### Cold Storage

#### Agreement.

In the House of Assembly yesterday the Premier tabled Resolutions to be submitted to a Committee of the Whole House on the Subject of an agreement with two Portland fish merchants to erect Cold Storage and other plants in the Colony. The object of the resolutions is to obtain legislative sanction for the agreement.

The substance of the agreement is as follows:  
Two fish merchants of Portland, Maine, U. S., Messrs. Charles Newell Trefethen and Joseph Walker Lord agree, (1) to erect and operate five cold storage plants, at the rate of one a year, each having a capacity not less than one million pounds, and to operate them for 25 years. For one stationary plant, they may however substitute a floating plant.

The Government agrees to give a subsidy for fifteen years, calculated at the rate of 1 1/2 per cent per annum on cash spent in original construction and equipment, provided that the interest shall not be payable on more than half a million dollars. The Government agrees also to guarantee for fifteen years a net profit of five per cent, on each actually invested on Cold Storage plant up to half a million dollars. In other words the Government stands any bonafide loss

on a year's operations and the dividend of five per cent, in such cases. If there was a bona fide net loss in any year of 5 per cent, in such capital as is referred to, the Government would be called upon to pay 70 per cent or \$50,000 from the agreement.

A proviso of the nature of such payment not to exceed a sum equal to five per cent, on such capital expenditure, and in no case to exceed the sum of \$1,000,000 in any one year—is conspicuously absent from this agreement, although a like proviso appears in the 1904 agreement.

In addition Messrs. Trefethen and Lord agree to erect five smoke houses, five packing factories for fish and fish products, two glue factories and two fertilizer plants.

On these latter they receive neither subsidy nor guarantees.  
But for all the plants they are to (1) free sites, (2) free timber areas to supply lumber for boxes, barrels etc., and (3) free water power for operating and lighting the plants.

And in addition Free Entry for—  
(1) All plant, machinery, implements, apparatus and material necessary for the original installation of the said Cold Storage plants, smoke houses and factories and for the extension of same, but not in substitution for old.  
(2) Ammonia for refrigerating purposes.  
(3) Vegetable Oils for use in canning fish.  
(4) Tin Metal for cans and solder.  
(5) Gasolene Engines.  
(6) Gasolene.  
(7) Printed and Lithographed Labels.  
(8) Mineral and Lubricating Oils for machinery.

### Abruzzi's Story.

The Young Eskimo Who Loved a Beautiful Maiden.

The Duke of Abruzzi is one of the most successful of living explorers, in which capacity he has had a fair share of adventures and hair-breadth escapes. During his North Pole expedition he had his right hand so severely frozen that two of his fingers had to be partially amputated. Another time during an ascent of the Ruwenzori range, as the Duke was making an observation in advance of his party, he slipped on a bank of loose stones and fell to the edge of an immense precipice, where he remained a prisoner for three hours. The Duke has picked up many interesting stories in the course of his various travels. Here is one of them, which he heard in the far North. A young Eskimo loved a beautiful maiden whose father's hut was near his own, but as in so often the case, the girl's parents would not hear of the match. One night a great storm ripped up a crevice in the ice, and between the two huts there yawned an abyss bridged only by a slender strip of ice. Here was the chance which the young lover sought. He crossed the frail bridge in the dead of night, and crept to the home of his sweetheart to steal her from her cruel father. The Eskimos sleep in bags of sealskin, and, with bated breath and loudly beating heart, he hoisted on to his back the one in which he thought his lady-love slumbered. He recrossed the strip of ice, and, safe of the other side, he broke it down with the blow of an axe, so that no one could pursue him save by the aid of a boat. Regaining his own hut he opened the bag to gaze upon the fair one, when, with a cry of horror, he staggered back dumbfounded, for, in his haste to get the affair over, he had stolen his sweetheart's father by mistake.

## Holiday Notes for 1910.

**Chapter VI.—At Cupids Beach and Brigus Station.**

At our next outing the train dropped us off at Cupid's Crossing, near Brigus Station, and for an hour or so we took in the historic spots of that place. For what we gleaned we are indebted to Mr. Serriek, the popular school teacher of that town. Mr. Serriek came with us and pointed out all the localities that would become prominent in the Guy Celebration a little later on.

Among many he showed us the supposed site of Guy's plantation, and the proposed site of the monument to be erected in his memory. The steel signal tower was also pointed out, and the square concrete base upon which it stands was carefully examined. This tower was made in Toronto, and was presented by several young men of Cupids who had made their homes in the Queen City of the West. It one hundred and thirty-five feet high and is a substantial piece of mechanism.

All these features were very interesting indeed and tended to deepen the attractions of the place to us, for the time being at least. But of all Mr. Serriek showed us, the most interesting of the lot was the beach which crosses the head of the harbor at an angle. This beach was once the scene of busy men, and much trade was conducted upon it, and vessels were there loaded with fish and oil for the foreign markets. Several square rigged vessels were built on this same beach, and quite a lot of employment was given thereby to car-

shipbuilding was carried on. The action of the tide has considerably altered these landmarks, and only a vestige of what has been can now be traced. A few pieces of stone wall, and here and there a protruding post remind the visitor of prior occupation. On the beach and near the shore lie the hulks of two vessels. These ships had their day, and now like most of the men who sailed them, they are out of date.

Cupids offers to become a health resort at an early date, and for quiet and sea breeze it is unexcelled. It is only fifteen minutes' drive from Brigus Station, and only three hours' run from the capital. We do not know what effect the Guy Celebration may have had in this direction, but from what we hear it will certainly stir the ball rolling. Some of the larger homebodies would make fine hotels and if once established a good deal of catering should be done.

At early morn we left Cupids and took the road for Brigus Station. All seemed quiet, and only a few people were about. While waiting for the train we saw a building quite nearby with the sign of "The Hue Mattress Office" hanging from it. Wishing to learn a little of this establishment we went near and ventured inside the building. But it being early, the staff had not arrived, and those who were there did not seem to manifest any interest in strangers, other than to treat them with silence. After we had regained the street we were fortunate enough to meet Mr. Scaplin whom we found very obliging, and who made up for what we had failed to elicit from his workmen. Mr. Scaplin is in full charge of the factory, and we have no doubt that between him and Mr. Hue the venture will prove a success.

It is gratifying to see new industries cropping up throughout the country, and the more enterprise we have the better for all concerned. Brigus has lost much of its former greatness, and fully half its people have migrated to British Columbia; but we hope the hum has been reached and that our people will soon be able to find in their own country that which they have gone so far to obtain.

BALTIMORE, Feb. 11.  
Anticipating the production of a resolution in Congress for America to enter into an alliance with Britain, the national executive of the Ancient Order of Hibernians at the annual meeting yesterday, unanimously adopted resolutions calling upon every Irishman in the country to protest against such alliance with Britain or any other Power. In this action they are co-operating with the German-Americans in this country, who have gone on record against any alliance of the United States with European countries.

Russia is moving troops in great masses upon the northern and western frontiers of Manchuria.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Feb. 10.  
James J. Hill, the railway magnate, in an address delivered here, admitted that he had advocated reciprocity with Canada but denied that he put up any money to push the agreement through. "Now is the time to get the measure through," said Hill, "as Imperial Federation may forestall any future movement. If action is taken now, it will mean a terrific expansion of the entire western portion of America."

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.  
Unless relieved two million people in China will die of starvation. This calamity is predicted by American Consul-General Wilder at Shanghai. In a cablegram to the Red Cross Society, he says that hunger in the famine districts are horrifying. Children are given away. The dead are lying by the roadside, and the sufferings of the people are increased by the severe cold and snow.

LONDON, Feb. 10.  
Lord Charles Bessborough, 65 years old to-day, by wife for the age limit clause, retired from the active list of the British Navy. He has held no appointment since his surrender, on March 24th, 1909, of the command of the Channel fleet. There was no official formalities, but most of the papers took the occasion to eulogize the Admiral's notable career. The Radical press criticizes his political activities.

## Shannahan and Tucker

### ON PROSPERITY AND THE RAINY DAY.

"What do you say," says Tucker, "if we start out one of these fine days and look for that thing called Prosperity that we hear so much about?"

"Ye'd never find it," says Delaney, "not even with a microscope, for I've been searching for it for quite a while, but I'm no handier at finding it now than when I started."

"'Tis a wonder," says Mrs. Tucker, "that old men don't get a grain of sense when they get old. Why ye'd swear ye were new-comers in town. 'Tis only newspaper men and politicians that play that old tin-kettle tune of Prosperity to tell the people; but let them open their peepers and they'll find thousands in this town half starving."

"Well," says Tucker, "I know things ain't blooming, but still I am of the opinion that you are overdwelling the picture. Of course, you are. Everybody who has enough to eat, a well filled pipe and an extra bucket of coal thinks everyone else is all right; but they don't go out and make enquiries and find out for themselves. Look at the number of families that were relieved at Christmas by the S. A. people. Do you think these people are any better off to-day? What prosperous wave has struck the town since they received at Xmas last year?"

"Why," says Delaney, "the Government has about Three Hundred Thousand Dollars down in the chest that they collected last year which they couldn't get clear of, and what's the matter with a 'bureau of information' being started where, people who are in need might report their condition, and let the Government get down to a business-like way of relieving these people who are in distress."

"You're right," says the Cute Man, "tis no use for the Governor to come out and visit one case, and for us all to kick up a fuss over it, as if 'twas the only one we had in the country. We have lots of such cases right here in this very town, and the sooner we have relief the better. Why, if there is any relief wanted in an outport the Government is ready to send steamers right off with assistance. Then why not fire some of it around the city? Why, many of the hard-up cases we have around here are from people who formerly belonged to an outport, and therefore there's no real fear of the outports kicking if the Government spends a few thousand in relief."

"Why, man alive," says Tucker, "what are you talking about? Ain't the money our own. Sure ain't I telling you, that the Government received about \$350,000 or \$400,000 last year that they hold in Reserve for the 'Rainy Day.' Well, you with a family of five paid into the chest in duties ten dollars more than was required to run the machinery of the country. Do you see now? Well, that's supposed to be put away for the 'Rainy Day.' You see they'd be afraid you might spend it yourself if you were holding it on, so they made you hand it over to Mr. Cashin to hold on for you. Very well. Now with many a family in this city the 'Rainy Day' has come; they are up against a blizzard, good and hard, and now is the time to give them a lift. Start the 'Bureau of Information,' get a list of all the deserving cases and then let the Minister of Finance hand out the ten dollars which the poor man gave him to 'hold' when he was in the sunshine of prosperity. What better use can a Government put a surplus to than to assisting its own people in time of need? We seem to get excited when we get surpluses. They burn our

pockets as it were; we generally get clear of them by erecting piles of brick and mortar; let us have a change; let us help our fellowmen and women over a hard old time winter. But let us do it in a business like way and have no slashers on the job who'll waste more than they'll dole out judiciously.

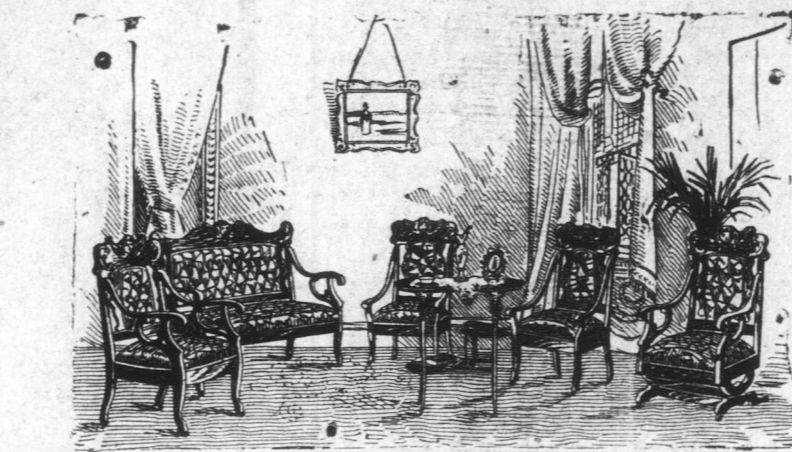

There was a lively time on the play-off. At the end of eight minutes Tobin, of the Victorias, secured the goal that decided the victory.

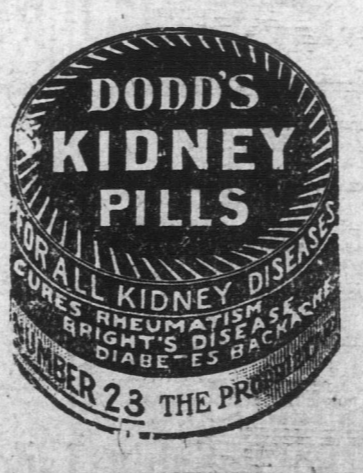

### A Remarkable Test!

Locally Made  
By Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.

Both these pieces of wood are to be seen at our Office by those interested in the preservation of Wharf Piles or any other wood work.
