How to Tell a Bible Story

By Professor Frederick Tracy, Ph.D.

Story-telling is an art, in which there are but few adepts. Yet, given a fair measure of natural ability, one may succeed fairly well in this art, provided he observe the following conditions:—

(1) He should know thoroughly the story he proposes to tell. I do not mean that he should commit it to memory, but that he should study it carefully, going back and forth and up and down in it, until the incidents, situations, actions, and purposes, are all firmly and clearly fixed in his mind.

(2) He should bear in mind that he is not a historian, but a story-teller. Story and history are not the same. History is a connected account of things, on a large scale, setting forth great movements, and explaining the deep-lying causes, and the far-reaching effects of those movements. A story is like a picture; it is the vivid protrayal of one or a few scenes, in the lives of one or a few persons. History is scientific; story is artistic. History is like a strong chain, whose links are all firmly connected together; story is like a beautiful gem, flashing in the sunlight. History requires the memory and the reason; story the imagination. History must be absolutely faithful to the facts; story may deal somewhat freely with the facts, provided it is leval to the truth.

Story is better than history for the young child; for he can appreciate a vivid picture better than a scientific account, a work of art better than a scientific explanation.

(3) He should bear in mind that he is a story-teller, and not a preacher. A story and a sermon are quite different, though their ultimate object may be the same. The story does not expound or explain principles; it pictures persons, situations and actions. It does not present arguments, but incidents. It does not "apply" the truth, or set forth the moral. It does not need to do so, for already, under the story garb, the truth has been presented to the child, in what is to him its most attractive and most effective form.

(4) He should understand the person to whom he tells the story. Stories are for children. He should know the child. He should put himself in the child's place. He should recall the days when he himself "understood as a child, and thought as a child". He should remember that the child's imagination is keen, but his reasoning powers immature, and his information, as well as his vocabulary, limited. He should adapt himself to these things. If the story, as it stands, is beyond the child's capacity, he should alter it so as to make it serve its purpose. The hand of the artist is freer than the hand of the historian. Only one thing the story-teller must never do. He may alter the form; he may deal somewhat freely, even with the substance ; but he must never sacrifice the truth.

Having fulfilled these conditions, he should try to tell the story in such a way that the child's imagination shall be kept busy throughout. Make it a word picture, in which the characters live and act, as it were, before the child's very eyes. Make it a drama, with the child as spectator. If it can thus be made a living thing, it will not be forgotten, nor will its lessons be lost.

What One Korean Girl Did

In a little village of North Ham Kyeung Province close by the sea, with high mountains all around it, I found a most interesting group of Christians who had bought a Korean house, made it over into a church, and from four different villages men, women and children came on Sunday to the service, an audience of one hundred and twenty-seven in all.

"Where did they all come from, and how did the church start?" I asked the native colporteur who had escorted me to the place to hold a Bible Class for a few days.

"Well", he said, "I have been traveling here for about two years selling Gospels and preaching, and finally one or two young men decided to be Christians. Then", he said, "a little girl from Wonsan moved here who had attended the Methodist school, and how hard she worked in bringing others in, words fail me to tell."

"So I was curious to see this little girl, and soon after my arrival she came,—aslight, rather tall child, modest and quite dignified for her fourteen years. I asked her name, and she said, "Helen, was the name my teacher in Wonsan gave me."

I said, "So you have been working for Jesus here; tell me about it."

She was very modest in her reply, saying, "I was too sorry, Puin (lady), when I came here, and went on Sunday where I heard there was service, to find only a few men and no women and girls; I cried every Sunday that I came."

Then, with further questions, I found that she had first talked with the fifteen year old sister of the young man in whose house meetings were held. This little girl became interested, decided that she too would be a Christian, and Helen taught her to read the easy native script. Then the younger sister in this house joined them and I found the two had been named "Mary" and "Magdalene". The group was added to by "Esther", "Martha" and others, until there were enough to start a Girls' school, with about twenty pupils. Whether Helen is to continue to be the teacher, is a question that had not been settled when I was there.

The girls' mothers were soon influenced and they brought other women, and so the work grew, and grows, and will spread no doubt into many other places, and perhaps little Helen's name will be lost in the growth, and fev may know, how, because one little Korean girl was true to God and told others what she knew about Him, whole villages were influenced.

But there is One who knows, and keeps record, and will see to it that Helen gets her full reward.

I hope this little story about Helen Kang

may help some Canadian boys and girls to witness for Him, and who knows how far the influence may go? And what about the people who sent missionaries and money that Helen might be taught? Will they too not share in the joy of the reaping?

Letter From a Mother to a Primary Teacher

DEAR TEACHER :-

I think some of us mothers ought to tell you how we appreciate your careful, loving teaching of our little ones. Was not that worth while?

I think your "Mothers' Meeting" is a great help to us. Those talks on the care and training of little ones have already opened our eyes to needs and dangers of which we had never known; and the pretty stories you read, for us to repeat to our children, have given us new thoughts and ideals, and have given the children much instruction and pleasure. The Bible Lesson takes us back in thought to our childhood days, and I am sure in the case of some, it is the only time in all the busy week when the Bible is thoughtfully read.

I cannot close this letter without telling you how much you have helped me in the training of my little girl and boy. Your practical lessons on obedience, truthfulness, kindness, too, have so impressed them that they carry these thoughts into their home life, and I often see the effects in their readiness to forgive, their eagerness to be helpful, their hatred of untruth, and their loving obedience.

"My teacher always bows her head in prayer time." "My teacher carries her Bible to church." "My teacher is not too proud to take that old Mrs. R. to church with her." "My teacher is always at church and at prayer meeting." All these things are helping me in the training of my children. "My teacher does not wear a silly big hat", one small girl was heard to remark. So you see, even your personal appearance, as well as your personality, is having its influence upon these little people.

THE LESSON RETOLD

After Jesus left the temple, He went out to the Mount of Olives. There he talked to His disciples of His coming again, and of the end of the world. He warned them to be always ready for the Judgment Day, because they could not tell how soon that day might come.

To make the disciples understand more plainly what He meant, Jesus told them another parable about ten young maidens, who went out to meet a bridegroom. For, in that Eastern country, it was the custom for the bridegroom to bring the bride home to his house at night, and his friends, each one carrying a lamp or torch, went out in a procession to meet him on his way to the bride's home. So these ten maidens in the parable who went out to meet the bridegroom, each carried a lighted lamp with her. But the bridegroom was longer in coming than they had expected, so, while they waited for his arrival, they all grew tired and fell asleep.

Now five of these maidens were wise, and had brought oil in vessels with them, besides the oil that was in their lamps, so that, if the lamps should go out, they would have enough to fill them up again. The other five, however, were foolish, and had brought no oil but what was in their lamps.

At midnight the people who were watching, cried, "The bridegroom is coming, go out and meet him !" Then the ten maidens rose, and trimmed their lamps to have them ready; but the foolish maidens found that their lamps were going out, and they had no more oil to fill them up. They begged the others to give them some of their oil, but these refused, saying that, if they did so, they would not have enough for themselves. "Go to the sellers, and buy some more for yourselves", they said. But while they were away buying, the bridegroom came, and the five maidens who were ready, joined the procession and

went in to enjoy the marriage feast. Soon the other five returned, and knocking at the gate, cried, "Lord, Lord, open to us!" But the bridegroom answered, "I do not know you." You were not with the other maidens in the procession—you must be strangers", and he refused to let them come in to join in the feasting and merrymaking.

"So", said Jesus, "learn from this to be always prepared, for, like the bridegroom in the parable, the Son of Man, may come, as I have said, suddenly and without warning, to judge His people."



THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus told His disciples another parable, to show how He would judge people, when He should come again at the last day. A certain rich man went on a journey into a distant country. But before he went, he called his servants and gave them his money, that they might take it and earn more for him, while he was gone. To one servant he gave five talents, to another two talents, and to another only one talent,-to each one as much as he thought he was able to take care of. Then the master set out on his journey.

The two servants who had received most, traded with their money, and, by thought and work, made it twice as much. The servant who had received the one talent, did not try to do anything with his money, but hid it away in the ground.

After a long time, the master returned,

and called his servants to give an account of what they had done. The one who had been given the five talents, came and said, "Lord you gave me five talents. See, I have earned besides them five talents more."

The master was pleased, and said, "You have done well, good and faithful servant; you have been industrious and careful with the few things that I gave you. I will now trust you with far greater and more important things, and you shall come and live in my home and be happy with me there." And he said the same thing also to the second servant, who, with his two talents, had gained two more.

Last of all, came the servant who had received only one talent, and he said, "Lord, I did not know what to do with my talent, for you are a hard man, looking for a great deal when you have given very little; therefore, I was afraid to trade with the talent, lest I should lose it and thus anger you. So, to keep it safe, I hid it in the earth. There it is, just as you gave it to me when you went away on your journey."

The master was very angry and said, "You wicked and lazy servant! Even if what you say of me had been true, it was no reason why you should have neglected your duty and been idle while I was away. Why did you not at least give the talent to some money lender, who would have paid me something for the use of it until I should return from my absence in the far country?"

Then he turned to his other servants and said, "Take the one talent from him, and give it to the man who has the ten, for to every one who uses well what has already been given him, I will give more. But from the man who was unfit to care for even a small amount, I will take away even what he has. And not only shall the talent be taken from him, but he shall be cast out of my house and punished, because he did not make some use of the gift which I gave him and so gain something for me."

THE LESSON RETOLD

After the last Lesson, Jesus gave His disciples still another picture of what the last day will be like. On that day He will come suddenly down from heaven, with all His holy angels, in the midst of a great shining light : and all the people of the earth will be brought before Him to be judged. As an Eastern shepherd separates the sheep in his flock from the goats, so Jesus will separate the good people from the bad. On His right hand, He will place all those who have loved and served Him on earth, and on His left hand, He will put those who have been wicked and careless.

Jesus will say to those on His right hand,

"Come, ye children, into the beautiful home, which My Father has made ready for you in heaven. For when I was hungry, you gave Me food; when I was thirsty, you gave Me drink; when I was poor and needing clothes, you clothed Me; when I was sick, you visited Me; when I was in prison, you came and comforted Me."

Then the good people, on Jesus' right hand, shall say, "Lord, we never saw Thee hungry, or needy, or sick, and helped Thee !" But Jesus shall answer, "Whenever you did these things to any poor person on earth, it was the same as if you had done it to Me."

Afterwards, Jesus shall say to the wicked

people on His left hand, "Go away from Me, you sinful people, into everlasting punishment. For when I was poor and needy and sick, you did nothing to help Me." But the wicked people, in their turn, will say, "Lord, when did we ever see Thee poor or needy or sick, and did not help Thee?" And Jesus shall answer them, "Because you did not do these things to the poor and needy on earth, you did not do them to Me."

Then the wicked shall be sent away into the place of punishment, but the good people shall be taken unto the beautiful home in heaven, which God has prepared for them.

THE ANOINTING OF JESUS

October 30, 1910

Matthew 26: 1-16-Memory Verse, 13.

1 And it came to pass, when Je'sus had finished all these sayings, he said unto his

2 Ye know that after two days is the feast of the passover, and the Son of man is betrayed to be crucified.

3 Then assembled together the chief priests, and the scribes, and the elders of the people, unto the palace of the high priest, who was called Cai'aphas,

Je'sus by subtilty, and kill him.
5 But they said, Not on the feast day, lest there be an uproar among the people.

8 But when his disciples saw it they had indignation, saying, To what purpose is this waste?

9 For this ointment might have been sold for much, and given to the poor.

10 When Je'sus understood it, he said unto them, Why trouble ye the woman? for she

hath wrought a good work upon me.

11 For ye have the poor always with you; but me ye have not always.

12 For in that she hath poured this ointment on my body, she did it for my burial. 13 Verily I say unto you, Wheresoever this gospel shall be preached in the whole world, there shall also this, that this woman hath done, be told for a memorial of her.

14 Then one of the twelve, called Ju'das Iscar'iot, went unto the chief priests, 15 And said unto them, What will ye give me, and I will deliver him unto you? they covenanted with him for thirty pieces of silver.

16 And from that time he sought opportunity to betray him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Now about this time the chief priests and scribes gathered together in the house of Caiaphas the high priest. There they tried to plan the best way of taking Jesus prisoner and having Him put to death. "We must not do it on the feast day", said some of them, " for that would make too great a disturbance among the people."

In the meantime, Jesus was telling the disciples that, in two days, when the Feast of the Passover came, He would be delivered up to His enemies and put to death. Soon after, they all went out to Bethany to take supper at the house of a man named Simon whom Jesus had cured of leprosy.

Now it was the custom in the East, at meals, to recline on couches placed round three sides of the table, resting on the left elbow, with the feet outwards.

As Jesus was reclining at supper, Mary, the sister of Martha and Lazarus, who was one of the guests, went up to where Jesus was, and drawing from under her cloak a little white vase of very precious perfume, she poured it first on the head, and then on the feet of Jesus. As the odor of the precious perfume filled the room, the disciples complained about such waste and said, "It would have been better if she had given us the perfume to sell and use the money for the poor."

But Jesus knew that Mary wished to show her love to Him, and He said to the disciples, "Why do you blame and trouble her? It is a good deed she has done in My honor. You have the poor with you always, to whom you can show kindness whenever you wish, but you will not always have Me with you. This woman is doing, while I still live, what will soon have to be done for My dead body. And I say to you, that, wherever the gospel shall be preached in the whole world, this story shall be told to remind people of her love and her self-denial."

Judas was the disciple who complained most against Mary. He carried the bag in which Jesus and His disciples kept their money, and, being a thief, he sometimes used to take part of the money for himself. He now made up his mind, when he heard Jesus speak about dying, to get as much more money as he could before that should happen. So he stole away secretly to the chief priests, and bargained to give Jesus into their hands for thirty pieces of silver. Then he watched for a good chance to do this wicked deed by which Jesus would be delivered to His enemies.

THE LESSON RETOLD

At last the time for the great Feast of the Passover came, and the disciples came to Jesus, who was still in Bethany, to ask Him where they would get ready the feast. And Jesus said, "Go into the city of Jerusalem, and you will meet a man carrying a jar of water. Follow him into his house, and say, "The Master wants a room in which to eat the Passover with His disciples. Then he will show you a room where you can prepare the feast."

Two of the disciples started at once, and found everything as Jesus had said, and they made ready the supper. In the evening, Jesus and the other disciples came into the city, and went upstairs, where they sat down to eat the Passover feast. As they were eating, Jesus said very sadly, "One of you will

give Me up to wicked men to be killed." The disciples were surprised and grieved, and each one anxiously asked, "Lord, is it I?" "It is one of you who are dipping the hand with Me in the dish", said Jesus again. Then Judas asked, "Lord, is it I?" When Jesus answered, "Yes", Judas immediately left the table, and went out of the room.

Then Jesus, after asking a blessing, took a piece of bread, and gave a bit to each of the disciples, saying, "Do this always, from this time on, in remembrance of Me. This broken bread will remind you of My body broken for you, and this wine—", handing a cup to each in turn, "will remind you of My blood shed for you; for God has made a new promise to save His people from their sins, and I shall die for them." He went on to say, "I shall

not feast with you again, until you are with Me in My home in heaven."

Having finished supper, they all sang a hymn, and went out to the Mount of Olives across the Kidron Valley from Jerusalem.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One day Jesus and His disciples sat on the Mount of Olives, looking down on the wonderful temple and the beautiful city of Jerusalem. There Jesus told His disciples that, in a few years, great trouble would come upon the Holy City. There would be within it, wars and fighting, famine and plague; the beautiful temple would be torn down, and many of the people would either be killed or sold as slaves.

Then Jesus spoke to His disciples again of the time when He will come to judge the world. No sign, however, will be given when that great day will come. Only God Himself knows the time. In the days of Noah, the flood came upon the earth while the people were eating and drinking and living as usual, never believing that the flood would really happen, till it swept them all away. So would the last day come, suddenly and without any warning. Therefore, Jesus told His disciples to watch and be careful, lest they should allow themselves to fall into evil ways and habits

and pleasure, and so become careless and unprepared for Jesus' coming.

Nothing so quickly makes people forget God and His commandments as yielding to evil pleasures. One of the worst of these is the love of strong drink. It takes away one's senses, so that he forgets what is right and wrong, and does all kinds of wicked things. hurting himself and others.

"If the owner of a house", Jesus went on to say, "knew beforehand that a thief was coming to steal his goods, he would watch and not allow his house to be broken into." So must the followers of Jesus watch and be always prepared, for, in an hour when they are least expecting Him, Jesus will come. How blessed and thankful then will be the men who have proved themselves true and faithful servants of Jesus!

It was as if an earthly master had taken a journey to a far country, leaving a servant in charge of his house and his business. If the servant did the work faithfully which his master left him to do; if he provided for those who were under his care; if he did all these things as well as if the master were watching him, then when the master returned he would certainly reward that servant for his faithful work. But if the servant did not do his duty, thinking it might be long before the master came home again, he would be severely punished for neglecting to do the things that his master had told him to do while he was away from home.

So Jesus said His disciples should be faithful in doing their work for Him, whatever it might be. Then, He should come again from heaven. He would give them a rich reward, and take them to be with him forever. It would be sad indeed, if any one of them should be found neglecting his work and so miss the reward and blessing.

rowful and very heavy.

38 Then saith he unto them, My soul is exceeding sorrowful, even unto death: tarry ye here, and watch with me.

nevertheless not as I will, but as thou wilt, 40 And he cometh unto the disciples, and findeth them asleep, and saith unto Pe'ter, What, could ye not watch with me one hour?

41 Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.

42 He went away again the second time, and prayed, saying, O my Father, if this cup may not pass away from me, except I drink it, thy will be done.

43 And he came and found them asleep again: for their eyes were heavy.

44 And he left them, and went away again, and I rayed the third time, saying the same words.

45 Then cometh he to his disciples, and saith unto them, Sleep on now, and take your rest: behold, the hour is at hand, and the Son of man is betrayed into the hands of sinners.

46 Rise, let us be going: behold, he is at hand that doth betray me.

THE LESSON RETOLD

At the foot of the Mount of Olives, there was a beautiful garden called Gethsemane, and into this still and quiet place Jesus led His disciples after their last supper together. At the gate, He told the disciples to wait for Him, and taking only Peter and James and John, His closest and dearest friends, with Him, He went still further into the shade of the trees. Then He said to them, "My heart is very sad and sorrowful, and I must pray to My Father alone. So, do you stay here, and watch near me."

Then Jesus went a little way off by Himself, and fell upon the ground and began to pray to God to help Him. "Oh, My Father", He said, "if there is any way in which I can escape from the awful death of the cross, save Me from it; but do only what Thou knowest is best, not what I wish." Then Jesus went back to Peter and James and John, and found that, instead of watching with Him in His trouble, they had grown weary and had fallen fast asleep. Jesus wakened them, and gently reproved them for not being able to watch with Him for so short a time; and He warned them to pray and be careful, lest they should yield as easily when they were tempted to forget His teach-

Leaving them again, Jesus knelt to pray, and once more He ended His prayer by saying to His Father, "Thy will be done." Then He went back to His disciples and again found them asleep, so He returned the third time to ask God to be with Him in His trouble.

Jesus came again to His disciples the third time, and said, "Sleep on now and rest, you need not watch any longer, for those wicked men who are trying to take Me are very close at hand.

Just then, there came into the garden, a great crowd, armed with sticks and swords. Along with these, was a band of soldiers, to whom Judas had said, "The Man that I shall kiss is Jesus. Take Him, and bind Him fast." As soon as Judas saw Jesus, this wicked disciple, pretending that he was still His friend, went up and kissed Him, saying, "Hail, Master!" And the soldiers, knowing that this was Jesus, took hold of Him and led Him away. Al! the disciples, when they saw this were much afraid, and fled away, leaving Jesus alone in the hands of His enemies who were determined to kill Him.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The wicked men who took Jesus prisoner in the Garden, led Him away to the house of Caiaphas the high priest. There the scribes and elders and others, who had long hated Jesus, sat waiting to judge Him. All of Jesus' disciples had run away and left Him. But Peter returned, and followed the crowd a long distance off, to see what would happen to his Master.

Now, the scribes and other members of the council who were to judge Jesus, had gathered together some wicked men who said that Jesus had broken both God's laws and the laws of the land. But although these men told many untrue stories about Jesus, His judges could find in these no excuse for putting Him to death. At last came two men who both agreed that they had heard Jesus say that He could destroy the temple and build it up again in three days.

The words which Jesus had really used

meant quite a different thing, but these men had changed them to suit their cruel purpose. Jesus had meant the temple of His own body when He said, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up."

Then the high priest rose and said to Jesus, "Do you hear what these men say you have said? Why do you not deny it?" But Jesus did not answer a word. He knew that if He did deny saying such a thing, they would still punish Him on some other false charge.

Then the high priest was very angry, and said, "Tell us, then, and remember that God will punish you if you do not tell the truth, whether you are the Messiah?" Jesus answered, "I am indeed the Son of God, and some day you shall see Me sitting at His right hand, and coming down from heaven to judge the world."

Then the high priest tore his clothes as if he

were in great grief, and cried, "We do not need any more witnesses; He has said with His own lips that He is the Son of God. What shall be done to a man who pretends to be equal with God?" And all the council cried out, "He shall be put to death!" When the crowd of cruel, wicked men who were listening, heard this, they pushed Jesus about and beat Him, and even spat in His face, shouting out, "If you are really the Son of God, as you say that you are, tell us who it was that struck you."



THE LESSON RETOLD

Now, while Jesus and His disciples had been sitting together at their last supper, Jesus had told them that they would all run away from Him that night and leave Him to face His enemies alone. Peter had been specially distressed at hearing this. "Whatever other men do", he said, "I, Lord, will never leave Thee nor be untrue to Thee. I am quite ready to go to prison with Thee, or even to die for Thy sake."

But Jesus had only said sadly, "Peter, Peter, you have too much confidence in yourself. I tell you that, this very night, before the cock crows, thou shalt three times deny Me." And Peter had answered again still more confidently, "Though I should have to die for Thee, I will never deny Thee." And so they all said.

33 And when they were come unto a place called Gol'gotha, that is to say, a place of a skull,

47 Some of them that stood there, when they heard that, said, This man calleth for Eli'as, 48 And straightway one of them ran, and took a spunge, and filled it with vinegar, and

put it on a reed, and gave him to drink.
49 The rest said, Let be, let us see whether Eli'as will come to save him. 50 Je'sus, when he had cried again with a loud voice, yielded up the ghost.

THE LESSON RETOLD

At last Jesus' judges decided that He was to be crucified. The Roman soldiers hurried Him out of the city to a place called Golgotha, and there they nailed Him to the cross, driving cruel nails into His hands and feet. Along with Jesus, the soldiers crucified two other men. These were not like Jesus, who had never done any wrong; they were wicked robbers, who were being justly punished for their sins.

Over Jesus' cross the soldiers wrote, "THIS IS JESUS, THE KING OF THE JEWS." The crowd of people who stood round watching, mocked Him, crying, "You, who said you could destroy the temple and build it up again in three days, save Yourself. If you are really the Son of God, come down from the cross." The chief priests mocked with the others, and said, "He pretended He could save others. Let Him save Himself. and we will believe that He is the Son of God as He said." Even the two robbers who were crucified with Jesus, mocked Him.

Then suddenly, although it was only about noon, God made the whole land as dark as night, to show how angry He was with the people who had killed His Son.

In the midst of His sufferings Jesus cried

out, "Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani!' which meant in the language of the Jews, "My God, My God, why hast Thou forsaken Me! Some of those who stood near thought that Jesus was calling upon Elijah the prophet to help Him, and they mocked again, saying, "Let us see whether Elijah will come to save Him." But others we're kinder, and one of them filled a sponge with vinegar and held it up on a reed to Jesus to quench His terrible thirst. But when He had touched it, He cried out with a loud voice and died; and His spirit went up to God in heaven, although His body still hung upon the cross to which it had been fastened.

1 In the end of the sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mar'y Mag'dalene and the other Mar'y to see the sepulchre.

2 And, behold, there was a great earthquake: for the angel of the Lord descended from heaven, and came and rolled back the stone from the door, and sat upon it.

3 His countenance was like lightning, and his raiment white as snow:

4 And for fear of him the keepers did shake, and became as dead men.

5 And the angel answered and said unto the women Fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Je'sus, which was crucified.

6 He is not here: for he is risen, as he said. Come, see the place where the Lord lay.

7 And go quickly, and tell his disciples that he is risen from the dead; and, behold, he goeth before you into Gal'ilee; there shall ye see him: lo, I have told you.

8 And they departed quickly from the sepulchre with fear and great joy; and did run to bring his disciples word.

9 And as they went to tell his disciples, behold, Je'sus met them, saying, All hail

And they came and held him by the feet, and worshipped him.

10 Then said Je'sus unto them, Be not afraid: go tell my brethren that they go into Gal'ilee, and there shall they see me.

19 Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost:

20 Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. A'men.

THE LESSON RETOLD

After Jesus was dead, His friends came, and, with loving care, took His body down from the cross and carried it to a tomb or grave in a beautiful garden, in which no body had ever been laid before. In front of the cave, a great rock was rolled, and round the grave stood a guard of soldiers set there by the wicked men who had killed Jesus, because they said His friends would try to take His body away.

On the morning of the third day after Jesus' death, Mary Magdalene and another Mary, who both loved Jesus, came very early to the tomb, bringing some fresh linen and sweet perfumes to put round Jesus' body. And as they walked along, they wondered who would move away the stone for them. But God had already sent an angel, with glistening white garments and a bright shining face, to roll away the stone from the door. When

the soldiers who were guarding the tomb saw the angel, they were struck into a stupor, and did not know of anything that happened afterwards.

When the women saw the angel, they, too, were frightened. But he spoke kindly to them, saying, "Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus, but He is not here now—He has come to life again, as He said He would. Come and see the place where He was lying."

After the two Marys had seen that Jesus' body was no longer in the tomb, the angel said to them, "Go quickly, and tell Jesus' disciples that He has risen from the dead, and is going into Galilee. If they go thither, they shall see Him." The women were so glad and surprised to hear this, that they ran off quickly to tell their wonderful news. As they were running, they met Jesus Him-

self, and they fell at His feet and worshiped Him. Jesus said to them, as the angel had said, "Do not be afraid, but tell My disciples to go into Galilee, and there they shall see Me."

In the meantime the soldiers came and told the chief priests what had happened, and these men were so afraid that the people would now think that Jesus was really the Messiah, that they gave the soldiers a large sum of money to say that Jesus' disciples had come during the night and stolen His body away. The soldiers agreed to tell this false story, and it was commonly believed amongst the Jews, when Matthew wrote his Gospel.

The disciples were filled with joy when they received Jesus' message, and going into Galilee to the place appointed, they spoke once more with their beloved Master, face to face. There Jesus told them what He wanted them to do now that He was going back to heaven. They had learnt many beautiful lessons from Him, and all these things they were now to teach to others; not only to those in their own country, but even to those in far distant lands. His own power would help them, Jesus promised, and His Holy Spirit would be with them. Thus Jesus' own disciples became the first missionaries to tell others of His wonderful love.
