

EXPLANATION OF CALENDAR PAGES.

The Publisher of this Almanac, with a view to increase its circulation and usefulness, has adapted its calculations for the whole country. The Moon's changes are given for five different places, viz. : Quebec, Montreal, Perth, Toronto, and London. The rising and setting of the Sun are given for Montreal and Toronto. The rising and setting of the Moon are given with sufficient exactness for all practical purposes. The weather prognos-tications are again calculated according to the table of the celebrated Dr. Herschel; and for extraordinary accuracy Hart's Almanac retains its wonderful popularity.

Observations .- The nearer the time of the Moon's change, the first quarter full, and the last quarter, are to midnight, the fairer will the weather be during the seven days following. 2. The espace of this calculation occupies from ten at night till two next

morning.

3. The nearer to mid-day or noon the phases of the Moon happen, the more foul or wet weather may be expected during the next seven days.
4. The space of the calculation occupies from ten in the forenoon to two in the afternoon. These observations refer principally to the Summer, though they affect Spring and Autumn nearly in the same ratic.
5. The Moon's change, first quarter, full, and last quarter, happening during six as the afternoon hours, *i. e.*, from four to ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is most dependent on the wind, as is noted in the table. table.

ECLIPSES DURING THE YEAR 1874.

There will be four Eclipses during the year, none of them requiring much remark. But we give the particulars :

I. On the 16th of April there will be a total Eclipse of the Sun. Not visible to us.

II. On the 1st of May next, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Moon. Invisible to Canadians.

III. On the 10th of October there will be an annular Eclipse of the Sun. Not visible in Canada.

IV. On the 24th of October, in the evening there will be a total Eclipse of the Moon, ending in the morning of the 25th. Visible as follows: Begins at Montreal at 0.48 on the 25th; Toronto, 0.25. Total in Montreal, 2.6, where totality ends 2.49. Total in Toronto, 1.43, where totality ends 2.18. Ends in Montreal 3.58; in Toronto 3.35.

APPEARANCES OF THE PLANETS.

Venus will be Morning Star until February 23; Mars after July 5; Jupiter after October 5; Saturn from January 24 until the 5th of May.

Venus will be Evening Star from February 23rd until December 8th; Mars until July 5th; Jupiter until the 5th of October; Saturn until January the 24th, and after the 4th of May.

Mercury will be brightest the latter end of January, February and October, also about the middle of April and August, and the first week in December. Venus will be brightest November 2nd ; Jupiter March 17th ; Saturn August 3rd.

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JANDARY.—A very excellent writer in the Canada Farmer says :—A very common mistake is that of supposing that any sort of land will grow wheat. There are adaptations of soil that ought to be carefully studied, so that each variety may be devoted to such purposes as best sus it. While most farm products have a faculty of accommodating themselves to circumstances, and will grow, after a fashion, anywhere, it will pay to make everything as favorable as possible to their best development. In selecting a piece of ground for wheat, the two extremes of light and stiff clay should be avoided, and a good strong loam chosen. Providence has given us abundance of the very best wheat-land in the world, but there are soils not so well adapted for it whereon other products should be cultivated.

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FEBRUARY.—We read somewhere lately what seemed to be an answer to the question, why farming does not pay with many that are engaged in it. In the judgment of the writer, who seemed to give the results of his own observation, it is because many farmers raise too few kinds of stock. The farmer that reises nothing but corn and hogs can never expect to make as much money as the farmer that devotes his time to the care of horses, cattle, sheep, hogs and poultry, and to the raising of wheat, corn, clover, potatoes and fruit. Such an one has always plenty of work all the year round, and always something that will bring a fair and remunerative price. Some of his products may be low in price, but others may be high, and he will generally have a remunerative profit.

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MARCH.—The Boston Cultivator gives a capital receipt, which we gladly copy for the use of our farmers. Thus Professor Johnson recommends for fertilizing purposes, to mix one bushel of salt and two bushels of dry line under cover, and allow them to decompose madually, thus forming chemical union. The mixture should be made nine weeks before use, or, still better, three months; turning over the heap occasionally. This salt and lime mixture when applied at the rate of 20 or 30 bushels to the acre, forms an excellent top-dressing for many crops. It acts powerfully on the vegetable matter of soils. Fifty-six bushels applied to turnips have produced as large a crop as barn-yard manure. It is destructive to grubs and insects in the soil. Like salt it attracts moisture, and is useful against drought.

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Max.—Scientific research and investigation have established the following propositions as true, on transmission of hereditary animal characteristics:—1st. Like produces like, or the likeness of some ancestor. 2nd When there is great uniformity among the members of the species, the divergencies of the offspring from the average type are usually small. 3rd. When a considerable divergence has once been established, unlikenesses among the offspring are frequent and great. 4th. Any accidental variation from the established type in the form, etc., of a species, may be perpetuated, and to a limited extent, intensified by careful selection and use. 5th. An unnatural strain of demand on any particular part of the animal machinery, long continued, tends to weaken or dwarf all the other parts not allied to the one so stimulated. 6th. Hereditary qualities may be weakened or lost by diguse.

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JULY. The Western Rural gives a curious experiment respecting tomatoes. A correspondent says :--It occurred to me that tomatoes might be grown from cutings of the bearing vine, in the fall, and wintered in greenhouses, in a bearing condition. Accordingly, I made several cuttings and potted them in four-inch pots, when well rooted, and have since continued them in a bearing condition. They are now in fruit (date not given.) The object is to have early bearing plants for spring by the time they can go out of doors, instead of waiting for the fruit of seedlings. The experiment thus far is a success. Strong and thrifty and more slockey than when grown from seed. They are disposed to branch at the axil of each leaf, and need pruning and cutting back. No plant roots easier from cuttings than the tomatoe.

SEPTEMBER.—We give here a good receipt to clean a rusty plough. Take a quart of water, and pour slowly into it half a pint of sulphuric acid. The mixture will become quite warm from chemical action, and this is the reason why the acid should be poured slowly into the water, rather than the water into the acid. Wash with it, and let it remain on the iron till it evaporates. Then wash it again. The object is to give the acid time to dissolve the rust. Then wash with water and you will see where the rust spots are. Apply some more acid and rub over those spots with a brick. The acid and the scouring will remove most of the rust. Then wash the mould board thoroughly with water to remove all the acid, and rub it dry. Brush it over with petrolium or other oil, and let it be till spring. A little extra care, at the time of using, would render this prescription unnecessary.

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

OCTOBER.—It has been stated in the West, that there had never been such a failure of seed corn in coming up as in the present season. The observation of many has shown that corn that had been selected, and hung away from all heat, had its vitality destroyed by freezing. Corn husked and thrown on the floor, and covered with snow, had grown, at least seveneighths of it. Corn left in the shook in the field had produced, while corn put in the crib had failed. It is therefore pretty well established that all seed corn, if husked, should never be allowed to lie on the ground over night; and that corn that is to be hung up in a cold room for seed should never be husked until the planting time arrives. As the facts here given are well attested, it will be quite proper to follow this light of experience. It will cost nothing, and cannot lead astray.
