During the month of January two members of the Cathedral congregation have passed to their Eternal rest.

Mrs. Grayson Smith, daughter of Mr. E. M. Chadwick, after an illness of somewhat long continuance, died at her home, 173 Lowther Avenue, January 12th. She was one of our earliest members, and for about eleven years a regular attendant in the choir. Her unusual talents and ever ready help had made her invaluable to the congregation and community, by whom she was greatly beloved and esteemed. It will be difficult indeed to fill her place. The funeral service in the Church was largely attended, and was rendered most impressive by the sympathy and subdued grief of all, the music so reverent and touching, the beautiful hymns and scripture lessons that breathed forth the Christians' hope and joy in the Resurrection of the dead. An exquisite cross of white flowers given by the members of the choir was only one among a wealth of floral tributes sent by many friends from far and near. A brass tablet is to be placed in the Cathedral to her memory by her sorrowing husband.

On Sunday, 22nd, Mr. William Lewis Hunter, of 1 Olive Avenue, entered into rest, after long suffering, borne with exemplary patience and fortitude. His widow and five daughters mourn a devoted husband and father.

On January 4th, the Infant Class had their Christmas Tree and Entertainment in the Crypt. About one hundred little tots sat down to a bountiful tea, and when they had polished off the cakes, sandwiches, and other good things provided, a varied programme of songs and recitations followed, which proved highly entertaining to the little ones and their friends. The Christmas tree, laden with beautifully dressed dolls for the girls, and books and toys for the boys, was resplendent with tapers and bright ornaments, and formed a pretty climax to a very enjoyable evening. Miss Playter is to be congratulated on the success of her class, which numbers nearly one hundred members.

The following evening the older scholars of the Sunday School had their Entertainment, which consisted of instrumental music, songs, and recitations. After which came the main event of the evening, namely, the distribution of about sixty books, (many of them handsomely bound) as prizes to those attaining the standard number of marks in their respective classes. Canon Macnab addressed the large audience on the subject of Sunday School work, urging the parents to be more zealously interested in their children's S.S. lessons, and the teachers to give more time and study to the preparation of the same. He also complimented the children on their increased interest in the missionary work of the Church. The Sunday School offerings during the year amounted to over three hundred dollars, nearly half of which was given to Mission work amongst the Indians. In the list of Sunday School Missionary offerings St. Alban's Cathedral stands third in the Dominion, and second in the Diocese of Toronto.

On Thursday, 19th January, Mr. Matthews and the masters of the school entertained the boys of the school at a "feast" in the Crypt, followed by a pleasant evening's entertainment.

An interesting Lantern Lecture was on Monday, 23rd, given in the Crypt, by Canon Macnab, on the subject of "The Greatest City in the World." The Lecture was profusely illustrated with lime-light views of London, including many scenes in connection with the late Queen's Diamond Jubilee and the Coronation of King Edward. The Crypt was well filled with an appreciative audience, and the proceeds of the Lecture were handed over to the Altar Guild for the purchase of a much needed cabinet to hold the Communion Vessels and other articles appertaining to the Altar Service.

On Wednesday evening, February 1st, the Annual Choir Guild Concert was held in the Crypt, and proved an unqualified success. The audience was a very large and representative one, and every number on the programme was enthusiastically received. After the Concert, those who had taken part were hospitably entertained by the ladies of the Guild in the Choir room, where refreshments were provided. The proceeds of the Entertainment, amounting to about \$50, were in aid of the work of the Choir Guild.

It has been arranged that on February 27th the portrait of the Lord Bishop, now nearly finished, is to be presented to the Cathedral Chapter by the members of the Congregation. It is proposed to hold a general gathering of the Congregation in the Crypt on that evening, when the picture will be unveiled and officially presented. A cordial invitation is extended to every member of the Congregation to be present on this occasion. There are a number of members of the Congregation who have not yet contributed to the portrait fund. Those who desire to do so may send their contributions to Mr. Chadwick; or, if they prefer it, they will have an opportunity of doing so at the time of the presentation.

The Cathedral School Cadet Corps are arranging to have their annual entertainment on Thursday, 2nd March. Their concert last year was exceedingly well arranged and was carried out in a style which rather surprised the audience. As they should be able to do as well this year, we hope they will have a crowded assemblage. The object of this entertainment is to provide funds for the cost of equipping and keeping up the Corps, for which no means are otherwise provided. The boys acquitted themselves well during the past season and are deserving of encouragement.

About Christmas week some field mice got into the Cathedral, evidently seeking for comfortable winter quarters, disregarding the proverbial leaness of the Church mouse. They made their appearance in rather annoying manner during the Morning Service on New Year's Day, an incident which we have thought important enough to refer to only because it was the subject of an absurdly exaggerated paragraph in one of the daily newspapers. A couple of mousetraps disposed of three of them the same day, and three more, probably all there were, were caught within a day or two after. It is said that field mice have been very abundant in vacant lands about the city during the past season.
