Canadian Patriotic Fund for Kings County

MEETING OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

A meeting of the Executive of the Campaign Committee of the Kings County Patriotic Fund was held at Kentville last week with Mr. W. H. Chase in the chair, others present were: Mr. J. E. Hales, Mr. Wm. Regan, Mr. Rand, Wolfville; C. A. Campbell, Port Williams; Mr. Barclay Webster, A. E. Calkin, Rev. T. C. Mellor, Wm. McBride, E. B. Newcombe, Peter Innes, R. T. Caldwell, G. C. Roy.

The report of the Treasurer showed cash subscriptions received of \$9532.90 against which the amount aimed at was \$9,000. The expenses were \$39.68. Collections by wards are shown below and there are still about \$150 subscriptions unpaid.

The matter of this year's contribution was discussed, The County Council have voted \$20,000 towards the Fund and the Towns of Kentville and Wolfville will be called upon to contribute. It was thought that a portion of each Town's subscription might be contributed by voluntary giving, but that the larger share would have to be raised by taxation. The amount that each town should be asked to raise was also discussed but the question was left open until a future meeting.

"Buy At Home" is the Slogan Campaign Extended to Kentville

If the mail order houses of Upper Canada notice a phenomenal falling off in orders from Kentville in the next few months they will have to blame the "BUY-AT-HOME" Campaign which is to be started in this town within a few days. The fight is about to be launched. It is true that it is somewhat late but it will be even more strenuous than if waged at an earlier period.

The mail-order firms have had things too easy in the past. The local merchant, like the British Bull Dog, requires a lot to arouse him but when he gets started, there is trouble ahead for some one.

The "BUY AT HOME" Campaign is a co-operative effort on the part of the business interest of the community to encourage buying at home. Keep your money in circulation at home, is the object and through the local press appeals will be made to the people to give the home merchant the preference.

The Campaign is being started simultaneously in the leading towns and cities of the Province, a group of progressive merchants in each community are backing the scheme, and since it was announced in Kentville some weeks ago, that such a contract was to take place, much interest has been

manifested, and there is no question but that the movement will be a big success.

We have before us copies of several of the 'BUY-AT-HOME' articles, and must say that they are of an intensely human interest and should make the public realize that its first duty is to the home merchants. A particularly striking paragraph in one of these articles is as follows:

"Let us suppose you are a farmer. You sell your produce in and about your town; you cannot sell it in Montreal or Toronto, and therefore anything that makes the people of your town wealthier or more prosperous naturally means more business for you. Is it fair or just that you take this money that you earn in your home town and send it away for goods that you know can be purchased just as satisfactorily from your best friend—the local merchant?"

And what is true of the farmer is true of you, Mr. Clergyman, of you, Mr. Carpenter, of you, Madam, and you, and you. The management of the "BUY-AT-HOME" Campaign received the following flattering letter from a country merchant:

"I wish to congratulate you upon your articles upon 'buying at home.' They certainly strike the right key and I hope they may prove successful both to yourself and in assisting the object aimed at. This is the kind of publicity and sort of patriotism that I have always felt this county and especially this town needs to bring it to sound and genuine prosperity."



Since the beginning of the war, one third of the Armenian race has been massacred or died from starvation and disease, and one half of those remaining are homeless and dying of starvation and exposure.

The American schooner Jno. G. McCulloch was captured by the British in attempting to run the blockade. The vessel was taken to Falmouth and will be put in the prize court. This is the way a civilized nation acts with blockade runners.

Spanish steamer Infanta Isabel, upon which the American Ambassador to Germany, Gerard, is a passenger, sailed from Corunna Spain, on Tuesday last for Havana, Cuba, and passed Cape Finisterre at 8.30 p. m., on Wednesday—well out of the danger zone. They should reach Havana on the 9th, of March. The steamer is filled to passenger capacity, having 750 in the s.e.rage. William H. Gale, U. S. Consul-General at Munich, obtained passage with difficulty on board the steamer.

Br Barkt. Ethel Clarke, from Annapolis, N. S., for Havana, which put into St. Thomas, Jan. 1st, partially dismantled and leaking badly, after discharging her cargo, was condemned by surveyors of the British Consul. She was sold at Public Auction February 3rd, and bought by her captain, D. Morrisey, for \$3,550.

Major Heberg, the U. S. military attache at Rome, was killed on Friday by a fall from a horse on the Italian front, while on observation duty.

Bridgetown Monitor—Mrs. Fred H. Johnson had the misfortune last Thursday evening to slip and fall on the ice just outside the door of her home, resulting in the fracture of her left arm, a dislocated wrist, and other injuries.

The open season for rabbits closed on March 1st; also for the following birds:—black duck, commonly called blue wing; harlequin duck, commonly called lords and ladies; golden eye, commonly called whisker; scaup duck; or lesser scaup duck, commonly called blue-bill.

"IT MIGHT HAVE BEEN"

A prominent naval critic writing in the London Chronicle, newspaper regarded as the mouthpiece of the British Liberals and one of the strongest supporters of the Government, in a discussion of the naval battle of Jutland, said:

"Sir David Beatty could have overwhelmed the enemy if Britain could have given him three or four more battle cruisers than were assigned to his command."

Dr. Edwards, M. P., discussing this in the House said:

"Had Sir David Beatty had three or four more battleships, he could have smashed obliterated the German fleet. And whose fault is it that he did not have these battleships? The blame is not to be laid at the door of hon. gentlemen on this side. We voted the money; we were willing to spend \$35,000,000 in supply three battle cruisers to strengthen the navy. But opposition came from the leader of the other side of the House, and the Bill was defeated by his partisan Senate at his command. The responsibility lies at his door."

THE RUM RATION

A great deal of talk is being given utterance to by individuals and by some ministerial and temperance associations with respect to the issue of rum rations to soldiers at the front. Some of them allege that soldiers are compelled to take it and it is even hinted that it is served to them only when going into action. The fact is that rum is issued to the troops only at the discretion of the General Officers Commanding, on the recommendation of the Medical Officers, and that, when an issue of rum is ordered for troops serving with the expeditionary forces in the field, individual soldiers who have any objection to the spirit may be supplied with cocoa or chocolate in lieu thereof.

THE sole head of a family, or an male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take expurchased homestead in certain districts \$3.00 per acre.

The act of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land.
