ANTIOQUIA. -There is a 50 c . similar to the set on colored paper. Puce brown (c. c. 89) on white. Perf. 1.3 On each shect of 50 is one stamp of 20 c .

ARGENTINE REPUBLIC.-The sc. envelope is surcharged with large black figures " $\bar{j}$," at the sides. The 2c. letter card is inscribed, "Vice Presidente-de le Republica."

BHOPAL.-There is a new type of stamp, square, with inscription in circular band, inscribed "H. H. Nawab Shah Jahan Becam." Branches at sides, and letters "B. L. C. I." in corners. Value in oval tablet below. 1 anoa, dark blue.

BRAZIL.-Mr. Maury has information that new cards and letter cards are in preparation at the urint with stamps containing effigy of the Republic. Adhesives are being prepared of similar designs; and also a set with Brazilian eagle.

BRITISH EAST AFRICA.-The stamps with "B. E. A. written across, turn out to be bogus. The $S$. $N$. notes four more values of the current set, 2ru. brick red, 3ru. light purple, 4rulight blue, 5ru. green.

BRITISH NORTH BORNEO.-We have the 25 c blue surcharged in red "Eight-Cents" in two lines. which we chronicle under reserve.

DIEGO SUAREZ.-Although we don't belong to the Anti-Surcharge Association we must confess that the latest from this Colony is much prefcrable to all that came before. Still, they are monstrosities. They are rectangular and measure about $20 \times 30 \mathrm{~mm}$. Inscribed, " DiegoSuarez" at top; "Republique Francse" below, large figures of value and "Postes" on large tablet at right partly covering the main design which, in the 1c., is a steamship, in the 5c., a pair of female heads, one white and one blackin the 15 c . also two heads, both white, and in the 25 c . the head of Minerva. Lithographed
and printed in black on white paper, imperfor, ate. They were issued September $5,1890$.

FINLAND. -The 10 marks is of the new type-
FRANCE.-The 10 c . card has been changed in color from buff to brown.

GREECE.-The $S . N$. notes the 6ol. unpaid letter stamp with center reversed.

HAYYI. -The 3c. blue, head of General Salomon, is now surcharged in red. "Deux-2 -Cent," in three lines.

HONG KONG.-New colors as follows 10c. brown on red paper, 30 c . green, 20 c . on 30 c . green, 50 c . on 48 c . violet, 1 d . on 10 c . brown on red, a!so Stamp Duty, 2d green, 3d. lilac, 5 d . on 2 d green, 5 d . on 3 d . lilac, 5 d . on 10 d . brown on red paper.

ITALY-The $7 \frac{1}{2}+7 \frac{1}{2}$ c. card has also " 90 " and " (Provincia di . .)."

JAMACIA - The $P$. J. of $A$. notes the ld. card surcharged "Half penny."

MONACO-It seems we are to have new stamps from here soon.

NEW ZEALAND-Stamps are to be issued for the Insurance Department, with representation of a lighthouse from which proceeds a beam of light, inscribed "Government Insurance."

RUSSIA-Le T. P. says the 3 2 roubles now has thuederbolts and the $3+3 \mathrm{k}$. card has now the inscriptions red instead of black.

SAN MARINO-There are postal packet cards similar to those of Italy, with arms of the Republic and stamp like that on the post cards. They are all printed in blue on cards of various colors as follows: 25 c. salmon, 50c. white, 75 c . rose, 1l. 25c. green, 11.75 c . yellow, 21. 70c. gray.

SERVIA-The 5p, card has the arms at the left and the frame carmine.

ST. HELENA-The S. N. says the 1d. has been seen with surcharge in blue instead of black.

ST. VINCENT-The 4d. claret is surcharged " $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$."

VICTORIA-The 1d. is red brown instead of hrown.

WESTERN AUSTRALIA-The new cards are reported, 2 d . rose on white and 3d. green on buff. The have stamps of the type.

ZANZIBAR-These stamps trun out to be frauds.

## THE BLACK SHEEP OF PHILATELY.

## BEING A FEW REMARIS ON A GROWING EVII

 AND A PRACTICAI, SUGGESTION FOR ITS ABATEMENT.BY W. H. BRUCE.
There is probably no pursuit of the present day, whether followed as a pastime or as a source of revenue, which affords to those dishonestly inclined such a field for the indulgence of this depravity as that of stamp collecting. The natur: of the business necessitates, to a greater or less extent, the interchange of confidences and the outcome, if disastrous to either party is almost always found to be against the dealer. This personage is not, however, by any means the greatest sufferer at the hands of the stamp swindler, as it is only during his novitate, or say first year of business, that the balance shows on the wrong side of his ledger; after that he learns even if business is a little dull, to drop the post card with a polite request for " a few sheets of good salable foreign stamps, and a few United States," into the catch-all under his desk, while the honest collector who has a ferw duplicates to exchange and is hoodwinked by the highly flavoured account of "a nice lot of rare stamps to exchange for others not in my collection," becomes the victim of misplaced confidence. The average approval sheet fraud is not, perhaps, naturally dishonest; the vein is acquired through a desire to possess something his means will not admit of his purchasing. In most cases that have come to our notice, the individual began by promptly returning the first, sometimes the second and third consignments, then as his collection grew larger and his loose change not sufficient to cancel obligations for rarer specimens taken from sheets, he forgets to answer, and it is a perpetual forget thereafter, unless some un-
pleasant development of the case jogs his mem ory again. In a good many instances the dealer has only himself to thank, as the simplest precautions exercised by the average business man are neglected, and goods sent on a first ap. plication without reference and without guaran. tee to parties entirely unknown. A glance at those petty approval sheet thieves, as given in the columns of the various journals from time to time, show them to be invariably collectors whose names can be found nowhere else in philatelic literature. They are members of no socicty, local or general, do not appear even in the most exhaustive directcries, in fact if you locate and interview them you will find the name represented every time by an irresponsible youth of anywhere from twelve to sixteen years!

They are delicate subjects to handle though we will admit, tender and tough; tender in their innocence of any wrong intent, and tough in insolence made easy by the feeling of security that distance lends them.

It very often happens that while one of these amature confidence men secures selections from a dozen or more dealers, not one of them follows the matter up further than by sending the defaulters a few unbusinesslike letters threatening dire punishment if returns are not made at once, etc., these are in most cases ignored, the dire punishment does not come, and thenceforth, facilis est descensus Averri. It is the natural development of the first perverse inclination to acquire by roguery what he cannot obtain by honesty. There have been many means tried to eradicate this paraste, and to secure to dealers some degree of safety in the circulation of their goods, with but indifferent success thus far. He may be attending school and handling sheets under half-a-dozen different aliases. There may be several of him, each with haif-a-dozen different addresses. In one case, on investigation, we found an amateur club of some thirty collectors, not one of them over fifteen years old, all receiving sheets from various deulers. and in high glee over the profits which went into school-boy nicknacks.

We presume most dealers have special methods of their own for handling this class of trade, and it seems to us that some feasible
general plan could be adopled for the suppresrion of this growing evil or the reducing of it to such a minimum that a much groater degree of confidence could be established between the col ${ }^{-}$ lector and the dealer than now exists. While the majority of dealers are located in the larger cities the collector may be found in almost every city, town and village in the land. The interests of the dealer and of the collector are identical; the existance of the one is essential to that of the other. yet the former may be said to assume all the risks, the latter none. For every dishonest collector there are a dozen honest ones. Wherever a dishonest collector hails from, the chances are that onc or more thoroughly reliable collectrins may also be found. We have thought over uumerous plans and worked out several suggestions. But it seems to us tisat the following based on a principle of healthy and hearty co-operation would more effectually tend to lessen the evil than auy other. The honest collectors should assist the honest dealer, and vice versa. We have had this system in use for years and it works admirably, not only for the dealer but for the collector at large. Select one or two of your best customers in each locality, arrange with him to look up any crooked person in his vicinity. You can do so in numerous ways. We find it most convenient to allow an extra commission; the party once exposed seldom re-enters the business. With all large dealers working in harmony on this one plan, and all collectors consulting some repucable dealer before sending their exchanges, it scems to us some degree of safety would soon be assured. Neither dealer nor collector should send stamps to be called for in the general delivery, and they should always as far as possible bave the street address of their customer. The sending of large invoices or valuable exchange sheets to foreign collectors, unless sent under guarantee, is inadvisable as it much too frequently results in a direct loss to the sender.

Why should anyone be asked to reduce price of stamps about 25 or 30 per cent., and then be obliged to wait a year or more after paying the manager 10 per cent. for his trouble in making a sale. I hupe the members of the Executive will see that this grievance is remedied.

The present system of permitting the public to order any size of the larger denominations of United States envelopes has proved so annoying that we should not be surprised to find this privilege limited to at least certain specific sizes, after the new schedule appears-

Mr. A. R. Rogers, Assistant Purchasing Agent A. P. A., 75 Maiden Lane, New York, has kindly consented to act in the same capacity for the C. P. A., in connection with the auction sale of the " J. R. Hooper collection," and will receive bids from Canadian collectors desirous of placing them with him.

On January lst, 1891, the Staudard Stamp Co., of St . Louis, begin the publication of a high class Philatelic magazine to be known as the Standard Philatelist. The Standard Stamp Co. have always been liberal advertisers, and we are certain we voice the sentiments of the Philatelic press in general when wo wish them every success in their undertaking.

There will be three envelopes of large size on the next schedule. Nos. 7 and 8 of the present issue will reman the same in size but will be officially designated as "Official" and "Extra Large Official," respectively : but an entirely new size, $4 \frac{1}{3} x \sqrt[3]{ }$ in. and termed "Large Official," is provided for. It will be seen that this is just about intermediate in size between Nos. 7 and 8.

One surprise of the present issue of United States envelopes is the recent appearance in the mails of an entirely new shape for size No. 9. We have heard of this on white and amber paper. The envelope is one-eighth of an inch longer than the old No. 9. The gum is much different from anything that has ever appeared in a United States envelope, being nearly seven-cighths of an inch broad at the point of flap, and tapering off gradually to each side, where it quite narrow.

The trial of John Borgeson, alias the Union Stamp Co., occurred in Chicago Nov. 24th, and resulted in his conviction; but sentence was not passed upon him until the 16 th, inst., when Judge Blodget of the U. S. District Court awarded him eighteen months in the peniten. tiary. Soon after the stamps taken from him by Capt. Fleming, were turned over to Ben. W. Carrington, but upon examination, proved to be mere trash, worth not more than $\$ 3$ or $\$ 4$, and impossible to identify as to ownership. They were therefore returned to the Inspector at once, and I doubt if there is much chance of anything being recovered from the Union Stamp Co.

There has been quite a revolution in the Metropolitan Philatelist. A new board of managers takes charge from the December number. Mr. Gregory's resignation as manager of the Brouklyn Club, was accepted with regrets aud a vote of thanks giveu him for his past services. Mr. Sheridan succeeds him. Mr. Corwin and Mr. Scott were dropped at a joint meeting of the three Metropolitan socicties and Mr. F. W. Hunter and Mir. R. F. Albrecht appointed in their places. We predict a great improvement in the tone of the paper hereafter, and that the rule adopted in the beginning, of "no personalities," will have no exceptions.Philatelic World.

Sitting in Durbin \& Hanes' store the other day, we had the pleasure of secing the printers' proof of their new catalogue, which is nearly done, and will be issued shortly. We found many new improvements and additions-the increase in size is very noticeable. One of the new additions consists of several pages of fac similes of watermarks. As now collectors are looking after watermarks, it will be of great help to them. While there we were surprised at the local demand for their packets and sets. Mr. Hanes says that the mail demand has doubled, showing that new collectors are increasing all the time. A day could be spent interestingly studying the various types of customers, from the small boy with a few cents to invest to the old man hunting after rarieties and oddities, willing to spend dollars.-Quctier City Fhilatelist.
