We have received an intimation from the Post Master of St. John, N. B., that the REVIEW, addressed to Captains Goldard, Campbell and Parkes are not taken out of that office not being called for. A short time ago we were informed that these gentlemen did not get their papers. Will our agent in that city see to it.

WHELAN, the murderer, has expiated on the scaffold his participation in the horrible crime which robbed our country of one of its brightest ornaments. The terrible tragedy, the first scenes of which were played in Montreal, reached its awful climax in Ottawa, had its miserable by-play in the Courts at Toronto, has had a partial denouncement at Carleton Jail on Thursday last, but is not yet concluded. We believe that eventually the whole history of the conspiracy of which the Hon. T. D. McGee was the victim will yet be made known to the world and brought home to the assassins. That Whelan was not the only one in the transaction is now pretty well believed by all who have watched the slow development of the trial. He has suffered for his share, but, we believe, others will yet stand arraigned for participation with him. It is well that we have a strong Government backed by a loyal people, for there are moving about in our own midst a class of men so degraded and lost to all sense of justice and humanity, that they not only sympathize with Whelan, but glory in the crime for which he suffered. Of this class were the two disguised ruffians who sought a medical gentleman of this city to request him to administer chloroform to the convict on the gallows, that he might not suffer pain in the execution.

In refusing to give up the body the authorities acted wisely, for we are informed that it was the intention of certain people in Montreal to have a grand demonstration at his funeral in that city. We are glad the design was frustrated. There is something exceedingly revolting in the idea of connecting the name of a confessed assassin with a people who heartily despise him and the vile faction to which he belonged and of which he was the infatuated tool.

Now that the whole trial is ended and its legitimate conclusion achieved, it is satisfactory to reflect that the prisoner has had the full benefit of the law, and the services of the ablest Counsel in the country. None can say hereafter that he did not get justice or that he was vengefully hurried to execution without having every chance of proving his innocence. It is also satisfactory to know that he acknowledged his participation in the crime. His guilt is thus placed beyond a doubt, and we are only sorry his accomplices did not suffer with him.

Connected with the reorganization of the Militia of Canada there has been a vast amount of labor, which has fallen principally to the share of Lt. Colonel Powell, A. A. G., and he deserves infinite credit for the manner in which he has discharged the arduous duties devolving upon him. In no former period of Canadian military history has any officer had to perform like services bearing any proportion or analogy to those required by the provisions of the new Militia Act. For some time past the Adjutant General's Department has been no

sinicure for those employed there. By the kindness of Colonel Powell we had an opportunity, during a recent visit, of forming something like a correct estimation of the amount of labor to be got through with in setting the new machinery in working order. The destruction of the Desbarats printing establishment was not the least of the troubles which had to be contended with. After weeks of labor the whole of the appointments and other matters connected with the Reserve Force were definitely arranged, put in type, the last proofs corrected and returned to the Queen's Printers. Next morning the whole was in ashes and, Col. Powell had not even the scratch of a pen remaining of all his labors. Of course the whole thing had to be done over again, and hence the delay and difficulty. However we are glad to see that all has now been overcome and set right again, and the thanks of the country are due to Colonel Powell and his subordinates for the able discharge of their duties, signalized as they have been by extraordinary difficulties.

The Woodstock *Times* wants to know—If it is intended that officers will enforce the provisions of the 51st section of the Militia Law, while its penalty goes into the public Treasury, the Captain of the company being responsible for all stores. Perhaps the Review can enlighten us on this head, pointing out the direction, which, according to the Act the money penalty takes after passing into the hands of the Magistrate." If our contemporary will turn to the 90th section of the Militia Act he will find the following:—"Every penalty when recovered shall be paid over to the Receiver General: but Her Majesty may remit any penalty incurred under the provisions of this Act."

## VOLUNTEERING IN NEW BRUNSWICK.

SAINT JOHN, N.B., January 27th, 1869.

*To the Editor of THE VOLUNTEER REVIEW.*

SIR,—During the first three or four years after the landing of the Loyalists in 1783, a large portion of those who intended to make the city of Saint John, their future home and place of business, were occupied in the erection of Wharves and Stores, with dwelling apartments under the same roof, for the accommodation of their families and trade operations.

In less than five years, the trade of the port began to show signs of importance; and before the tenth year had arrived, commercial operations had assumed such dimensions, and the accumulation of property had become so evident, that their defenceless condition began to attract the attention of those of the Merchants and Mechanics who were getting ahead and had something to lose, and led them to think of and devise some plan by which to improve the safety of their positions.

In the month of January 1793, a meeting of the merchants and mechanics was held in the Ball Room of the Old Coffee House at the foot of King street, now the site of the Imperial buildings owned by Mr. John Nillis and occupied by Magee Bros. to take into consideration the desirability of forming a Company of Artillery to aid in the protection of the harbour in case of any emergency arising to require their services. At the meeting it was unanimously resolved to form a company of Artillery, and a committee was appointed to draw up a code of laws for its governance, and report the same to an adjourned meeting to be held on the following week. The meeting was held, the committee reported a constitution which was unanimously approved of and adopted, and a battery of artillery organized bearing the title of "The Loyal Volunteer Artillery of New Brunswick." John Clowell, merchant, was chosen captain, and under his command, the Battery made its first parade for inspection on the 4th day of May 1793. The number of officers, non commissioned officers and gunners, on the muster roll, was ninety six, and comprised nearly all the leading merchants and mechanics in St. John at that period. A copy of the original muster roll is now in my possession. In those days it was the custom of those merchants connected with shipping, to close business about 4 p.m. and after dinner, for those who belonged to the artillery, to give an hour or two on two or three days of each week to drill, while others would engage at a game of base ball on a portion of King's Square, which had been prepared for the purpose. For several consecutive days before each yearly inspection, the members of the Battery would give close application to drill, and so great was their ambition to make a good appearance, that the battery invariably received the unequal-

led commendations of the inspecting officer. On the demise of Capt. Colwell, the command of the Battery was given to Andrew Crookshank, another of the "old merchants," and there is a gentleman still living in this city, who joined its ranks under his command in the year 1809.

In the year 1808 the first Battery of Royal Artillery landed on these shores, their arrival afforded so much pleasure to the inhabitants, that they resolved to entertain the men of the battery with a public feast. The necessary arrangements were soon completed, and the tables spread with everything considered necessary for such a purpose. The spot chosen for the feast was a green lying between Britain and Main streets, Lower Cove, in the immediate vicinity of the quarters which they were to occupy. On the debarkation of the Battery the men were marched from the place of landing to the place of feasting, where from 2 until 5 o'clock in the afternoon all hands enjoyed themselves to their hearts content. The two greatest and most highly prized of all the luxuries with which the tables were covered, were the "Old Jamaica Rum Punch" and "Smoked Herrings." Several of the men of that Battalion left the service and settled here. During the period from 1806 to 1812 the ranks of the Volunteer Artillery became reduced by the death of several of its members, and the absence of others from the Province on foreign voyages, but when the war of 1812 was declared, "the old spirit of '88 was renewed in all its intensity," and the muster roll was once more filled up to its original standard by a body of men ready and willing for any service that might have been required.

NEW BRUNSWICK ARTILLERYMAN.

FROM QUEBEC.

[BY OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]

An advertisement in yesterday's *Chronicle* notified a company of the 8th Battalion, that as the militia authorities have refused to allow the battalion the use of the Drill Shed there will be no more drill until further orders. A correspondent of the same paper a couple of days ago, complains that no fires are allowed to be made in the shed on drill nights, and as the men are obliged, from the raggedness, or utter want of great coats, to drill in summer uniform, anyone acquainted with the climate of Quebec can form an idea of how pleasant it must be, and what great inducements are offered to volunteers to attend drill. The real cause of the order is I understand, that on a very cold night some of the men took the liberty of lighting a couple of the stoves, which greatly incensed some dignitary who had been calculating on economizing the firewood, presuming that as the other Battalion, had completed their annual drill in the summer, the Eighth could either go without drill, or do without firewood, neither of which they seem disposed to do. I am opposed to rais-

ing questions unnecessarily, but this very small affair looks so peculiar that it should be enquired into. The economical gentleman in Quebec will not I trust be backed up by the Department in Ottawa.

The Local Legislature are likely to injure their healths by too much work; they generally meet at 3 o'clock and adjourn at a quarter past. Some foolish grumblers (there always are some in every community) are commencing to ask "Is there any use or having a local government? The Hon. Mr. Treasurer Dunkin has been ill for some time but is now at work again; the Assembly will consider the question of supplies on Friday next.

The billiard exhibition in the Music Hall, on Monday last between Dion and Foster, was rather thinly attended. Dion won both the games which were played.

The announcement of the withdrawal of the Regular Troops from Canada has caused much surprise here, it is hoped that the British Government may think better of it before the time comes.

If all the troops are withdrawn it becomes a question whether the Volunteers are not a little more valuable than they have hitherto been considered, but perhaps Sir George is going to depend on his drafted militia.

The weather has been cold for the last few days, to day we have quite a heavy snow storm.

FROM BROCKVILLE.

[BY OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]

Every thing is quiet in Volunteer circles, that it is almost useless to attempt anything this week in the way of correspondence, the District Staff seem to be fully occupied with office work, which is doubtless owing to the re organization, which is now supposed to be about complete, under the new law.

Large loads of tent-pins are being delivered at the Brigade Office by contractors for the country, I understand that Lt. Col. Wily, Superintendent of Stores, is expected here this week to inspect them, previous to shipment to the different districts of the Dominion. Colonel Powell, D. A. G., has certainly acted wisely in procuring these articles in the country, by which means, a number of persons find temporary employment, and the money which comes out of the pockets of the people for the support of the militia, is retained in the Dominion, and I believe the articles are procured at a considerable less price than if they were drawn from the Imperial stores.

The heavy snow storm on Wednesday, put a stop to the races on the ice, which commenced here on Tuesday, after two days of anxious waiting for fair weather, during which time a great variety of cattle, with legs bandaged and bodies heavily blanketed from the nose to the tail, (the latter appendage with the eyes, being the

only things visible, consequently (the quality of the steeds could not well be judged) were exercised through the streets, much to the gratification of curious youths; but on the third day, these men of the whip, with their muffled horses and spider cutters, left for other fields to try their prowess.

A friend is informed by private letter from Aldershot, that "The Duke" is introducing there, some new dodges in drill, which he seems to have picked up while travelling on the continent, to wit: Officers salute while marching past in quick time as follows: Ranks remain closed, officers take post in front with swords carried as cavalry, the scabbard in the left hand (not looped up) with point to the front pointing downwards at an angle, salute in two motions, one, bring the sword up to the recover; two, lower the hand and point as formerly. This of course is of no earthly use except for parade purposes. But if introduced, the Volunteers could without any difficulty, adopt it.

Lines of contiguous columns are now formed with much greater intervals, and a subdivision placed on either flank, extended about two paces, which causes the line to look continuous, and when coming near the enemy, at once double out and extend to regular skirmishing distance, by which the whole line is covered, and the columns left in tact.

This gives a chance for Canadian Drill Reformers to make comments

#### FROM TORONTO.

[BY OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.]

It is rumoured that the withdrawal of Her Majesty's troops will not take place until the early part of July instead of 1st of May as originally intended.

A private meeting of some of the principal citizens was convened at the Mayor's office to discuss the possibility of retaining a portion of the troops, for which purpose the Mayor was requested to ascertain whether any representations would be of any avail. It is believed, however, that being a part of the Imperial policy, all efforts will prove useless. The 13th Hussars proceed to Ireland for two years and from thence to India to complete their foreign service; the artillery battalion here and at London return direct to England, and the 29th Regt. will be stationed at Quebec. Owing to the mild weather the troops parade in their summer uniforms. All the troops in garrison were reviewed a few days ago, Gen. Stisted in presence of General Jackson and Colonel Montgomery U. S. A. who had come to this city to attend a ball given by the officers of the 29th Regiment. Our cousins expressed their pleasure at the manoeuvres gone through. Washington's Birthday will be celebrated in this city by the "New England Society" who will hold their 6th annual social assembly at the

Rossin House on Feb. 22nd. The county council are considering the amount to be appropriated in order to secure a like amount from the Government for the construction of Drill Sheds in this county, (York.) One of the council introduced a resolution in favour of "aid to Volunteers while on active service" this latter item, however, has been deferred until they meet again in June.

The squad who have just passed the "Gunnery School" have been highly complimented on their proficiency by Colonel Radcliffe, commandant in Canada. Col. Anderson, C. B., R. A., conducted the examination which was witnessed by Capt. Sandham, the Adjutant of the School, Col. Durie, A. A. G., and Col. Denison, Brigade Major.

The 18 pounder was manipulated in 45 seconds; 13 seconds less than any previous squad. Lieut. Nimmo, of the celebrated Welland Canal Battery, was one of the fourteen graduates, who were comprised of gentlemen from Trenton, Belleville, Kingston, Welland and Toronto.

The proposition to place the Military Schools, after the troops are withdrawn, under volunteer officers met with general approbation. Such gentlemen would know better the requirements of our system than the various regular officers who are constantly being changed. The London Infantry school would in no manner lose its status under the control of such an able and popular officer as Brigade Major R. B. Denison.

#### THE ARMIES OF CONTINENTAL EUROPE.

The nations of Europe will appear to be disquieted, and despite the pacific utterances of the Emperor Napoleon and the King of Prussia, there seems to be a very general feeling prevailing that war cannot long be postponed. We can scarcely wonder that such is the case when we consider the immense armies which are now maintained by the leading continental powers, and the antagonistic feelings which exist, not only between France and Prussia, but also between some of the other nations of Europe. If France and Prussia would arrive at a friendly understanding, and if Prussia and Austria, forgetful of the summer campaign of 1866, would unite for defensive purposes, peace would be insured. France and Prussia are in reality the only two nations among whom are to be found any large number of persons who really desire war. Austria certainly does not want to fight, she requires time for the healing of her wounds and the reorganization of her new political system. Russia is not ready for war, her soldiers are very poorly armed and her artillery force not fit to compete with that of other great nations. A correspondent of the London Times has lately prepared a very full and explicit statement respecting the armies of Europe, their number and efficiency, from which we briefly summarize. France in the event of war can command the services of 800,000 regular troops backed by 550,000 men of the Garde Mobile, total 1,350,000 men, supported by a fleet which is allowed to be second only to that of Great Britain. The North German Bund's army foots up as

follows: standing army, 813,391; Landwehr 185,552; total 1,028,946. South Germany, standing army, 156,760; Landwehr, 13,411, total 200,171. North and South Germany united, 1,229,117. Austria, regular forces including navy and reserves, 800,000; Border troops, 53,000; Landwehr, 200,000. Russia, field army, 827,350; local forces, 410,427; irregulars, 229,223. Italy, regular troops, 348,461; Mobile National Guard, 132,000; total, 480,461. Here then without including the armies of Spain, Belgium and other minor powers, we find that at the first alarm of war France, Germany, Austria, Russia and Italy, can place upwards of five and a half millions of soldiers in the field. While such enormous armies are at the disposal of four or five men peace, in Europe can scarcely be counted upon ascertain for a single week.—*Montreal Daily News.*

#### THE DUKE OF MONTPENSIER.

All the advices which during the past few weeks, have been received from Spain represent it as probable that the Duke of Montpensier will be chosen by the Constituent Assembly King of Spain. Antoine Marie Philippe Louis d'Orleans, Duke of Montpensier, is the fifth son of the late King Louis Philippe of France, and was born July 31, 1824. He received his education in the College Henri IV., and in 1842, after a special examination, joined the 3rd Regiment of Artillery as Lieutenant. In 1844, he went to Algeria, where he took part in the expedition against Biskara and distinguished himself in the campaign of Ziban. In the latter he was slightly wounded near the left eye, and in reward received the Cross of the Legion of Honor and the *epaulette* of a *chef d'escadron*. After accompanying his father to England, he returned, in 1845, to Algeria, and again distinguished himself in an expedition against the Kabyls. Soon after he left Algeria, to visit Tunis, Egypt, Syria, Constantinople and Greece. After his return to France he was appointed Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor and Brigadier General.

In October, 1846, French diplomacy brought about a marriage between the Duke of Montpensier and the Princess Maria Louisa Ferdinandina of Spain, the only sister of Queen Isabella II., simultaneously with a marriage between the Queen and her cousin. These "Spanish marriages" had been the subject of long diplomatic intrigues and conflicts, and when it became known that Louis Philippe had succeeded in carrying out his plans the liveliest dissatisfaction was felt at the English Court, for in diplomatic circles it was regarded as certain that the marriage of Queen Isabella would remain without issue, and that her sister would be her successor. In 1848, the Duke, with all the other members of the Royal family, was banished from France. He at first remained for a time in England; from there went to Holland, and finally established his residence at Seville, in Spain. The Queen conferred upon him the title of Infante of Spain, and, on Oct. 10, 1859, appointed him Captain General of the Spanish army. Notwithstanding these high positions, the Duke kept almost entirely aloof from Spanish politics. In the numerous and fierce conflicts between Moderados, the Liberal Union, and the Progressists, the name of the Duke of Montpensier is rarely mentioned. He enjoyed the reputation, like his father, of being an excellent financier, and of increasing his private property with amazing rapidity.



## MISCELLANEOUS.

**THE FRENCH ARMAMENTS.**—The Toulon papers state that the preparations being made there exceed everything that has taken place since the Crimean war.

A MAN down East, describing the prevalence of duelling, summed up with "They fight with daggers in a room as dark as pitch." "Is it possible?" was the reply. "Possible Sir! Why, I've seen them!"

**CAPTAIN COWPER P. COLES, C.B.**, has been making experiments at Portsmouth Dockyard with regard to the bottoms of iron ships and the disposition of their guns and armour. He states that his success has exceeded his anticipations.

The fatal accuracy which improvements in the breech-loading rifles are giving to the fire of troops of line, has led to the introduction into European armies of systems of spade-drill, for the purpose of teaching soldiers to throw up temporary defenses with the greatest possible rapidity.

We have recently seen an account of experimental intrenching at Shoeburyness, after a plan practiced at the French camp of Chalons. A parapet three feet high was thrown up in front and in each flank of the gun, the ditch in front being on the outside of the work and in flank on the inside. The labor occupied about an hour, and the result was less satisfactory than that obtained by the English fashion of intrenching the gun in a pit or parapet of the same height. In the English way the work was done in half an hour.

Few besides the practical mariners are aware of the fact that every iron ship has a magnetic history and peculiarity of her own. When built she must be swung all the way around so that the variations of her compass may be noted and regulated by placing boxes of chains ect., at proper points. It is believed that many disasters to this class of craft, which occurred when they first came into use, arose from the neglect of the above mentioned precaution. A vessel built lying north and south is thought to be less subject to the dreaded variations of the magnetic needle than one built lying east and west.

**SINGULAR SHELL ACCIDENT AT VARNA.**—A curious accident occurred recently at Varna, which is thus described by a correspondent on the spot:—While some workmen were pulling down an old house in the town to make room for a Government office, now in course of construction, they came on one of the shells thrown by the Russians during the bombardment of 1828, which had since remained quietly imbedded in the thickness of a corner wall, amid rubbish and mortar. No match of course remained, and the touch-hole was full of dirt. One of the workmen, an Albanian, rolled the projectile down, and taking it between his knees, began clearing it out with a chisel, when suddenly it exploded, threw down all round, wounded people, and killed the Albanian on the spot, cutting off both his legs at the hips. The unlucky man was a Christian of the Greek rite, and thus added one more to the long list of his co-nationals who have owed their destruction to Russian intervention on their behalf.

**ANECDOTE OF SIR HOPE GRANT.**—St. Andrew's Day was observed with true national spirit by the Scotsmen in Bombay. One of the speakers, at a public dinner held in the afternoon, said; "I think, gentlemen, we are now in a country in which it is peculiarly applicable to praise Scotch soldiers because the English army in England, as well as the Indian army in India, have had, for many things, to thank their last two Scotch Commanders-in-Chief. I allude to the veteran Lord Clyde—(applause)—and the dashing, painstaking soldier, Sir Hugh Rose, now Lord Strathnairn. (Applause). Dr Russell, of the "Times" painted in those vivid colors in which he could so well paint, all the miseries and hardships of our poor fellows in the front: but as a contrast he talked of the Highland Brigade and Sir Colin Campbell in lavender at Balaklava, Lord Raglan gave the paper containing the letter to Sir Colin. I suppose no other gentleman was ever in such a rage in this century. I may not repeat to you the language he used, but after vomiting all his Scotch vocabulary, and his French vocabulary, also—for he spoke French like a native—upon the devoted head of Dr Russell, there was a sort of light in his eye, as he said, "Lavender, Lavender! I only wish Dr. William Howard Russell could smell my auld leather breeks." [Roars of laughter.] And there was another Scotsman of note in this country—Sir Hope Grant. [Hear, hear.] I remember hearing a story about him. I remember, at a railway station in India, while waiting for a train, a man came and sat down behind me, and I began talking about subjects that would interest him, and we became immense friends. He said he admired Sir Hope Grant very much; as he went on, I gave him a glass of beer, and he went on to say, "I remember one action in which our guns were firing away, silencing the enemy's guns on the other side of the river. The bridge was intact, and the ninth Lancers were ordered to go across the river and charge the guns. Well, we trotted across the bridge, and we formed on the other side, and we charged these guns till the guns had ceased firing, and there were one or two Ghuznees, or what do you call them, at the head of the regiment. Sir Hope was riding at a hard canter, and just in front of him was a sepoy, who lifted his piece to his shoulder and covered Sir Hope. Well, Sir Hope rode on to within ten yards of the man, and called out, "Shoulder arms." The man was an obedient soldier, and shouldered arms, and the next moment Sir Hope's point was through the man's breast. 'Pity,' said Sir Hope, as he wiped his reeking sword, "he was a good soldier—he obeyed orders." [Laughter.]

The Clonmel correspondence of the *Irish Times* is responsible for the following:—"Lord Strathnairn, commanding the forces in Ireland, arrived in Clonmel on Monday morning, and inspected the troops in garrison. During the inspection of the hospital a remarkable event took place. His Lordship going from bed to bed, inquired the nature of each man's malady, giving as he went a kind word to each. On arriving at the bed of a dragoon, who had been in hospital for the last fortnight labouring under what was to be believed to be an incurable aberration of mind, caused by injuries sustained in the head from the kick of a horse, his Lordship, as usual, inquired his ailment,

and the surgeon, knowing the man's inability to account for himself, was proceeding to explain the case to his Lordship, when to the astonishment of all present, the man, fixing his eyes on his chief, who was well known to him, suddenly became conscious, and reason having, as if by magic, resumed her sway, he explained how he had been injured, which to that moment was not known, even to the surgeon. The man's recovery was so sudden and so complete that his Lordship said he could not believe his ailment to have been as stated, were it not vouched for beyond a doubt by the surgeon."

The *Gazette du Midi* has an account of what it calls a Naval Velocipede, invented by Capt. Du Buisson, commanding the yacht *Jerome Napoleon*, which belongs to Prince Napoleon of France. This singular little machine is composed of two parallel tubes of cast iron, cigar-shaped, which are connected by iron cross pieces. In the centre is a propelling wheel, covered by a house or drum, on the top of which the person using the vessel for the time sits comfortably in a sort of saddle, with stirrups. By means of these last, and of a hand crank upon each side, he gives the wheel its motion, precisely as it is given to a velocipede on shore. The novel craft can readily be propelled, against wind and tide at the rate of six miles an hour, and the *Gazette* informs us that the one which belongs to the Prince's yacht may be seen any day in Toulon roads, dashing by at that speed, and startling the uninitiated. The invention is welcomed with the highest commendation, as one of great simplicity and practical utility. In the port of Baltimore, where the cigar-shaped hull appears to have had its origin, we hope to see the idea of the ingenious Frenchman carried out, with the improvements which the fertile skill of our mechanics will doubtless suggest and apply.
