**MOTHER OF NAVIES**

The Kaiser Got First Idea of C. Power From Old England

Strange though the assertion sounds, it is nevertheless literally true that the German navy is the child of the British navy.

There are people still living in Portsmouth who can recall seeing a little boy in a sailor suit, who, more than forty years ago, used to wander about the dockyard, looking at the ships there with eager curiosity and asking all sorts of questions concerning them.

This little boy was none other than the present German Emperor, who in those days was a frequent visitor to his grandmother, Queen Victoria, at Osborne. The then newly-created German Empire had at that time practically no fleet, and the child, old beyond his years, was frequently heard to lament this fact.

"When I grow up I will have ships built like these," he was once heard to remark, indicating, with a wave of his hand, the stately ironclads moving in and out of the harbor. "Mean while, as he himself has told us, he he talked ships by day and dreamed ships by night, while at home in Germany his favorite recreation was to sail a beautiful, twenty-ton model of a British frigate on the Havel lakes, near Potsdam.

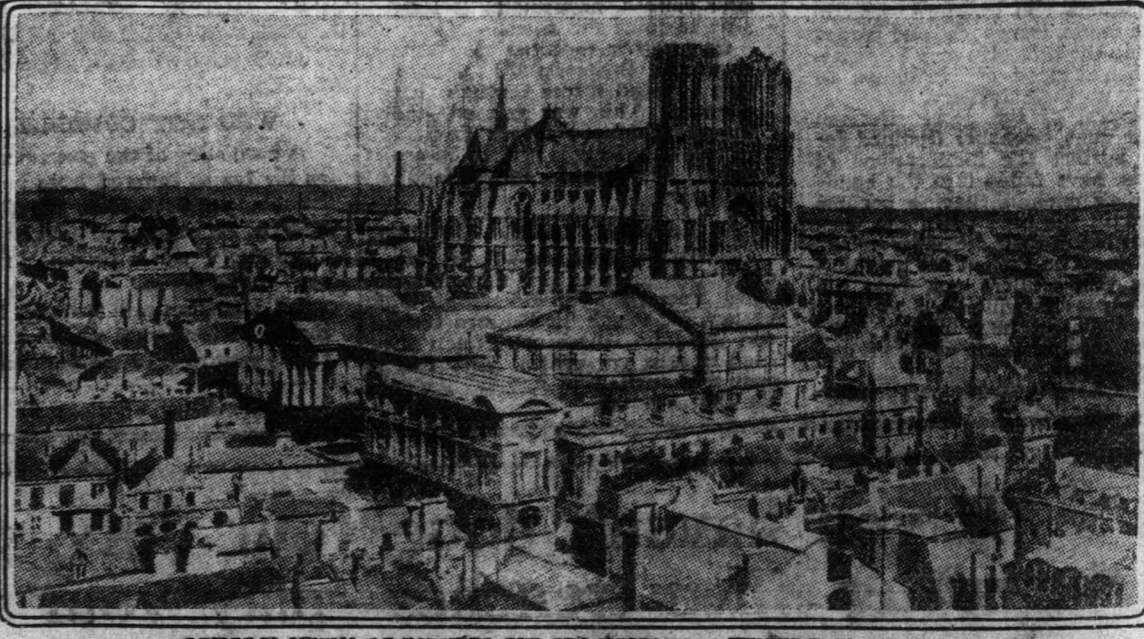

Lloyd Harris felt sure that when all was gathered in they would have all of their \$100,000. To date they had collected over \$51,000 and this was without the city council subscription, without the county subscription, without the result of the afternoon's work, and without the collection taken by the scouts and the theatre subscriptions of to-night. When all this was gathered in, he felt sure that the aim of the campaign would be realized. There was a big field in the country and as much as \$25,000 could be expected from the county residents, for there was a good city and many good workers among them. There was no reason why the fund should not reach the \$100,000 before it was closed.

Mr. C. H. Waterous said every one could be gathered in they upon their earnest effort. If residents of the Empire needed the financial aid of this Dominion it was today. It was our duty to do our very best to-day, and we must make our last rally. Mr. V. S. Brewer spoke briefly and said, Why not say with a heart that we were going to raise the whole of that \$100,000. And why not? He believed that the workers were not able to get at the workers sufficiently well or they would have added considerably to the funds. We, the workers left behind, should be like the old Biblical men who held up the arms of Moses so that the fight was in their favor. We should keep the hearts of the soldiers up by keeping up, as it were, the comforts of their wives at home. It was our duty to so look after them and turn the tide of the battle.

Mr. T. L. Wood said that on such an occasion it was a good thing for such a cosmopolitan gathering to get together for such a good cause. There was no doubt that the financial stringency accounted for shortened subscriptions, but he was willing to start an extra contribution among the workers themselves. He would do his share. There were a good many ladies who, if asked, would gladly give some amounts. As it was the last day, he would ask all to make their last stirring effort, and the was sure they would double up on what they had already done.

Mr. Lloyd Harris gave a few pointers on the day's proceedings, and asked that all men attend the theatres to-night, in order that they might make a good turn-in towards the funds of the campaign.

The Iron Chancellor kept at his command a time journalist known as Busch, who used to write articles on Bismarck's instructions and send them to the English papers for insertion. Busch, in his revelations, admits that frequently these articles were returned to him.

### RUSSIAN ADVANCE

... Fighting Against Austrians Lasted Over a Week.

By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Sept. 25.—The most fighting previous to the capture by the Russians of Jaroslavl, says the Reuter's Petrograd correspondent, "seems to have been at Sandovaya, and Vishaya lasted a week. The Austrians occupied the hills commanding several miles of open country and swept the advancing Russians with guns and quick fires. The Russians undauntedly pushed forward, however, and on the fifth day were able to bring their guns into action. Their artillery was speedily overpowered, and then came the bayonet fighting, in which the Russians were victorious. "In the enemy's trench were found wounded and dead who had been lying there for days. Prisoners taken in the battle said they had been for days without food, their only sustenance being wild raspberries and raw potatoes. "Owing to the stoppage of the newspapers in consequence of a shortage of paper, news concerning the war is being communicated to the people of Lublin by written letters."

### BUSY AT NIGHTS

Searchlights and Sarapnel Continue to Play Over British.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Sept. 25.—The Daily News correspondent in France telegraphs as follows: "Nightly the Germans rake the landscape with searchlights and shrapnel while the French and British working in darkness and mystery muffle even the headlights of the staff officers' motor cars. "Recently a wireless message from German reinforcements coming through Belgium was intercepted by the British. It showed a new German army approaching, exhausted by long marches and little food, which feared it would be cut off by the French hurrying along from the west."

### FIVE AEROPLANES

Were Captured From the Enemy by French Cavalry Patrol.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Sept. 25.—The correspondent of the Daily Telegraph in France says: "There is considerable elation in the allies lines over the capture of five German aeroplanes by a French cavalry patrol. "Twenty cavalry men, penetrating into a thickly wooded country, entered a clearing where the five aeroplanes were parked. The aviators and a number of mechanics at the time, were engaged in overhauling five Taub aeroplanes. The patrol made a dash to round them up, but met with a fierce resistance and twelve cavalymen were killed before the airmen were beaten. Their aeroplanes will never fly again."

### TIMES' CRITICISM

Officers Are Needed in British Army to Fill Gaps.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Sept. 25.—The military correspondent of The Times writes to-day as follows: "An army cannot be improvised at a moment's notice and instances in which immature provisions made in the past have been lamentable failures, are given. The question of officers is a serious one. An examination of our casualty lists shows we have lost already over eleven hundred officers in killed, wounded or missing. This is two out of every five among those at the front. "More officers is the constant cry from the front, and several hundred have been sent, but obviously this cannot be kept up forever, and each officer sent is one less instructor for the new recruits. We must not allow ourselves to become megalomaniacs and place in the field regiments which are unfit to defend the honor of our armies."

### FAST CRUISER STILL AT LARGE DOWN SOUTH

Kronprinz Wilhelm Turns Up by Sinking a British Merchantman.

[By Special Wire to the Courier] RIO JANEIRO, Sept. 25.—(via London).—The German steamer Prinsessa has arrived at Santos and landed the master and fifteen men of the British steamer Indian Prince which was sunk by the German auxiliary cruiser Kronprinz Wilhelm.

### PRISONER RECAPTURED

MONTEPELLIER (Via Bordeaux) Sept. 25.—A German prisoner who escaped at the beginning of the month, was recaptured to-day by a sergeant to whom he declared that he had lived in the open air for twenty days, subsisting on raisins and raw snails.

### ACTIVITY IN PAPER BOX BUSINESS INDICATES INCREASED ACTIVITY IN OTHER INDUSTRIES

The paper box business is a good barometer of business conditions generally because it quickly feels any marked increase or falling off in the shipping orders of the many articles that are packed in paper boxes. It is, therefore, most encouraging to learn that the paper box manufacturers throughout the country are experiencing increased activity since the war began. The Rudd Paper Box Company, for example, has increased its staff about 20 per cent since the breaking out of hostilities, and in addition the employees in some departments are working overtime several nights a week. This company reports that the orders from manufacturers since the war began show a decided increase over the run during the previous six months. One customer, a manufacturer of a food product, has more than doubled his standing order of 200,000 boxes a month. Another customer has ordered 65,000 canisters as a three months' supply instead of his regular order of 7,500 canisters a month. Still another customer has placed an initial order of 50,000 boxes for a Made-in-Canada article that is to replace a similar article that is imported from Germany before the war began. The significant and encouraging fact in connection with the increased activities in the plants of the Rudd Paper Box Company, Limited, and other paper box manufacturers is not so much the increased activity in those plants in itself, as the great increase in the packing and shipping of orders by manufacturers generally that is indicated by the increased demand for paper boxes.

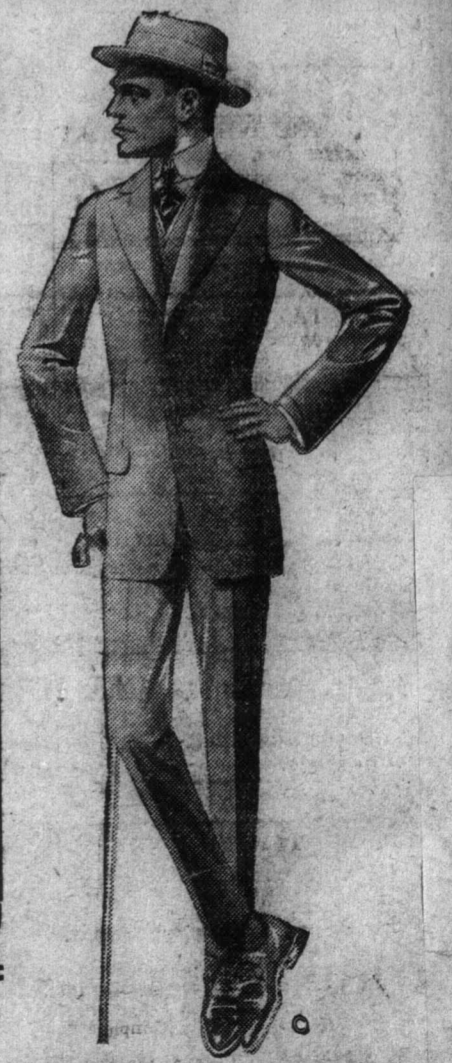
