

Being of the genus devilfish with its repuslive tentacles, the idea of eating squid was abhorrent to most people of European descent. All this is now changed and to-day properly cured and properly cooked squid are esteemed as a delicacy. "In Portland, Oregon,," says, The Listening Post, "squid are in great favor and twenty cents a pound is the usual price. Several tons are disposed of each week. The prejudice that formerly existed against them is everywhere disappearing and the squid is taking its place in the list of food fishes all over America.'

Considering the annual abundance of squid in Newfoundland waters from August till October, every year there should be great possibilities in the industry of catching, curing, and exporting squid .- Trade Review.



#### The Flour Proposition.

Newfoundland is importing an average of 450,000 barrels of flour per annum. In other words approximately the flour from 2,250,000 bushels of wheat. It is the intention of those behind the proposed flour mill to start operations with an initial capacity of 300,000 barrels per year and increase as conditions warrant. To do this will require 1,500,000 bushels of wheat, and to guarantee success the closest working arrangements possible must be had with the source of supply. The grain for the Newfoundland mill will be supplied by one of the largest grain handling firms in Canada, and this will obviate the necessity of going on the Grain Exchange for a small purchase which would find a small firm at the mercy

of the large buyers. Within the past few weeks flour has been selling F.O.B. Montreal at \$8.00 per barrel, which for some time had been quoted at \$1.00 a bushel, Fort William. 


