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

More than four thousand churches, chapels, vestries, and clerical houses were destroyed, most of them simply through hatred and for no military purpose whatever -in other words, unnecessarily. Another thousand were reduced to ruins. The ancient and lovely vessels, vestments, laces and linens, objects essential to or associated with public worship in these churches, were either destroyed or stolen and carried off to Germany. In the diocese of Amiens 212 churches were completely destroyed; in that of Arras, 220; in Chalons St. John's, Newfoundland, sur Marne, 30; in Soissons. 305; in Rheims, 100, and in Verdun, 150.
