great races which have played the major part in the making of Canadian history. There is one thing certain, that a United Canada can only be attained by a broad spirit of tolerance and understanding and that without unity Canada cannot make true progress. Whether we like it or not, the destinies of the two peoples are closely bound together in one nation. It seems to me the only sensible thing that everything possible should be done to remove every trace of misunderstanding, and that all patriotic Canadians will work to this end.

R seems to us that if the legal profession of the United Kingdom or some other equally powerful body had used its influence years ago to bring about a better understanding between the people of England and those of Ireland there would have been more harmony between those countries today, and much bloodshed and bitter feeling would have been avoided. Had there been a better understanding between Germany and Poland the Upper Silesian problem would have been settled long ago. Woe to the stirrers-up of strife who have driven nations asunder! Woe to those who through selfishness and ambition have made people's lives pawns in the game of their aggrandizement!

There are others besides kings and princes and potentates who provoke strife for their own selfish ends, and the knitting together of the races within a nation by the ties of mutual help and sympathy is just as important as the binding together of one nation with another. The scheme of the League of Nations for the preservation of the world's peace is splendid, but there must be a league of peoples within each of the countries concerned. Therefore every move ment for the bringing about of that "better understanding" which is the prelude of peace deserves the unqualified support of every true citizen.

#### FREE TRADE.

Perhaps no more fatuous or misleading observation could be made than that which recently appeared in a contemporary to the effect that "the Agrarian party is no such thing in any civilized nation on the face of the earth as unrestricted "free trade." Every nation must raise revenue in order to carry on its business as a nation, and a tariff must be adopted for Cordial approval of this resolution has been exentirely raised by direct taxation. No nation could long survive this, and yet it is amazing how many prættle about "free trade" without in the slightest degree grasping its true significance.

To say that the agrarian party believes in free trade, but that the Liberal party does not is sheer nonsense. It is a statement made to confuse the issue by the excess of its ambiguity, and is a follow-up of the protection-vs.-free-trade red herring which Premier Meighen attempted to drag across the political trail in his London speech. The farmers believe in free trade to a certain extent where they are convinced that its operation will benefit agriculture, rightly considered the leading industry of the Dominion; but to charge them, with being in favor of unrestricted free trade is assessing their intelligence at a very low figure. The farmers know full well that if agriculture had to bear its share of the enormous burden of direct taxation which the abolition of all customs duties would involve the industry would be wiped out.

The assertion that the Liberal party does not believe in free trade is even more ridiculous and misleading. Liberals believe in free trade as a principle where ever it can be applied, but they possess sanity enough to grasp the fact that the country would go to pieces if there was no tariff for revenue purposes. One might as well say that because a man believes in the healthgiving properties of water that he would wish to be

drowned in it. Britain is, generally speaking, a free trade country, and yet she has for very many years derived a large proportion of her revenue from the duties on wines, spirits, tobacco, tea, and other commodities. Besides, free trade in its fullest sense is impossible as long as all the countries carrying on commercial relations with one another fail to adopt a reciprocal attitude. It always takes two at least to make a bargain. So it is with free trade.
