

BOMB IN THE BASILICA

Explodes In Mighty St Peters Cathedral Rome

BOMB THROWER ESCAPES

Rone, Nov. 19.—A bomb was exploded in St. Peter's yesterday. The edifice was crowded and an indescribable scene of confusion followed. There were no fatalities.

Yesterday was the anniversary of the dedication of the basilica to St. Peter, and it was beautifully decorated for the occasion. Holy relies were exposed, and a large number of the faithful attended the services.

The last mass had just been concluded when the explosion occurred, and only one canon, who had not quite finished, remained at the altar of St. Petronilla.

Tremendous Roar.

As the canon turned to bless the communicants, there was a tremendous roar, which echoed throughout the lofty arches of the immense dome like a thunder clap. At the same time a dense smoke spread throughout this portion of the basilica and a strong odor of gunpowder filled the air. Confusion and panie at once seized the people.

Chairs were overthrown, making the confusion more serious. Men and women fled, stumbling in all directions, and the screams of children and cries of anguish were heard on all sides, and for a few moments it seemed as if nothing could obviate a grave dissater.

The vast size of the church, however, gave room for the crowd to scatter, and at the end of a few mo-ments the people were surging toward the doors, excited and nervous, but

No One Hurt.

As soon as the smoke cleared away a hasty examination showed that nobody had been hurt in the crush, and, furthermore, that no one had been wounded by the explosion. Calm was gradually restored and people returned to view the extent of the damage.

It was discovered that the bomb had been placed under a scaffolding which had been erected to facilitate repairs to the roof exactly over the celebrated tomb of Clement XIII., by Canova.

Pope Hears Report.

The Pope was engaged in his regular noon hours devotions when the bomb went off. He heard a muffled sound, which surprised, but did not alarm him. Monsignor Misciatelli, sub prefect of the apostolic palaces, and

sound, which surprised, but did not alarm him. Monsignor Misciatelli, sub prefect of the apostolic palaces, and Monsignor Bisleti, major domo of the Vatican, at once hurriedly entered the pontiff's chamber. They were so pale that the Pope immediately asked: "What has happened?"
"Do not be alarmed, Holy Father," was the answer, "a bomb has exploded in the basilica, but fortunately there are no deaths to deplore, and no one has been wounded."

The pontiff asked anxiously if the church had been injured. On being reassured he fell on his knees, saying he must implore mercy for the misguided perpetrator of the deed.

A three days' service of praise will be celebrated in all the churches in expiation of this offence to religion.

SENATOR VIDAL DEAD.

Was Prominent In Church Work In Sarnia For Years, and He Was An Active Prohibitionist.

Sarnia, Nov. 19.—Hon. Alexander Vidal, a member of the Canadian Senate since 1873, died at his home here yesterday afternoon. He had been failing during the past two months. The funeral will take place on Wed-

The funeral will take place on Wednesday.

Hon. Alexander Vidal was born in Berkshire, England, Aug. 4, 1819, being the eldest surviving son of Captain R. E. Vidal, R.N. The Vidal amily came originally from Spain, removing to England in the seventeenth century. He was educated the Royal Mathematical School, Christ's Hospital, London, accompanied his father to Canada in 1834, estiling in Sarnia, Ont., the following year. Married, December, 1847, Catherine, eldest daughter of Captain W. E. Wright, R.N., of Moore, Lambton County. He practiced the profession of civil engineering from 1843 to 1862, and was manager of the Sarnia branch of the Bank of Upper Canada from 1852 till the failure of that institution in 1866. He held the same position in the service of the Bank of Montreal from that time until 1875, when he resigned.

His Political Career.

At the first general election following Confederation in 1867, he was au unsuccessful- candidate against the Hon. Alex. Mackenzie for the House of Commons; again in 1872 he was defeated. He represented the St. Clair division in the legislative council from September, 1863, until the union. He became a Senator at the call of Sir John A. Macdonald, Jan. 15, 1873. Sir John A. Macdonald, Jan. 15, 1873. He was a man who took a general interest in the affairs of his community. He had been lieutenant-colonel in the Canadian militia, county treasury of Lambton, president of the Y.M.C.A. at Sarnia in 1878. The temperance cause claimed a great deal of his energies in late years, and he was a central figure in the Dominion alliance for the total suppression of the liquor traffic, of which, organization he was a past president. Senator Vidal was a member of the Church of England till 1843, when he joined the Presbyterian Church, and has represented the Sarnia Church in the general assembly.

He is survived by four sons and two daughters.

TOO GOOD TO LIVE.

Moscow Police Prefect Too Humane For Good of Cause.

Moscow, Nov. 19.—The social revolutionists Saturday issued a proclamation, saying that they regretted the failure of the recent attempt of the life of General Rheinbot, prefect of police of Moscow, and announcing that their efforts will be persisted in until successful

The police assert that many letters and documents found during searches of houses show clearly that the chief reason that the attempt to assassinate General Rheinbot was his popularity with the Moscow workmen, due to his just and humane attitude on the labor question, which was considered by the revolutionists as a great hindrance to the proletariat movement.

Poltava, Russia, Nov. 19.—General Polkownikoff, commander of the garri-son here, was shot dead Saturday night, and a soldier who was passing at the time, also was killed by unknown persons.

\$500 FINE OR JAIL.

What Violation of Bait Act Costs Two Fishermen.

St. John's, Nfid., Nov. 19.—Two colonial fishermen, Du Bois and Crane, who shipped aboard the American herring vessel Ralph Hall Nov. 8 outside the three-mile limit, were tried Friday before a magistrate at Bay Islands.

Friday before a magistrate at Bay Islands.

The men'were charged with having on Nov. 12, in violation of the Bait Act, put herring on board the Ralph Hall. They were convicted and fined \$500 each, with an alternative of serving three months in prison. Counsel for Du Bois and Crane gave bond for the men and an appeal will be taken to the Supreme Court, before which the case will be argued next month.

The Colonial Government expects this prosecution will result in stoping Newfoundlanders shipping on board American vessels and will therefore nullify the modus vivendi.

POTASH TABLETS EXPLODE.

Peculiar Accident to Son of Prominent Meya Scotia Lawyer.

Fredericton, N.B., Nov. 19.—A peculiar accident happened in the home of W. T. N. Fenety, a prominent lawyer, when his little son was rendered unconscious, had his face and arms rightfully cut, and received severe bruises over the body, by an explosion of potash lozenges and some pieces of sulphur.

The lad found them in a medicine chest, placed them in an earthen dish and started to pound them to powder with a hammer. Several lozenges were in the dish, and the explosion was terrific.

Doctors are working to save the boy's eyesight, but the lad is in a bad condition.

Jap Sailers In California. San Francisco; Cal., Nov. 19.—Collector of the Port Stratton has been notified to prepare for the reception of a Japanese squadron, which will come to this port in the spring. The visit will assume much international importance, and every courtesy is to be offered the officers and squadron. It will come direct to San Francisco, arriving in either March or April, after making a brief stop at Honolulu.

To Settle Coal Strike. Ottawa, Nov. 19.—Mackenzie King, deputy Minister of Labor, lett Saturday night for Lethbridge, to endeavor to settle the coal strike there. There is a great scarcity of coal and application has been made to the Dominion Government to give a rebate on the duty on coal brought in from the United States.





TOWNSHIPS OCCUPIED.

Veterans Take Advantage of Govern-ment's Land Grants.

ment's Land Grants.

Toronto, Nov. 19.—The three townships in the district of Algoma, Carnegie, Hoyle and Murphy, which were set aside a short time ago for occupation under the lands grants to veterans, have been entirely taken up to the number of 440.

The other three townships in Rainy River, Hartman, Revell and Bucke, set aside at the same time, are also nearly fully allotted, and applications are coming in so rapidly that a few days will fill them likewise.

The appropriation of \$50,000 for the redemption of land grant certificates having been exhausted, an interim appropriation of \$25,000 more has been made, and this also is well on the way to being exhausted.

PICTURE HANGING.

The Best Treatment For Artistic and Pleasing Effects.

At this season of the year, when we are all busy arranging our rooms for the winter, one of the most important details connected with their decoration is one frequently treated very casually by the ordinary housewife. This is the hanging and arrangement of pictures. These form one of the best ornaments for a room if properly arranged, yet in the majority of cases, unless they chance to belong to a valuable collection, which requires and receives the attention of skilled and artistic hands, they are treated in a most haphazard fashion, either skied or hung in the most impossible positions, ac cording to what the housekeeper imagines is needed by the last novelty in wall decoration. Now, there is a vast difference in the effect of pictures well and skillfully hung.

To begin with, no picture looks its

best when hung directly opposite to a window, as then the light falls on it flat and hard; therefore, the least important should be kept for this posi-tion. Of course it is impossible to give strict directions as to the hanging of pictures without seeing them and the space they are to occupy, for so much position. There are, however, certain rules which cannot be transgressed with impunity. Of these the first regards the height at which the pic-tures should be hung. They should always be on a line with the eye, at which point they can be easily and pleasantly seen, and if possible their bases should be at one level and perfectly straight. Next, pictures and prints should not

hung too close to each other, for not only do the colors clash, in the first case, but the different designs of the frames produce an equally discordant effect. If possible small pic-tures should be fastened to the wall, not hung by a cord, nor allowed to tilt forward at an angle, as this arrangewill give such quick relief to crampe, colic or pain in the stomach as Nerviline. "He had created the Byzantine gown, "And yet did he create it? At all vents, she collaborated. And so gowns are made."-Woman's Home



Steamship Collision Between The Dix And The Jeanie

43 LIVES ARE LOST

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 20.—The steamer Dix, Capt. P. Lermon, bound from Seattle to Port Blakeley with passengers, sank two miles north of Alki Point, shortly after 7 o'clock Sunday night, after having collided with steamship Jeanie, Capt. P. H. Mason, of the Alaska Coast Co.

Forty-three passengers and members of the crew of the Dix are missing, and thirty-six were saved. The Dix is a total wreck. The Jeanie was not injured in the least. The master of the Dix was saved.

The collision occurred while the Sound was almost as smooth as a mill pond, and after the boats had been steaming within sight of each other for a quarter of an hour.

The Jeanie was backing when she collided with the Dix, and the impact was very slight. The Dix was struck abaft of amidships on the starboard side. She listed heavily to port for a brief period, righted herself, then sank stern first.

No Time For Lifeboats.

There was hardly time to launth life rafts or boats before she was almost entirely submerged. Passengers jumped from the decks into the water; women screamed and officers and men called orders that could hardly be heard above the din. The passengers from the Dix who could swim made their way to the sides of the Jeanie and were dragged aboard. The Jeanie was not moved until after all who had reached her had been haulef aboard. Capt. Mason's Story.

"I got away from Smith's Cove a little before 7 o'clock, and laid a course for Tacoma," said Capt. Mason. "I had no passengers aboard. I saw the Dix headed for Port Blakelev and signalled to her. Soon she came up astern of me and started directly across my bows.

"I signalled to the engineer for full speed astern, but we could not get out of the way in time. The Jeanie was backing a little when we struck her well abaft of amidships. The shock did not seem enough to have injured an ordinary launch. The Dix listed heavily to starboard, righted herself and then sank stern first."

Capt. Lermon, master of the steamer Dix; told the story of the collision after arriving at Seattle. He was shaking with the cold, his eyes still dilated with the horror of his experience.

"I don't know how it happened," remarked, "and all I remember is that someone came up on the street and hit me. I wouldn't pull a knife on any man."

He pleaded not guilty and was re-manded till next Monday.
