#### SEVEN HUNDRED RUSSIANS KILLED.

Che Foo, Nov. 10.-Noon.-Etse Mountain, according to Chinese, 120 of whom arrived here today from Port Arthur, is proving a costly obstacle to the Japanese. On the mornings of Nov. 5 and 6 fierce assaults on the position were made by the Japanese, who were repulsed. During the second assault, a shell soaring over the other hills from Palichuang, dropped on Etse Mountain and demolished a land mine centrolling the station, and exploded other mines.

The Russians were holding the trenches on the boundary of the mined section. Six or seven hundred were killed, the Japanese not having reached the place, were unhurt.



When Japan Lost. The treaty of Shimonoseki was signed April 17, 1895. On April 23 the Russian, French and German ministers at Tokio presented a joint note to the Japanese presented a joint note to the Japanese Government, protesting against the cession by Chira of the Liao Tung Peninsula, on the ground that as a Japanese possession it would be a constant menace to Pekin, and a danger to the independence of Korea, and hence detrimental to the general peace of the Orient.

Russia had increased her military forces in the Amur Province, and her fleet in Chinese waters numbered 22 vessels, including some of her best ironclads. Germany also prepared to strengthen her cluding some of her best ironclads. Germany also prepared to strengthen her fleet in those waters. The British Government refused to join in the menacing demands of the three powers, but advisced the Japanese Government to yield. Japan submitted the joint note to her generals and admirals, and they reported that scarcely a ship was in thorough ed that scarcely a ship was in thorough fighting trim, while the whole military organization had been put to severe strain by the recent campaigns in Korca, Manchuria, the Liao Tung Peninsula, etc. churia, the Liao Tung Peninsula, etc.
The financial resources of the administration were nearly exhausted, and it would clearly have been madness for Japan to engage under such conditions in a war with European powers. She therefore sought only a dignified means of submission, and finally, after much negotiations, an arrangement was reached and a protocol signed at Pekin early in and a protocol signed at Pekin early in November. Japan accepted 30,000,000 taels as extra indemnity, and agreed to evacuate Port Arthur and the Liao Tung Peninsula. while China is said to have covenanted not to cede any part of the latter to any foreign power. Here in London you have the twentieth century, but in Kavirondo it is only the day after the creation, with the difference that the Adams and the Eves of Kavirondo have not yet discovered that they are naked, and instead of reposing in beatific leisure among apple trees, Adam and Eve may be seen hoeing gardens along the railway or carrying baskets of grain to the market at Port Florence, the majority of them without an atom of clothing. But there is nothing to affect the susceptibilities of the European visitor. It is nature. You might as well object to a sycamore tree going without leaves in winter as object to a Kavirondo man or woman going naked. At the railway stations alas! they are gradually getting Adam into trousers, but, as a rule, Eve still moves in all her native charms, wearing at most a tassel suspended from a girdle.


