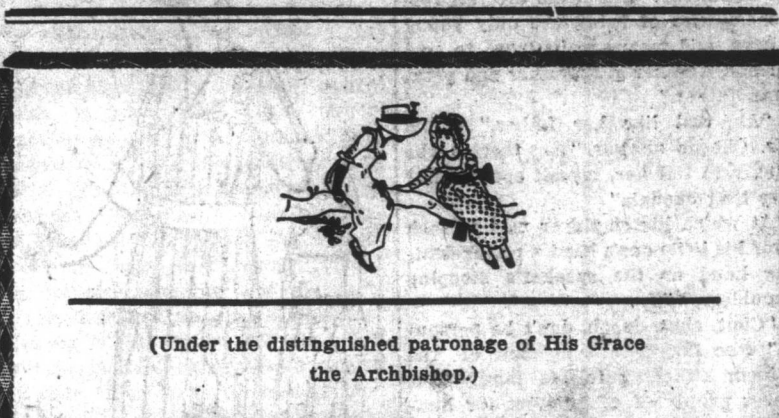

Smuts Declares Irish Problem Can be Solved.

Liverpool Welcomes Prince of Wales--Britain Suffers Incalculable Loss Through Coal Strike.

IRISH PROBLEM SOLUBLE.
LONDON, July 6.

General Jan Christian Smuts, who has just returned from a visit to Ireland publicly expressed his opinion to-day that the Irish problem is a solvable problem. This statement was greeted with loud applause by the distinguished company which attended a dinner given in honour of the General by the South African Colony in London. The South African Premier opened his speech by declaring that he had not abandoned hope of the United States. She is a shy maiden, and must be wooed too warmly, he said. I want to see the United States pull with us in the great world service that to-day is being rendered by the British Empire almost alone. Then alluding humorously to his visit to Ireland he declared he found the people divided into two classes, those in jail, and those on the run.

THE PRINCE AT LIVERPOOL.
LIVERPOOL, July 6.
A remarkable feature of the visit of the Prince of Wales to Liverpool to-day was the display in many streets in the Irish quarter of Sinn Fein flags intertwined with Union Jacks. A prominent Sinn Feiner, questioned as to whether any significance was to be at-

tached to this, replied "all I can say is that the order to do this came from Dublin."

THOMAS SUSTAINED.

LONDON, July 6.
The necessity of recognizing the difference between the political and industrial sides to disputes was frankly recognized by J. H. Thomas, leader of the railway men, at the annual conference of their body to-day. He admitted that the railway wage bill now amounted to £187,000,000 sterling against £50,000,000 in 1914. In August the British railways revert to old conditions, and Mr. Thomas acknowledged that it would be impossible for the companies to pay dividends, or even pre-war wages. He therefore declared it to be a vital necessity to pass a bill for grouping working on railways, which would mean an immense saving in working. Mr. Thomas scouted the notion that seconrol of railways had brought about the danger of strike, pointing out that seventeen millions sterling had already come off the wage bill, without provoking the slightest sign of trouble. The conference had acrimonious discussion privately concerning the actions of Mr. Thomas during the last twelve months, particularly his share in calling off the

Triple Alliance strike. He was severely criticised by extremists but the resolution that he be removed from Supreme headship was defeated.

THE WAR CRIMINAL TRIALS.

LEIPZIG, July 6.
Lieut. General Karl Stenger, charged by the French Government with having ordered troops under his command to take no prisoners and kill wounded men during the fighting of August 1914, was acquitted to-day by the German Supreme Court here, engaged in the trial of cases against alleged criminals. Major Bruno Crumins tried on a similar charge was given sentence of two years in prison and forbidden to wear German uniform.

SENATE AND NAVAL BILL.

WASHINGTON, July 6.
Refusing to accept the House action in reducing some appropriations in the naval bill the Senate to-day returned the measure to conference. There was no dispute over the Borah Amendment, authorizing and requesting the President to call representatives of Great Britain and Japanese to a naval disarmament conference. The Senate's action to-day finally assured retention of the Borah Order.

KIDNAPPING AT CORK.

CORK, July 6.
Patrick Brady, who witnessed the killing of Canon Magner, Parish Priest of Dunanny in December last by Cadet Hart, was kidnapped to-day by unknown armed men. A magistrate was taken from his residence in Bally Licksey, West Cork.

SILESIAN DISORDERS.

BERLIN, July 6.
Recent disorders in Buethen, Upper Silesia, in which the French Major Montallieres, and four Germans and one girl were killed, are asserted in a special despatch from Oppeln to the Vossische Zeitung here to-day, to have been planned deliberately by Polish insurgents who used French rifles. The despatch declares that the post mortem disclosed that the Major was killed by a rifle bullet, and that the Germans in Buethen possessed revolvers only. The Poles planned to impede the French and British in their endeavour to clear out the insurgents, according to the despatch. Reports from German sources state that the Polish insurgents are resuming their activities in Hindenburg, Biscupitz, Sosnowitz and a number of industrial towns. Communication with Buethen now is cut off, but last reports received were to the effect that the French used bayonets and clubs to clear the streets and establish order.

PEER'S RESIDENCE BURNED.

DUBLIN, July 6.
The residence of Lord Muskerry, Springfield Castle, at Drumcollegher, County Limerick, was burned on Monday night.

THREE STRIKES IN FOUR YEARS.

DAYTON, July 6.
Dayton to-day was held in the grip of its third street car strike in four years. Employees of five of the six city traction companies voted unanimously at three o'clock this morning to strike, effective at once. Employees claim that the companies have violated their agreement by announcing a new maximum wage of forty-five cents an hour without arbitration.

BALFOUR OF BURLIEGH DEAD.

LONDON, July 6.
Lord Balfour of Burielgh died to-day. Lord Balfour was born in 1849. He was chairman of the Royal Commission on closer trade relations between Canada and the West Indies in 1910, spending considerable time in both these countries.

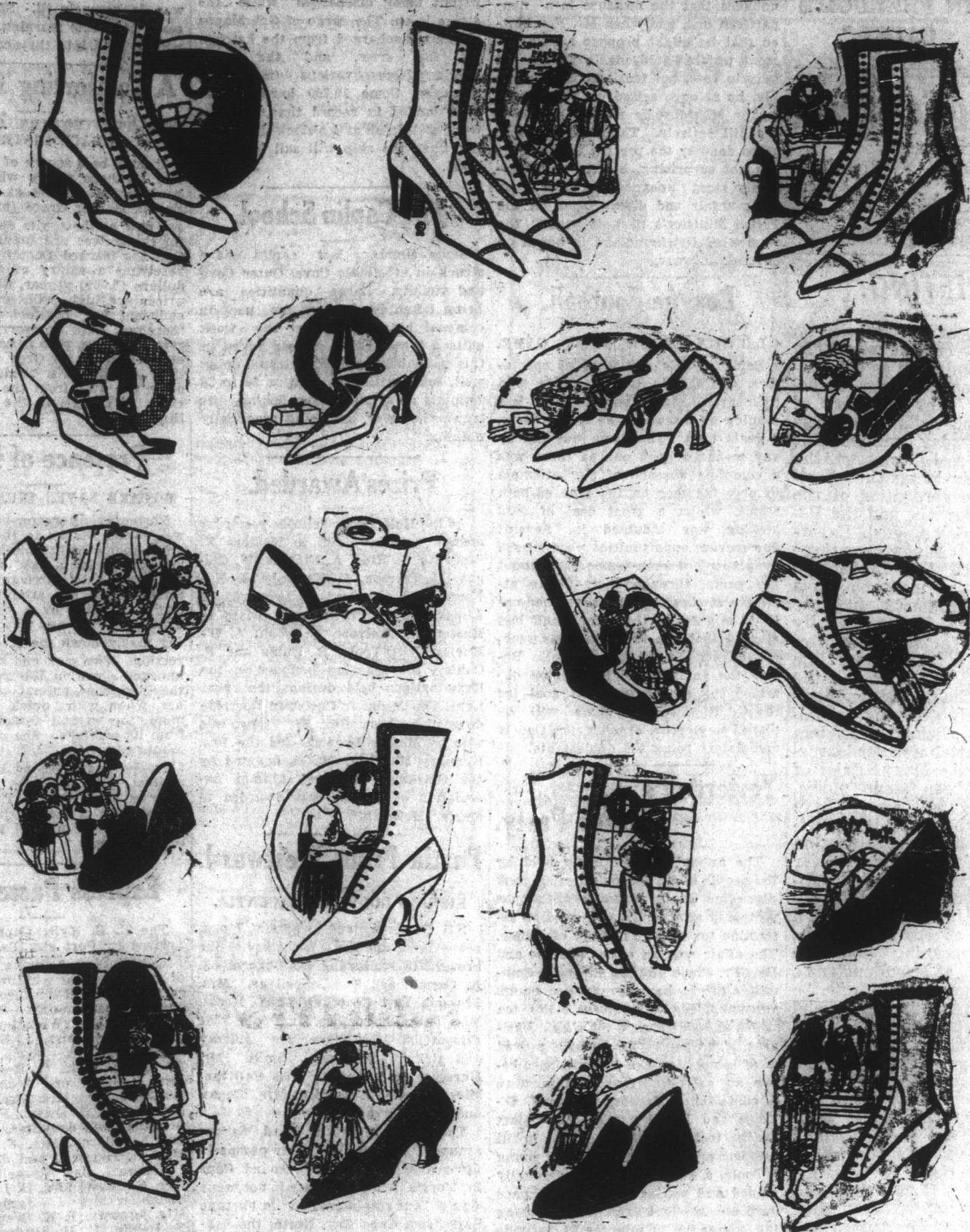
The experiment of the United States in building merchant ships and endeavoring to operate them by the Government has proved so ghastly a failure and has involved the country in such tremendous financial losses, that there seems to be a very widespread opinion among business men that the Government must get rid of the load at any cost. The personnel of the Shipping Board which is in control of the whole operations of the Government Merchant Marine has been completely changed since the inauguration of President Harding, and it is announced in despatches from Washington that it will be the purpose of the new Board, to get the Government out of the shipping business as soon as possible.

That is also the counsel of Mr. Charles M. Schwab the steel magnate, who was formerly Director-General of the Emergency Fleet Corporation. He has declared that it would be good business to write off two-thirds of the cost of the Emergency Fleet, which was \$3,000,000,000, and to sell the ships to private operators. It is also intimated that, as the first step toward getting away with Government operation, the new Board will make sales with the approval of the Administration, at prices about one-third of the original cost. At the old figures there could be no sales at all to-day.

At the end of May 684 steel ships of 4,496,000 tons were laid up, and there seemed to be no hope of ever employing 275 idle wooden ships again. Chairman Good of the House of Appropriations Committee took such a pessimistic view of the wooden fleet

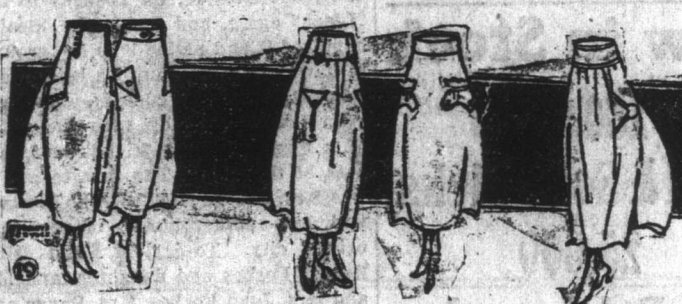

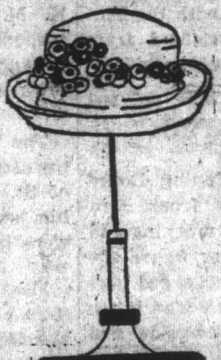

The Romance of Rider Haggard.

His Early Struggles--Some Good Stories.

It is something of a record, one imagines, to sustain public interest in characters of fiction for thirty-five years. Sir H. Rider Haggard, the author of nearly fifty novels, has achieved this with the creations of Allan Quartermain, the gentleman explorer and hunter, and She, who reappear in "She and Allan," the new Rider Haggard novel just published by Hutchinson and Co. "She and Allan," which is illustrated by that celebrated artist, Maurice Greiffenhagen, A.R.A., tells of the first and last meeting of Allan, and of the Zulu warrior, Umalopogaas, with the mysterious and beautiful She in the ruins of Kor, and of the many adventures that befell them.

A Happy Ending Wanted.

The character of Allan Quartermain first appeared in "King Solomon's Mines," which was published in 1886. The origin of this famous story was a wager! "Treasure Island" appeared at about this time and made a great sensation. Rider Haggard finished reading R. L. Stevenson's story on a railway journey and, turning to his brother, declared half in earnest that he thought he could write as good a book for boys himself. His brother, with true fraternal spirit, promptly offered to bet he couldn't do it. The bet was as promptly accepted, and within a couple of months or so Rider Haggard produced "King Solomon's Mines."

He had already written two novels, "Dawn" (published in 1884) and "The Witch's Head" (1885), both of which had attracted attention. The idea of writing fiction occurred to him in a rather curious way. While he was studying for the Bar, he saw one day in church a very beautiful face which later persisted in haunting his memory. This gave him inspiration for Angela, the heroine of "Dawn," or rather of the original draft of the story. "There Remained a Rest," as it was first called, was submitted to the late Mr. Cordy Jefferson, who advised the young author to submit to popular demand and substitute a happier ending. The story, which was very long, was entirely re-written in about three months.

King Solomon's Mines.

"I worked so hard at rewriting this MS.," wrote Rider Haggard afterwards, "that I nearly went blind and had to finish it in a darkened room. For weeks afterwards I was not allowed to read anything and might only amuse myself by throwing a ball against a wall, like a child, and catching it again." It was, of course, "King Solomon's Mines" that brought him his first taste of real fame. After the MS. had been submitted in vain to one or two publishers, it came into the hands of the late W. E. Henley and the late Andrew Lang, who had no hesitation in recommending it to Messrs. Cassell. The book was published by them in 1888 and achieved an instant success both in this country and America, where, of course, it was pirated in scores of thousands. The success made him give up the Bar for authorship.

"She," perhaps the most famous of his books, was written in about six weeks, and published in 1887.

His career has by no means been entirely devoted to writing fiction. Born in Norfolk on June 22nd, 1856, he was originally destined for the Foreign Office, but at the age of nineteen decided to go to Africa as the private secretary of the late Sir of Natal.

Sir Rider is a well-known authority on rural and agricultural affairs, his

gests that it is only fair to add the following: After the publication of "Allan Quartermain" he received a letter accusing him outright of being Jack the Ripper in person, an individual who was at the time, and still is, in much request by the police. A batch of anonymous letters reached him after the appearance of "Beatrice," blaming him for having caused the writers' husbands, for the most part clergymen, to run away with young ladies of that name!

Finally, the following amusing story is worth telling.

A relative of Sir Rider was standing before a portrait of him by Maurice Greiffenhagen, A.R.A., which was hung in the Royal Academy. Two fashionably-dressed young women at his side were also examining the picture.

"Who's that?" asked one of them. "Oh!" replied the other. "Don't you know? It's that awful man who writes those awful books!"—M. Joseph, in John o' London's Weekly.

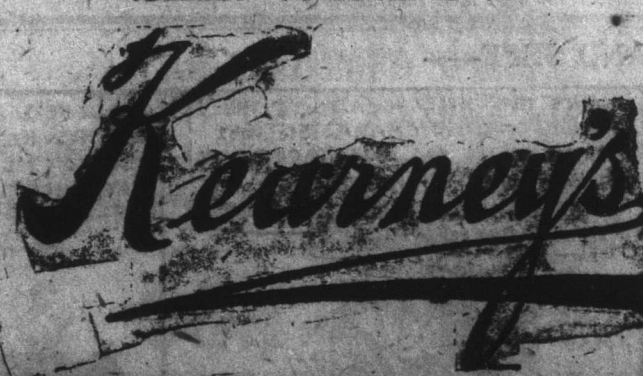

Climbing to the Homes of the Sea Birds.

"This great host of birds resort to these cliffs for the purpose of nesting only. The rest of the year is spent in the open sea. Guillemots as a rule first visit the ledges in early January, but these visits are of short duration; they, however, become more frequent and of longer duration as the spring advances. At these times the ledges are often as thickly populated as they are in summer, but the birds are quiet and unobtrusive, a great contrast to what they are in the nesting season proper. They come to the cliffs permanently about the end of April, the laying season commencing about the third week in May; but the end of July the greater portion of the birds have left.

Climbing the Cliffs.

"The cliffs are climbed regularly in May and June for the purpose of gathering the eggs. This pursuit has been followed for at least 200 years. The right to gather eggs belongs to the farmers, the tenants of the adjacent lands. They sub-let their rights to parties of climbers, or 'climbers' as they are locally known, often men who work for them during the other portions of the year. There are four sets of regular 'climbers' and each set consists of four men. The outfit of the climbing gangs consists of two stout hemp ropes, about 300 feet long. These are renewed every second year. One is known as the body rope and the other as the hand rope, the latter having previously done duty as a body rope.

The Quilt.

"Breeches, made of two broad loops of flat webbing, with a belt attached, are securely buckled round the waist and fastened at the front to the body rope. An old felt hat thickly padded with grass, in order to protect the head against falling stones; a leather bracelet worn on the arm which uses the guide rope; boots with iron plates, the edges of which are turned down in the shape of a horse's shoe, to prevent slipping, and to enable the climbers to walk on the slippery ledges and up the face of the cliff when being drawn to the top; two canvas bags, one for each shoulder, to hold the eggs; a long stick with net at one end and a hook at the other, with which to rake out the eggs of razorbills and puffins from the crevices where they are laid; an iron stake with a running pulley on the top and a plain iron crowbar for the hand rope; a leather belt for the man who lowers, and some big baskets with which to carry away the eggs, complete the outfit.

"When making a descent the climber dons the breeches, and, taking the iron stake with the pulley in his hand, walks backwards to the edge of the cliff, where he fixes the stake, placing the rope over the pulley so that it runs freely. The crowbar has previously been fixed in the ground and the guide rope fastened to it, and the other end thrown over the cliff. The man acting as lowerer has donned the leather belt or saddle, which has a ledge of thicker leather running partly round it, on which the rope runs. This man seats himself on the ground, the rope is passed round his body and grasped firmly with the hands, in which tufts of grass are held to aid in gripping the rope and prevent blistering. His feet are firmly braced in two holes, made for the purpose in the sloping ground on the cliff top.

Over the Edge.

"The climber, taking the guide rope in one hand, then walks backwards over the edge of the cliff and descends by a series of backward jumps, each time landing with his feet against the face of the cliff, with body inclining outwards, frequently descending 100 feet or more without a stop. He performs some wonderful feats of agility in creeping along the narrow ledges and swinging in and out among the overhanging cliffs and round dangerous corners.

"The method of communicating with his mate on the top is by means of the hand rope, which the climber never allows to leave his hands.

lowed by another 'slack' and on alternately.

Distinctive Eggs.

"Many of the eggs are specially distinctive, and from them several interesting facts have been readily ascertained: viz., that a bird always lays the same type of egg, and on the same ledge, also that she will occupy that particular spot for a series of years, amounting to, at times, as at present ascertained, twelve or thirteen. If the first egg is taken, another is laid, and if that is taken, a third will be deposited before the bird gives up her attempt at reproduction.

"The eggs of the birds have hitherto been sold for several purposes. The great majority have been despatched to Leeds or other towns, where they are used for dressing some of the superior classes of leather. Quite a number are used in the hotels at Bridlington and Filey for cooking purposes. The good and rarer varieties are sold to collectors, and there is

always a keen competition for their possession, prices for really good specimens ranging anywhere between half a crown and a guinea. It is extremely amusing at times to watch

the proceedings on the cliff top when collectors are about. They cluster round the baskets when the 'climber' comes to the top, in order to be ready to 'grab' any choice specimen which is disgorged from his bag.

"In order to prevent any particular portion of the cliffs being 'climbed' out, they are alternately rested for a season, and of course there are many parts which, owing to their loose and dangerous condition, are never disturbed. This ensures the numbers of the birds being maintained. It is probable, and indeed old records make it quite certain, that the birds are not so numerous as they once were. Nevertheless, I think that for a great number of years they have remained at a certain level. In any case they are exceedingly abundant."

JUST NERVES.

When I went to call on a friend of mine, on a visit to my home town, I found that she was ill and had gone away for a rest. Of course I asked at once what the trouble was, and a neighbor, who has never been fond of her, said this:

"To tell the truth, I don't think it's anything very much. Just nerves, I guess."

Just nerves! I wonder if more ignorance, more unintentional cruelty was ever wrapped up in two words than in those two when they are used as they are so often, to depreciate the suffering of a person with sick nerves.

Suppose anyone should say of a witch, "I don't see why it doesn't go. There's nothing much the matter with it. Just the matras out of order, I guess."

How foolish that would sound! Yet it is no more foolish than the other remark.

Called Her Sister-in-Law Spiteful.

A woman who has just come victoriously through a period of nervous breakdown (as anyone can who will make up his mind to) told me that she had once spoken of a sister-in-law as "spiteful" and said there was nothing the matter with her but "just nerves." "I sometimes think," she said, "that what I have passed through was a punishment for my lack of sympathy and understanding. Except that I can't be here in any power that would mete out such a punishment even for that crime. All I would ask for the people who say that about me, that I have been lazy and was all right except that I was nervous, is that they should go through one day of the

real physical suffering I have endured."

They Cause Real Physical Pain.

I imagine there are few definite physical ailments that bring as much real physical anguish as "Just nerves."

"But," asks someone, "aren't nerves the fault of the people who let themselves get into such a state? Do they deserve as much sympathy as the others?"

In one way they are his fault, just as all sickness is the fault of the individual. But in another way they are his mistake, his ignorance, just as all sickness is the result of ignorance and mistaken ways of living.

A Handicap That Can Be Overcome.

There are few things more pathetic to me than the person who is struggling to get back on his feet after an attack of worn-out nerves and who is handicapped in the struggle by the impatience, the utter lack of sympathy of his relatives and friends who do not realize that nerves can be just as sick as bodies.

Of course, there is another side to this picture and for you who are already getting ready to write me about it, I have a word. Withhold your pens for a day. I am going to try and paint that picture to-morrow.

Young Travellers.

Several young children have been travelling on the high seas quite of late. They have been carefully looked after, and apparently enjoy their early experience of sea life. Kathleen Featherstone, of Chatham, who is only three years old, was a passenger on the Canadian Pacific liner Metagama, which left Liverpool recently. She is the youngest of the family, and was on her way to Montreal to live with her aunt. Kathleen lost her mother last year. Another

youthful globe-trotter, travelling in the same vessel, was Paul Schemnitz, a Hungarian boy of 15, who arrived alone in London recently with his passport money in Canada in his pocket. The only English words he knows are "Canada," "Quebec," "Toronto," and "Thank you very much." He speaks German and Dutch. He is being sent to his father (a naturalized Canadian) in Canada. Another boy—a Swede, named Robert Blockridge—who is only 10 years of age and cannot speak English, is undertaking a 8000-mile journey alone. He comes from Malmo (Sweden), and he is on his way to rejoin his mother at Edmonton, Alberta. When he sails in the Canadian Pacific liner "Empress of Britain" at Liverpool last week a label was attached to his clothing bearing the words, "Please look after me. Thank you." French Waif Falls Heir to Fortune.

INHERITS 1,500,000 FRANCS FROM FOSTER MOTHER.

How Fortune smiles on an abandoned baby has just been told to Councillor Rebellard, of the Paris Municipal Council in a report on the administration of the poor funds. Just before the war the police here found an infant well wrapped and in a basket which had been left on one of the Seine bridges. Without sign of identification the baby was taken to a public orphanage, where a few months later she attracted the attention of a wealthy visitor from the north of France who agreed to adopt her as her daughter.

This woman died last month and when her will was read there was found a codicil leaving a substantial sum for the care of the homeless children of France, while the remainder of her estate, estimated to be worth between a million and a half and two million francs, goes to her adopted daughter. The identity of this woman is not mentioned in M. Rebellard's report lest it might in the future prove injurious to the social career of the one time waif.

Shot at Queen Victoria.

WOULD-BE ASSASSIN DIES AT BROADMOOR.

Roderick McLean, who attempted to shoot Queen Victoria on March 1, 1852, and was afterwards detained as a dangerous lunatic, has died at Broadmoor Asylum.

The attempted murder, says "The Star," followed the arrival of the Royal train conveying the Queen, Princess Beatrice, and the Court from London to Windsor.

Queen Victoria had just walked across the platform of Windsor Station to a carriage in waiting when McLean, who was standing at the entrance of the station yard among a number of spectators, deliberately fired a revolver at her.

The shot missed, and McLean was seized by Chief Superintendent Hayes of the borough police and the weapon wrested from his grasp by someone in the crowd.

Tried at Berlin Assizes for high treason, McLean was found not guilty on the ground of insanity and con-

fined a dangerous lunatic. Mr. Justice Chelmsford and Chief Justice Huddleston tried the accused, and admission to the Court was by ticket. The verdict was everywhere received with satisfaction.

McLean when placed in the dock had a very shabby appearance and looked physically weak and nervous. He pleaded not guilty to a well known crime. A letter was read in which copies and motives of vengeance of the Queen was indulged in, and McLean was admitted to Broadmoor in May, 1852.

Postage Tax on Trade.

Newfoundland Ex-Premier's Strong Protest Against New Proposal.

Strong criticism of the increased postal rates for foreign countries and the colonies was made to The Evening News on June 1, by Lord Morris, the ex-Prime Minister of Newfoundland.

"The proposed increased postal charges," he said, "are a direct tax on the Empire's industries. They are really a violation of the principles for which the Dominions and the whole Empire have been fighting for years."

"We are not a compact Empire, but are spread out on every sea and continent. More than any other Empire we depend largely for the success of our trade on cheap communication."

"There is such a thing as overloading industries by taxing them to a breaking point. Every catalogue, newspaper, or price list going to a foreign market should be made as free as is humanly possible."

"If revenue is needed, why not tax luxuries? It is essential that every burden should be removed from our trade, and it is particularly important that we should have cheap postage with our Dominions."

"We must assume that the Postmaster General expects to get much money from the increased rates; that means that a large tax is going to be put on trade."

"Are the Government trying to kill all future possibilities of foreign trade with their continually added taxes on everything that might help us?"

House of Assembly.

WEDNESDAY, July 6.
The House met at 3.15 p.m.
Although the session lasted all the afternoon, there was absolutely no business done, the time being taken up in the discussion of the American Embargo. The Opposition members urged the Government to get busy on this important matter, but Government members apparently were dazed as the seriousness of the situation was brought home to them, but with the exception of the Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries not one spoke on the subject. When the House opened the Prime Minister intimated that owing to the Railway programme not being ready he would adjourn the session until to-day.

Sir Michael Cashin objected to adjournment because the Railway policy was not ready. He said that six weeks ago the Prime Minister had asked for suspension of the rules so as to facilitate business. Apparently, however, there was no business ready to proceed with. He thought the whole thing was a wreck. The statistics and data which the Prime Minister said were furnished Mr. Devine in order to make his case at Washington, and copies of which he had asked for had not been furnished, nor were they ever given the Trade Commissioner. No case had been prepared for him. Sir Michael pointed out that the matter had been utterly neglected by the Government, although long ago the Opposition had brought the matter up.

The Prime Minister. — "Messages were sent to Messrs. Devine, Job, Bowring and Outerbridge previous to the matter being brought up in the House, but in the case of Sir E. R. Bowring a memorandum was sent to him only a day or so ago."

Sir Michael Cashin. — "You are only splitting hairs. This matter has been before the public since January 21st last and all you have done is contained in the evidence of Mr. Devine before the Committee of Ways and Means." This evidence was read by Sir Michael and the paragraphs where the Commissioner informed the Ways and Means Committee that he (Devine) believed that we would likely have coal to export and that wheat was grown on the West Coast, were commented on. Sir Michael challenged any one of the Government to tell why they had not taken any interest in a matter which means millions to the country. Sir Michael then read the copy of various cables on the matter, the first being a message to the Prime Minister from Mr. Devine sent January 18th.

On reading the night letter to Mr. Eugene H. Outerbridge from the Prime Minister and commenting thereon, the Prime Minister said that Messrs. Bowring and Badcock had been to Washington and had brought along with them necessary statistics. Sir Michael said that such could

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ernment to get men big enough and if they could not find any he would point them to Sir Robert Bond.

Capt. Lewis thought it a very serious matter that a move had not been made two months ago. The policy of the Government had been one of drift, and the motto was, "let her drift." With the first fishermen's Government in the history of Newfoundland not one member of it had spoken a word in the interest of the men who had sent them to their seats. Capt. Lewis referred to the prohibitive duty on fish oil, especially when put in the steel barrels as advocated by Mr. Coaker. He thought that there were only two objects in the Government's policy of "drift," one of these Sir Ambrose Shiel failed in 1869, (Confederation), the other was Crown Colony. Sir Richard Anderson Squire, Mr. Coaker and Collier may not fail, and in their success they expect a reward, when all three will be knighted. He advised the Hon. Mr. Coaker that such an important matter should not be left in the hands of Mr. Collishaw, even though he was his guide and philosopher. Captain Lewis went on to say that Mr. Coaker was going to take any interest in the matter being that their districts were directly affected. He regretted that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries had fallen down on his job, but he felt sure that he would not fail to vote a million and a half to help the Reid Company run the railroad, extending from the firm like Penney & Sons and Harris of Grand Bank, which his fishery policy had practically destroyed.

The questions on the Order Paper were taken up and some verbal answers given, but as they were of great importance at the present juncture, Sir Michael Cashin asked that they be given in writing. The Orders of the Day were deferred.

Before the close of the session Mr. Bennett asked if there had been any appointments on the Commission as provided for in the Prohibitory Act. He drew the attention of the Government to the fact that excessive charges were being made on Kerosene Oil and Gasoline, and the excess profits being mulcted from the consumers ran into hundreds of thousands of dollars. The Imperial Oil Company were the only people here dealing in this commodity. Excessive charges were also made on the coals, as when a wooden barrel was purchased the company charged \$5, but they only paid \$1.50 when buying it back to be again sold to another party for \$5. "It is about time," said Mr. Bennett, "that this matter be investigated."

The Prime Minister. — "I entirely agree with what the previous speaker has said re the excessive profits on oil and gasoline."

Mr. Bennett. — "I have invoices to show that extortion is going on in this business."

In reply to a question by Mr. Archibald, the Prime Minister stated that he was not prepared to specify charges that certain stores on Water Street were profiting by the Sales Tax on goods which were in the stores previous to the Act, but rumors to that effect had reached him.

The House adjourned at 6 p.m. and meets again this afternoon.

hardly be true as Mr. C. R. Bowring was here in the city and Sir Edgar was on his way from England.

Prime Minister. — "Well perhaps it was some representative of those houses."

Sir Michael Cashin. — "Yet you told Sir E. R. Bowring in your message of July 4th that the matter is of vital and immediate importance. Have you received any reply from Sir Edgar Bowring?"

Prime Minister. — "Yes. Sir Edgar Bowring prefers to come on to St. John's, and I understand that owing to his duties Mr. Outerbridge cannot act for us."

Sir Michael Cashin. — "So there we have no person to represent us except Mr. Devine and Mr. Collishaw, and I think that Sir E. R. Bowring will not go to Washington until he has the fullest evidence to take with him, and that you have not prepared."

Sir John Crosbie spoke on the seriousness of the situation, particularly as it appeared that Sir Edgar Bowring was not prepared to act as representative. He suggested to the Government to pick out a strong Minister of the Crown for the job and furnish him with all available information, and even though he met with failure the venture was worth trying.

Mr. MacDonnell drew the attention of the Prime Minister to the Order Paper of June 17th, wherein Sir Michael Cashin had brought the American tax to the notice of the House. He suggested that the repeal of the Foreign Fishing Vessels Act might be considered favorably by the American Government.

Hon. W. F. Coaker said that even though the Americans put on the tax it was no more unfavorable to us than to other countries like Norway, Scotland and Canada. He believed they were using this duty to compel us to give them some trade reciprocity, such as giving them our pulp. He was certain that they would put on the duty.

Sir Michael Cashin. — "Where did you get the information?"

Hon. W. F. Coaker. — "I was informed by Dr. Grenfell. This is all the information I have at the moment. I would propose sending a strong deputation and clear up this matter if the Opposition would allow us to get through the business of this House in a reasonable time. It is my opinion that the future of Newfoundland lies in the direction of the United States, and I discussed this matter at the Colonial Office while I was in London. It was then, and is now, my opinion that the destinies of Newfoundland lie in this direction."

Mr. Walsh charged that the American tax was the outcome of the discriminating policy enacted last year against American fish buyers. He thought that our latest fishery experts, Dr. Grenfell, Mr. Collishaw and Prof. Davies would make a powerful trio. An article in the day's issue of the Star misrepresenting what he had said in a previous speech was roundly condemned by Mr. Walsh, who next asked the Hon. Minister of Marine and Fisheries why when he was in New York he did not say to the matter of the American tax instead of sending Mr. Collishaw. He was the man who made the price of fish. He was sorry for him, sorry because of the hopeless mess which the Fishery Regulations made of the most important industry of the country. Before closing his speech Mr. Walsh advised the Hon. Minister to forget Collishaw and take the matter up himself.

Mr. Archibald asked if the suggestion made by Mr. Coaker "that if the Opposition would allow the House to close some of the Government would undertake the mission," was meant as a threat. In other words did he (Sir Coaker) mean that if the Opposition would not allow the House to close, no action would be taken, and the fishermen could suffer being penalized the amount of the American duty. "This is, I take it, a threat," said Mr. Archibald, "and it is not good enough." Mr. Coaker objected strongly to Dr. Grenfell or Mr. Collishaw representing Newfoundland on the American Duty question. He advised the Gov-

Bell Wins Big Race.
DOMINION SPORTS ARE A GREAT SUCCESS.

Over 2,000 people attended the Dominion Championship Sports held yesterday afternoon in St. George's Field under the auspices of the C.L.B.C. Athletic Association. His Excellency the Governor, attended by Capt. A. B. Baird, A.D.C., was present during the greater part of the afternoon and presented the prizes. His Excellency was met on arrival by a guard of honor from the C.L.B. Cadets under Capt. P. Miles. Every item contained in the lengthy and varied programme was keenly contested by the many competitors and thoroughly enjoyed by all the spectators. The special display by the C.L.B.C. Gymnastic Squad, under G.S.M. H. Rendell, was very well done and was loudly applauded. The 10 mile race which was the feature of the sports, was won by J. Bell, the well known local runner, who represented Newfoundland at Halifax last year, his time for the completed course being 58 minutes or just 8 minutes longer than the world's record, Eric Robertson, the only Newfoundland representative in the Olympic Games held at Antwerp last year, was second, and R. Maunder came in third. These, the only three competitors, met at the Octagon from where the race was started at 3.30 p.m. The course was along Topsail Road, Cornwall Avenue to St. George's Field, where two laps were necessary to complete the course. Bell took the lead from the start setting a pace of about 90 to the minute. Although the other competitors fell into an excellent stride and made good headway, Bell quickly forged ahead of them, and before five miles of the course had been covered, had obtained a lead of fully half a mile which he continually increased until when St. George's Field was reached, he had nearly a mile lead on Robertson, who was second. Bell covered the two rounds of the field in fine style and was quite fresh when he finished. The length of the course, according to the speedometer on the Judge's car, was 10 1/4 miles so that Bell's achievement, when the condition of the road is also taken into consideration, a remarkable one, for the adverse conditions would considerably lessen the difference between his time and the world's 10 mile record of 50 minutes.

A cup, which will arrive next week and which will be officially presented to Bell at the C.L.B. Armory, was the prize for this race whilst certificates will be awarded to all three competitors. A special medal was also presented to Bell and silver cups to Robertson and Maunder. The Band of the C.L.B. Cadets, under Capt. Morris, was present during the afternoon and discoursed excellent music in their usual inimitable style. To Rev. E. H. Fletcher, Chairman, C.S.M. B. Colton, Secretary, and all other members of the C.L.B.C. Athletic Association, great credit is due for the success of the sports which will be remembered for many years to come as perhaps, the greatest event in the sporting annals of Newfoundland. 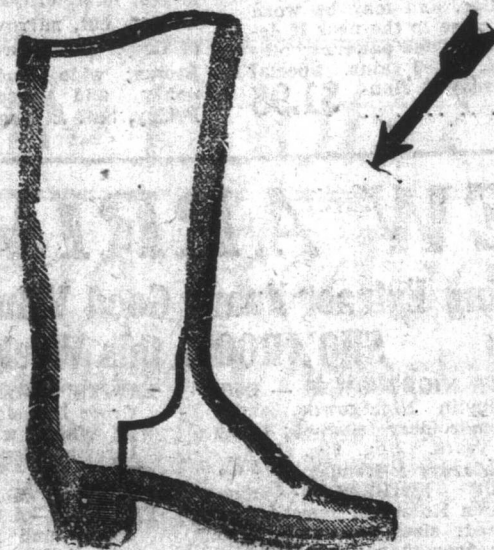

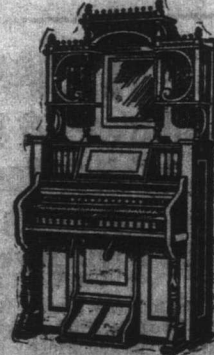

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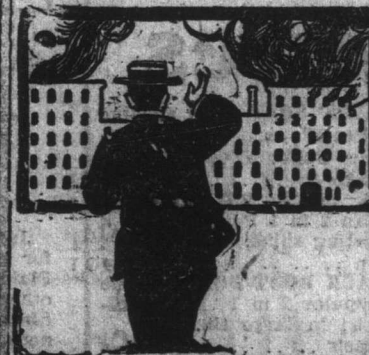
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
