



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

Falcon Island was found to be in two distinct parts. There is first what appears to be the remains of a wide-based, conical hill, with sides sloping at a gentle angle of six degrees, and presenting one abrupt cliff-like end to the sea. This part of the island is a symmetrical oval, and its greatest height above the sea about one hundred and fifty feet. The other part is a plain, spreading away from the base of the hill to the north, and about ten or twelve feet above high-water level.

Last year the island presented the general appearance of a bare heap of brown ashes, but the structure could be perceived in the cliff section. There was a distinct large. 


