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IN THE YUKON DISTRICT.

AN INTERESTING REPORT FROM INSPECTOR CONSTANTINE.

Passage Up the River Amid Great Heat and Very Active and Violent Flies. Getting Out Logs to Build the Mounted Police Post—Gold Output Valued at \$900,000.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—So many inquiries have been received in regard to the police mission to the Yukon district that the following report from Inspector Constantine will be read with great interest. It is dated Fort Cudahy, Aug. 23rd, and reads as follows:

We left Unalaska on Monday, the 17th June, at noon, and about the same hour on Wednesday, the 19th, we were between the Seal Islands and Nunivik Island. We were at dinner when one of the waiters said that leobegs were in sight. There was general stampede from the table to see them; little did we think that we would be in the ice for 14 days, with narrow escapes of being crushed.

After steaming on our course north-east for some time, we turned, but by this time the ice had got completely around us, and we drifted with it in a southerly direction for some 200 miles, when it opened up, and we worked our way through different openings till we came opposite Cape Nome, when we got clear of it. From Cape Nome we steamed for Cape Doris, and then into Norton Sound and St. Michael's. The ice did not clear from the Sound till the 19th of June, being a couple of weeks later than usual.

We arrived at St. Michael's on Wednesday, July 3rd, and left on the river boat on Friday, the 5th, after transferring the cargo from the ocean vessel. A blow coming up, we had to put back and wait for two or three days. The passage by sea of 80 miles to the mouth of the river and across the bar, can only be made by the river boats in calm weather.

The Trip Up the River. The passage up the river was devoid of any special note, but was very tedious. The boat was loaded very heavily, 450 tons, heat great, and flies all kinds very active and vicious. On the 24th July, at 6 a.m., we reached here. The work of unloading was commenced at once, and ended on Tuesday night.

On Friday, the 28th July, Strickland and party of eight left on the steamer up the river to get out logs for building, going up about 40 miles. They were absent three weeks, getting out in that time some 400 four logs. The flies were terrible, most of the party looking on their return as if they had, or had had, a dose of smallpox. Friday and Saturday, 26th and 27th, the men were busy mending and airing their clothes. On Monday, the 29th, we commenced work on the site for the post. It is at the junction of the Forty-mile and the Yukon, on the north side of Forty-mile, about equidistant from each settlement—the highest ground of which has not been even flooded in the memory of any one here. The high hills are some 700 yards in rear, which will give a good range for nearly that distance. The ground had to be cleared of brush and trees, drains dug to carry off the water, as well as prevent it coming in on it. The whole country (that is, any level ground) is swamp, and covered with heavy, thick moss. This was cleared off, and is done in this way: First, cut with axes into squares of about three feet, then turn over with mattocks, piled up by dry, and wheeled off, being dumped into the river. Under the moss is a frozen ground or ice. It took us nearly three weeks to clear the ground, strip it of moss and ditch it.

The buildings proposed are as follows: Men's quarters, 70 x 22 Store house, containing office, stores, carpenter shop, and wash house, 48 x 22 Guard room, 30 x 22 Hospital, 45 x 22 Officers' quarters (2), 35 x 22

If time and material admit, we shall also erect two small buildings, 15 by 22, one for the doctor, the other for Staff-Serget. Hayne and Brown. The buildings will have a clear height of nine feet inside. The roof of the buildings will form a stockade. The intervals being stockaded with logs, the face fronting on the Yukon will be stockaded its entire length, as the guard room will be built at this end. Staff-Serget. Hayne takes photographic views of the work at its various stages.

The logs used in the construction of the several buildings, excepting the two small ones, will be seven inches square. The smaller six inches. The work is very heavy and hard, and all material has to be moved by hand most of the way. The distance from the saw mill to the site is over a quarter of a mile. For this distance the heavy logs are run upon small trolleys, one at a time, and the logs, in number according to their size, all have to be carried about 300 feet. I had all the logs sawn at the mill. By this I get stabs for roofing, and a sufficient quantity of lumber to pay for the mill, i.e., I have some less to buy. It was a great pity that a mill was not sent with the party. It would have saved much work. The mill I worked by my men, except the sawing when the company furnish us with well as fuel. We hope to have our timber out on Monday, 28th inst., and buildings up by the end of the month. The roofing will be slow business; first slabs, second, most on them, then six or eight inches, dug up and dried. All this is absolutely necessary to keep the heat in, and prevent the frost coming through, and keep up the wet in the spring and summer. I shall have to send up the river for two or three tons of dry wood for winter use. We shall require at least 100 cords. When one considers that this work has to be done by the men without assistance of teams, you will see that the contract is not a small one.

The Gold Output. The mines are turning out well. The output of gold this season has been large. The miners have learnt by last winter's experience that they can work to the same advantage in the winter as in the summer by burning and drifting. As far as I can learn the output for the past year has been about \$300,000, rather over than under.

Our stores, with the exception of three coils of rope, a couple of crates of stoves, and a case or two, came up on the first boat. The company supplied us with rope for the river work, and our rope was put on the river work at St. Michael's by a mistake of the captain's. The stores all came in good order. We have been much handicapped for want of our canoes, and it will be almost impossible to do work up the river without a steam launch, on account of the distances and swift water. Up to the present everything has been very quiet and orderly. I expect it will continue so, at any rate for a time. Most of the "hard cases" have left for the Circle City, 200 miles below.

Feeling Toward the Future. The feeling with regard to the police has entirely changed. All seem glad they are in, the law and order people, because they feel peace is now assured, and others probably because we are judged by their standard, might is right. The custom-house has not been very good this season, and as the Indians are a lazy, good-for-nothing set, they are not doing much for the Government to feed them in time of scarcity, and falling to do so, may complain to the Department. The Indians living here belong to the Charley's and David's bands, which are American. The Indians at St. Michael's, and will send by the steamer. The Government will see their way to open up a route by the way of Hoot-ah-ah, to the country and the best section of this part of the Northwest Territories will then fill up. The climate runs warmer, and from six weeks to two months longer. It would produce coarse grains and vegetables sufficient to maintain the men, or lower part of a reasonable price, open up a mineral country of equal richness to this, which is now only prevented by the labor and cost of getting in provisions. Many are anxious to go.

Great Disappointment. Sept. 2, 1895. Boat arrived last night, I was much disappointed to meet the steamer not coming. Ogilvie arrived here on the 30th ult., and has kindly lent me one of his boats to get a start on to take his stores down. The Indians want \$20 each for the boat. I took four of his men to do it, and has to be done very carefully or they will be satisfied to make the canoe over on her up river trip into, or was run into, and sank the other company's boat near the mouth of the river. About 300 miles from St. Michael's. It has rained nearly every day since our arrival, and the men have been terrible. My wife and Mrs. Strickland stood the journey very well and will be satisfied to return here next fall. Do try and send me a steam launch next spring. I wish you could come in and see the country for yourself, you would then understand our wants and necessities.
