Found His Friend Dead.

Mr. Bear came in from Forty-mile on Friday and decided to go out and spend the night with John McAnthur, a friend, who owned a cabla near fire mouth of Bonanza evock. In town, Mr. Bear, had found that his friend had been in Dawson and that afternoon had paid his bill at the Klandike hotel and gone up the creek, It was about 9 o'clock in the evening when he arrived at the catin and he found everything quite dark. On the floor he found the body of McArthur quite dead and stone cold the top of his head completely blown off with a rife which he still held in his hands. He had evidently rested the built end of the rifle against a nearby sled and holding the barrel in his lest hand close to the left side of his head had shoved the trigger. The top of the skull was blown completely off and rested on the bed several feet away. The brains were souttered all over the floor.

McAnthur had several pleacs of mining propenties and besides had \$1,000 in dust at the time he killed himself. The mental strain of mining operations is too much for some men. Neither the in-spector of land titles offices, nor any registrar, deputy registrar or clerk in any land titles office shall directly or indirectly are as the agent of any person investing money and tak-ing securities on land within any registration district, nor shall the inspector of land titles. offices, nor any registrar deputy registrar or clerk advise for any fee or reward or otherwise inspector deputy-registrar or elerk.
