AT VICTORIA HALL. The patriotic meeting, held under he auspices of Leeming Lodge, L. O. A., at Victoria Hall last night, was fairly well- attended. Hon. R. A. Squires, P. G. M., presided, and the peakers were Messrs. W. F. Lloyd and G. W. Gushue.

For over an hour Mr. Lloyd enterained his audience with a graphic description of the war situation. Quoting from Bernardhi, Herr Harden, and other writers he clearly showed that the struggle in which the Empire is involved is one of defence against deliberate and well planned aggression.

In concluding his remarks he paid a special tribute to the women of Newfoundland who have done such noble work in providing clothing and comforts for our soldiers and sailors. Mr. G. W. Gushue followed with a short but forceful address on the Union Jack, at the close of which he quoted Harold Begbie's inspiring poem, "Handing Down." A hearty vote of thanks was accord-

ed the speakers, and tendered by the Chairman, after which the National Anthem was sung.

#### **Interned** Germans

#### REMOVED TO HR. GRACE JAIL.

Within the past week H. M. Penitentiary has been filled with prisoners, every cell being occupied, and as a consequence the officials in charge have been heavily pressed. In order to relieve the congestion it was decided to transfer some of the prisoners of war to Harbor Grace jail, and last evening six Germans, in charge of Sergt. Mackey, Detective Tobin and four constables, were taken from the city prison to the railway station and left by the 6 o'clock train for the Bay Metropolis, where they will be detained until the end of the war. As the German prisoners marched through the streets last evening they were the subject of much attention.

The ice was too much packed him to proceed further south in search, but he kept his whistle blow ing till 8 o'clock. He did not send any wireless to any other ship that night or on Wednesday about the Newfoundland's men, nor did he search for them on Wednesday. 


