GETS A SCARE

Dr. Charteris Imagines that Chatham May be in Danger of an Outbreak

Township and Dresden-Case of Negligence.

At the meeting of the Board of Health, held yesterday afternoon, the startling revelation was made that Chatham may, at any time, be af-flicted with an outbreak of the dread disease small-pox. Dr. Charterls, the Medical Health Officer of Chatham Township, reported that there were three houses under quarantine in the township, containing eight cases. He understood, also, that the loathsome

understood, also, that the loathsome disease had made its appearance in Dresden. The greatest danger arose, however, not from the quarantined cases, but from those who had been exposed to the infection before the quarantine came into effect.

Dr. Charteris then revealed a state of culpable negligence that borders on criminality. It seems that the disease has been rampant in this section of the township for five or six weeks without being reported to the authorities. Indeed, a certain physician diagnosed one case as being small-pox, agnosed one case as being small-pox, but also neglected to report it. Quite by chance the medical authorities learned of the existence of the epi-

learned of the existence of the epidemic through the appearance on the streets of Dresden of a young man covered with small-pox rash.

When the houses were visited people were found passing in and out, and it was discovered that the patients had mingled freely with the community. Every precaution had been taken, but the authorities cannot tell how much of a start the scourge has. From the great number who have been exposed it is not unlikely that there will be an outbreak of the loathsome disease in the city.

A WORTHY MISSION.

A. B. Walker, B. A., LL. B., D. C. L., the first colored man to be call ed to the Canadian bar, is in Chat-ham in the interests of what appears to be a most worthy project The chief object of the movement

of which he is the head is to bring the whole continent of Africa and the whole African race within the pale of Christian civilization, according to the Anglo-Saxon plan; and he proposes to do this by founding in some part of British Africa, not already largely occupied by white people, a golony of an intelligent, educated, industrious class of English-speaking Negroes drawn from English-speaking countries.

As to the character of this colony, it is the fixed intention to make it British in the strictest sense of the term. To have everything about it and in it British. To adopt British laws and institutions. To have the system of education British. To follow British ideals of life. And to pattern after British models of society. And Dr. Walker expects to have it administered as a Crown colony, until it becomes, through population and advancement, important enough to be vested with responsible and representative governmen

THE PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.

The Japanese have shown a modesty and reliability in negotiating and carrying on the war which has commanded the admiration of the world. They have shown no jingoism or egotism, and all the despatches sent out by them have proved to be correct. They have shown ability in civil and military management that places them on a par with the most enlightened white people, and moderation and humanity in dealing with those overcome by them which all nations may well emulate. In diplomacy and statesmanship also the Ja panese have proved equal to the oleverest. Indeed, their negotiations have been marked by an honesty and frankness to which most diplomats are strangers, and yet they were too clever for the cleverest Chinaman, the man whom all Europe was afraid, Li Hung Chang. In the treaty of Shimonoseki in 1895 Li Hung Change's shiftiness and duplicity met an emphatic defeat. After ten days of sparring, Japan presented her final terms, requiring a final and categorical reply in four days. All the discussion was left to Li Hung Chang. The Japanese envoys met all his arguments and appeals with a courteous but firm "No," and the treaty was concluded. If the

"Now, the tea plant is the prey of s hundred insects, and the picker in his haste doesn't pause to brush off each leaf or to wash it, for he works, as we say, by piece work.

"The picked leaves are dried on charcoal fires. They shrivel under the heat and the insect, larvae and chrysalids among them change to dust. This dust looks to the ordinary eye like leaf fragments, but under the microscope it looks, as you remarked, like an insect railroad wreck or a pygmy battlefield It tastes like-but you know as well as do what it tastes like."

A SYMBOL OF PEACE.

The Dove Has Had This Distinction

In All Ages Since the Flood.

The dove has been pictured as the bird of peace by writer and artists in all the ages since the sime of the flood, for the dove has figured in the symbolism of many races and of countless generations. According to the Century Dictionary, the dove is the bird of peace because of the incident recorded in the eighth chapter of Gen sis: "And it came to pass at the end of forty days that Noah opened the window of the ark which he had made, and he sent forth a raven which went to and fro until the waters were dried up from off the earth. And he sent forth a dove from him to see if the waters were abated from off the face of the ground, but the dove found no rest for the sele of her foot, and she returned unto him in the ark. And he stayed yet another seven days, and again he sent forth the dove out of the ark, and the dove came to him in the evening, and, lo, in her mouth was an olive leaf plucked off; so Noah knew

that the waters were abated from off

the earth." Proper names derived from the dove have always been used in the orient as descriptive of foveliness and were especially applied to beautiful women. The dove was woven into the pagan worship of ancient northern Europe, and it has a great piace in early Christian life and symbolism. From immemorial time the dove has always been a type of innocence to always been a type of innocence to the Jews. Elsewhere it has been associated since the Olympian age with the higher idea of Venus as the symbol of adural human affection—the love that goes with purity and simplicity of heart. It had a part in marriage scenes and was naturally introduced by early Christian painters into pictures of the Madonna and child and of female saints. These qualities of of female saints. These qualities of gentleness and affection combined with their mournful notes made doves equally appropriate to moods of sorrow, and they were a part of the furni-ture of most pagan funerals. This passed on into Christian usage and their likenesses, generally combined with the olive branch, were carved on the tombs in the catacombs be-neath Rome and elsewhere, emblematic

of eternal peace.
In the Sporting Magazine for 1825
this appeared: "Pigeons are rarely seen at the table of the Russians, who entertain a superstitious veneration for these birds because the Holy Ghost as-stimed the form of a dove." Comment-ing on this, a writer says, "This cus-tom of the abstinence from the flesh of the dove is far older than Christian-ity, being indeed in all probability connected with the same class of feelings as those which marked it out as the Aryan death bird."

Sir Richard F. Burton remarks: "Ever since Noah's dove every religion seems to consider the pigeon as the sacred bird. For example, every mosque swarms with pigeons, and the same exist in most Italian market places. The Hindoo pundits and the old Assyrian empire also have them.'

SINGING FLAMES.


Two Little Experiments That Are Curious and Interesting.

Did you ever hear of "singing" dames? Here are two little experiments showing how sensitive a flame may be to sharp sounds and how it may be made to "sing."

Nall together two blocks of wood, A

and D, as shown in the picture, and at the top of A fasten a piece of wire, B, with a ring about five inches in diameter at its other end. Over this ring place a piece of wire gauze, C. Get a piece of glass tubing about a quarter of an inch in its outside diame-

ter and have a jet made at one end, as

shown in the cut. It can then be fass tened to the block of wood, E, with a little wax so that its tip is about two inches under the gauze. To the other end of the glass tubing fasten a piece of rubber tubing and connect it with a gas jet.

Turn on the gas and light it above the wire gauze, and it should burn there with a thin conical flame about four inches long. Let it burn a mo-ment steadily, and then if you suddenly make a hissing sound the flame is so sensitive that it will shrink at once to a small blue flame.

Again let it burn up quietly and then suddenly whistle or clap your hands or jingle some coins or make a rapping noise. Again the fiame will shrink, and it will act in the same way at any sudden loud noise.

Now get a glass tube, T, if possible, twelve laches long and an inch and a quarter in diameter, but any size will do from seven inches to two feet in length and from three-quarters of an ench to an inch and a half in diameter.

Rest the tube lightly on the gauze, covering the flame with it. If now you will lift the gauze and the tube from

the ring and raise them very carefully the flame will shorten and then suddenly begin to "sing." Now lower the gauze and tube to just the point where the flame ceases to sing, and it will be so sensitive that the lightest high, sharp sound will set it to singing, but it will cease the moment the sound. it will cease the moment the sound stops.

The flame responds very quickly, as

you may prove by saying a word like "secede" or "sensitive." The flame will sing twice in each case—in the first word for the hissing of the s and c, in the second for each s. Make these experiments. They are very curious and interesting.


RAN AWAY



STONEHENGE.

Rights and Wrongs of Sir Edmund Antrobus In His Wire-Fence Fight With the British Public.

Stonehenge is to England what the pyramids are to Egypt, being indissolubly bound up with the history of the nation. Its age, however, antedating the dawn thereof, since its erigin has been ascribed by the most eminent scientists of the day to an epoch nearly 2,00e years before the birth of Christ. Under the circumstances the public has taken exception to the action of Sir Edmund Antrobus, the owner of the ground upon which it is situated, in surrounding the hoary ruins with a wire fence, and in charging an admission fee. People feel about it, indeed, in much the same way as they might feel if the Khedive of Egypt were to surround the appreaches to the Stonehenge is to England what the might feel if the Khedive of Egypt were to surround the appreaches to the great pyramids near Cairo and of the Sphinx with a fence and to debar the public from access thereto save on the payment of a fee.

The matter has now been brought to the fore by the lawsuits which have been brought against the Matter.

to the fore by the lawsuits which have been brought against Sir Edmund Antrobus by societies organized for the avowed purpose of protecting the rights of the public, says the Marquise de Fontenoy. And, finding that there was no means of either inducing the Government to purchase Etonehenge from Sir Edmund in the same way that it might buy a park for the use of the people, and that, moreover, the title of Sir Edmund to the land on which Stonehenge is located is unassailable, they have brought suit against him in the Court of Chancery in London on the plea that the public has a right of way to the monument.

The Attorney-General and a big array of legal talent are conducting the ease against Sir Edmund and the sease are seaters.

The Attorney-General and a big array of legal talent are conducting the ease against Sir Edmund, and it looks much as if he would be defeated, although he has made clear his position—namely: that if he has surrounded Stonehenge with a barbed wire fence it is for the purpose of protecting the stenes henge with a barbed wire fence it is for the purpose of protecting the stones from the injurious treatment to which they formerly were subjected by people without any reverence for the hoary past. Moreover, as some of the stones are in danger of falling, he fears that in the event of anybody being injured thereby he might be held financially responsible.

responsible.

That the ruins have undergone the mest shameful treatment it is impossible to deny. Some of the giant stones were brought down to the ground through holes dug by gypsies. And, while so many of the tourists contented themselves with merely chipping the stones in their anxiety to secure relies, there were others who actually attempted to blow them from their position by means of gunpowder and dynamite, with a view of ascertaining whether there were not any treasures concealed beneath.

All these arguments of Sir Edmund are held to be of no avail by the Attorney-General, whoc laims that, in-asmuch as Stonehenge has lain open to all the world since English history began, the public has acculred a right asmuch as Stonenenge has lain open to all the world since English history began, the public has acquired a right of way to every portion of the grounds, and, he adds, that anything in the shape of a medern enclosure tends to destroy the spell formerly created by the aspect of those immense stenes, standing alone, in strange circles, far from human habitations, in the midst of a wast open, rolling plain—those stones which were regarded as prehistoric already a thousand years ago, when Henry of Huntingdon wrote of them. Caxton, the inventor of printing, referred to the mystery of their origin. Sir Philip Sidney sang of them in the reign of Queen Elizabeth. King Charles II., beguiled a day after the disastrous battle of Worcester, in endeavoring to count the stones while hiding at Hele House, and Daniel Defoe, of Robinson Crusoe fame, likewise described his

House, and Daniel Defoe, of Robinson Crusoe fame, likewise described his pilgrimage to the spot.

The price for which Sin Edmund offered to sell the ruins and the twenty acres of land on which they stand to the Government or to any public or private body was \$750,000, and there has always been a dread lest Andrew Carnegie. J. Pierpont Morgan, or some other American multi-millionaire should take advantage of this offer, purchase the whole property and ruins, and ship the latter off to America, at the same time subjecting their present site to an exhaustive exploration by means of an exhaustive exploration, by means of an exhaustive exploration, by means of excavations, which would probably re-veal wonderful interesting relics of the creators of the temple, and, possibly,

Sir Edmund is a distinguished sol-lier, who served with much gallantry at the Guards in Egypt, and who since retiring from the army has assumed as partner the representation of the hereditary family interest in Coutts' Bank in London. He is married to Florence Sartoris, a niece of Mrs. Nellie Grant Sartoris, and his uncle, the Grant Sartoris, and his uncle, the late Mgr. Frederick Antrobus, was for many years secretary of the British legation at Washington during the presidencies of Lincoln, Johnston and Grant Hamiltonian Communication of Communicati



YELLOW FEVER REPORT.

Total Deaths At New Orleans Monday

New Orleans, La., Aug. 8.—Official yellow fever report to 6 p.m. yesterday. New cases, 32; total to date, 565; deaths yesterday, 8; total deaths to date, 113; new sub-foci, 4; total sub-foci to date 97.

With \$70,000 in hand resulting from an assessment of the citizens of New Orleans, no difficulties stand in the way of immediatee federal control of the fever situation, Dr. White estimates the total expenses for eradication at \$1,500 to \$2,000 per day. There is, therefore, available enough money to go forward with the federal plans at high pressure for a month or six weeks and long before that time, it is assured by Mayor Hehrman and Chairman Janvier of the citizens committee, that the total of a quarter of a million asked for by the Government will be on hand. If complete success crowns the work of the marine hospiwill be on hand.
