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We do not think it necessary to apologise to our readers for the space devoted to the Hon. Mr. Sullivan's Budget Speech. Mr. Sullivan's exposure of the system of covering up adopted from the first by the Davies Government was relentless, but it was just, and it was truthful. For example, in 1878 the Davies administration carried over the large sum of \$600,000 to 1879 in order to slow the expenditure was less by that sum for the year. The sitting of the Local Legislature, which commenced on Wednesday last, has attracted much public interest, and on Thursday, with the usual intermission at six o'clock only. It was a clear case of obstruction which the Opposition entered into, less from a love of the thing than from an exhibition of important spirit against the Government. We quote with the *Examiner* that such obstruction was stupid and puerile. There was reason for the obstruction of the Parliament, but not in the Imperial Parliament which included in our Island rights. It is really a disgrace to the Province.

It is a matter of common knowledge in the Province that the priests, who on the 13th inst. were paraded in the streets of St. John's, had far surpassed all previous parades, and the result of it is to the public a most interesting and instructive lesson. The object of the parade was to show the public that the priests are not only the most respectable members of the community, but that they are also the most patriotic. The parade was a success in every respect, and it is to be hoped that it will be repeated in the future.

Hon. Mr. Blake on Orange Incorporation.

We are not always inclined to agree with the opinions of the Hon. Mr. Blake, but we feel very strongly that we cannot help admiring that on the great questions of the day, those opinions are enunciated in a clear, logical and humane manner. There are two sides to every question, it is well known to all, but we are not inclined to agree with the Hon. Mr. Blake's opinion that the incorporation is a necessary evil.

Who are the Conspirators?

The Ontario conspiracy case has passed through the first stage, and the conspirators, so called, have been fully committed for trial. Without considering the innocence or guilt of the prisoners, it must be admitted that Colonel Denison, the police magistrate before whom the preliminary investigation was held, displayed an eager solicitude in what he thought the interests of the Ontario Government. Not only did he do what they desired, but he was so anxious to anticipate their wishes as to leave himself open to the charge of being a partisan. Col. Denison is a Grit, but it does not follow from this—at least it should not—that he is a partisan. That was all very well before he was placed on the bench, once there he should ignore party, he returned back to the prisoners without hesitation, and it was in spite of him that was granted by the judge at Osgoode Hall. He sided with the prosecution on every point, and in a word, he showed himself more of a Grit politician than an impartial magistrate. The result is that Messrs. McKee, Bunting, Wilkinson and Kirkland have been remanded for trial, and thus far the Ontario Government has triumphed.

There were two ladies among the Southern arrivals. The Northern Light reached Georgetown yesterday afternoon, and will leave on return trip to-morrow morning.

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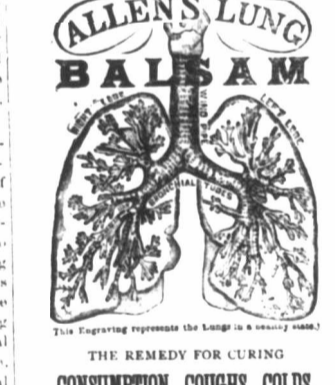
