

But if the rule, "By their fruits ye shall thow them," be applied to such men, surely no one can withhold his assent to the fact that they bring forth good fruit, and therefore the annelusion of the syllogism is irrefragable, they are good trees.

Would it not be well for those "little fellows" who esteem themselves "wise above that which is written" to ponder the meaning of the text, "Blessed is the man who condemneth sot himself in that thing which he alloweth," and give Christian workers, who are no less sealous than they, credit for honest endeavor to have a good "conscience toward God" as well as themselves.






