Dane Gets Decision After One of the Best Bouts Seen in Frisco.

Referee Graney Gave Popular Satisfaction in Spite of Britt's Objection

San Francisco, Sept. 9.—In a fight with many novel features, "Batling" Nelson of Chicago knocked out James Edwards Britt of San Francisco at Omaha this afternoon. The end came in the eighteenth round, and was a fairly worky victory.

The surroundings, the crowd, the bitterness of the men toward each other, the uncertainty as to whether the fight actually began, together with the cleverness and the endurance displayed by the two boxers, made the fight one of the greatest interest to followers of fighting.

It was the success of a strong, enduring fighter against a clever, cool boxer. Britt, who had been the favorite, was knocked out by Nelson, who had been the underdog.

Contrary to expectations, the crowd of 9,000 men and a score of women at the ring, all of whom were cheering for Nelson, were disappointed when he was knocked out.
