

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or an male over 18 years old, may horse stead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewas or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (out not Sub-Agency,) on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live with nine miles of his homestead or a farm o at least 80 acres, on certain conditions A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$4.00 per acre.

Duties—Sirs months residence in of three year after earning homest atent; also 50 acres extra cultivat re-emption patent may be obtained on as homestead patent, on cerumdities.
