EXEMPTION ACT DOES NOT AP-PLY TO LAND OWNED BY UNI-VERSITY

Claim of Counsel for Governors of Acadia University for Exemp-tion from Taxes, is Settled Without any Argument.

Without any Argument.

DARTMOUTH, June 17.—The question as to whether property on Jamieson street, North Dartmouth, assessed to the Governors of Acadia University, is liable for taxes, need not be further dealt with by the Town Council, as the taxes have been paid. At a recent meeting of the council, counsel for the Governors wrote claiming that under Section 4 or sub-section C of the Assessment Act: Chapter 86, Revised Statutes of Nova Scotia, 1923, the property in question was exempt from taxation. The claim was based on the grounds that the property was a part of an educational institution.

The opinion of the town solicitor was that the property did not come within the meaning of the Act quoted, inasmuch as it was not being used for educational purposes, but was only assessed to the governors of an educational institution. In view of this opinion the council instructed its solicitor to take whatever steps were necessary to protect the interests of the town in the matter. In the meantime the taxes have been paid, thus disposing of the matter without further investigation being necessary.

THE PROBLEM OF RIGHT LIVING

IN A certain court in the neighboring republic the case under consideration was that of a woman who had been arrested because her fifteen year old daughter had been permitted to stay out of school and go to work. The case had been set down for the following day, and the judge demanded a bond of fifty dollars, in lieu of which the matther would be obliged to go to iail. Protest was made by the woman mother would be obliged to go to jail. Protest was made by the woman that she was nursing a nine months old baby and the judge told her that while he was sorry, she would have to take the baby to jail with her unless she could furnish the required bond. Frenzied by the situation facing her the mother shouted to the court: "We have a right to live! I cannot feed nine hungry mouths and my husband and myself and clothe us all on twenty dollars a week". The judge re-

d, "That is your problem".

Under the law the court was right. In most countries today laws exist which provide penalties for keeping children under a pre-cribed age out of school. We have such a law in Nova Scotia, with which no fault can be found since it was designed to protect children from ignorance and raise the standard of citizenship through learnrouni ignorance and raise the standard of citizensing through learning. Very properly the state desires citizens of high quality. It realizes that illiteracy reduces the quality. Consequently it makes the effort to prevent illiteracy by making education compulsory. Countries without compulsory education are behind the times. They have as a rule low standards of citizenship when averages are struck. Compulsory education has one of the highest purposes ever written

That is society's side of the matter as developed in the case under consideration. But as the wife and mother declared in court, that family has "a right to live". It has also the right to demand of the state how it can live on an income too small to feed, clothe and shelter it. The community is within its rights in demanding that children of a certain age shall go to school as the law provides. It has no right—morally nor ethically—to enforce a law which distresses human beings in denying to them the first necessities of life. Her problem? So the court said, but the court erred. It is society's problem.

No one would conclude—certainly not in this favored sectionthat the family would starve under any circumstances as long as the truth was known. Help from some source would be forthcoming. Humanity does not permit unfortunates to starve in this country if it knows of the distress. Yet, as far as the law is concerned, its responsibility is to see that the child goes to school. If it were an responsibility is to see that the child goes to school. If it were an utter impossibility to feed and clothe a family of eleven on twenty dollars a week—and in these times no one will argue that it can be done properly—the law would still demand that the earning power of the child of school age be cut off, let the consequences be what they may. Without relief from some source members of the family or all of them would suffer under nourishment and exposure. In that case the state would experience greater damage than if the child enver attended school another day in its life. Health is more essential than learning. At least health is the first requisite of progressive humanity.

It is not nor should it be the mother's problem as the court declared. When a state enacts a law of this or any other kind it should also assume responsibility for making possible its observance. The family has the right to live, educated or not. The state cannot in justice demand impossibilites of individuals.

Until society realizes its problem and sets about to effect a proper solution conditions will continue to be far from what they should. In Wolfville and surrounding sections, as in every other community, the problem of right living is a very real one and The Acadian makes no apology for again referring to it, with the hope that the interest of citizens generally may be aroused to a real regard for the responsibility involved.

BIG PROBLEMS FACE NEW GOVERNMENT

THE NEW provincial government which is soon to take over the management of public affairs has a rather formidable undertaking on its hands. Mr. Rhodes will do well to consider carefully the men whom he will select to advise him in order that the best interests of Nova Scotia may be served and conditions so improved as to put the province well abreast of other up to date countries. The people have spoken plainly by their ballots and will naturally be satisfied with nothing less than the fulfillment, so far as it is possible, of such action as will demonstrate that a new order utter impossibility to feed and clothe a family of eleven on twenty dollars a week—and in these times no one will argue that it can be

possible, of such action as will demonstrate that a new order of things is in progress.

If we are to have a business administration a complete reconstruction of the whole political system will be necessary, and no government ever received a more absolute mandate from the people to make reforms than has been given to Mr. Rhodes and his following. Evidently in the late election—to a greater extent than is usual—the electorate have studied conditions as they saw them and acted accordingly. The late government which long outlived its usefulness has been weighed and found wanting and it is up to

their successors to make good in order that they may not meet with a similar fate when called upon to give an accounting.

Those who look for speedy results may be disappointed as the government must be given a reasonable time in which to bring about necessary changes, but if in the end the desired goal is arrived at it will be well worth waiting for. In the meantime every good citizen will do his utmost to assist in every way possible those who have a most difficult work to do.

MONEY ALL GOES FOR FEES

THE PRESENT method of administering the affairs of insolvent debtors in this country is very far from satisfactory. In most cases after the expenses are paid little is left to divide among the creditors. It is one of the fortunes of business that occasionally there will be those who because of misfortune or bad management are unable to pay their bills and are obliged to seek for leniency at the hands of their creditors. In most cases it is not nor should it be a difficult thing to arrive at a satisfactory compromise. The way it generally works out, however, is that the entire assets go to fees and expenses with practically nothing left for those who should be provided for. Legal fees in this country have become needlessly exaggerated to such an extent that the carrying on of business has been made far too expensive. One of the reforms needed is a reasonable provision for handling affairs of this kind and the sooner something along this line is set in motion the better for the country.

WE NEED MOREFAITH IN OUR PROVINCE

IN ANOTHER column we publish this week from the Montreal . Herald a letter written by a correspondent which is well worthy of the careful perusal of every Nova Scotian. At a time when the problems of this and other naritime provinces are engaging a great deal of public attention it uggests a policy which if properly put into operation ought to corect many of our so called "wrongs". There is a very trite sayingthat "God helps those who help themselves" and it is a fact that when Nova Scotians either at home or abroad really set about to help themselves they generally make good.

The practice is too common of pointing out instances where industries have failed in Nova cotia before they were even well launched, and failing to take into account other undertakings that have met with phenominal success. This province possesses wonderful possibilities as a return for industry and enterprise on the part of its people, and in most case where failure has come it has been the result of an unwillingness or incapacity to wait for the results which are bound to come when conditions are right.

Perhaps what Nova Scotia needs above anything else is a more abundant faith on the part of its people, and this should be inculcated through our public intitutions.

OFFIR IT FOR SALE

THE IDEA that any concern can afford not to advertise is essentially wrong, says a contemporary, and has been disproved by experience. There is not a business in this country, except that of the governor of a prison, hat could not be doubled in volume by skillful advertising. Even coneteries have been known to advertise and prosper by it. The trend of the modern age in commercial affairs might be summed up it the dictum: "If your business is not worth advertising, advertise it for slae."






