He received the ordinary Indian, school education. He was never connected with the University of Madras; he has never passed any examination of any kind whatever. Until a little more than a year ago he was a clerk in the employment of the Port Trust of Madras. "His mathematical education is rather a mystery, and he is not learned in any other subject. The first I knew of him was about fifteen months ago. He wrote to me explaining who he was, and sent a large number of mathematical theorems which he had proved. There were a great many very remarkable results. His theorems were all in pure mathematics. particularly in the theory of numbers and the theory of elliptic functions.
