-Albert Demers, men's furnishings, Montreal, has assigned with liabilities of about \$4,000. He began in the spring of 1885 and was doing fairly but got a set back through being obliged to move on account of the widening of Notre Dame street west, and he has meantime been gradually going behind—F. X. Labranche & Co., general dealers of Thetford Mines, Que., has assigned, showing liabilities of \$12,000. The present firm was in existence since the spring of '08, when they succeeded Labranche & Frere, but owing to keen competition and dull trade have not been able to make headway, and have been in hard-up shape for some time-J. N. Duguay, general dealer, also in cheese factories, &c., at La Baie, Que., has assigned, showing liabilities of \$61,000. This failure has caused quite a surprise. About a year or 18 months ago he claimed a surplus of about \$20,000 and now shows a deficit of about \$3,000. He is believed to have done too large a business for his means. He had cheese factories at different points; he also manufactured wire fencing and did a large trade but had too many irons in the fire; was too sanguine and over enterprising-S. Charron, grocer, Montreal, already noted, has assigned-Louis Perrault, shoes, Montreal, already noted, has assigned. Liabilities \$62,000, direct and indirect-M. Rodrique & Co., grocery, Montreal, has compromised at 20c in the dollar. In business about 9 years, and did an average retail

grocery trade, but are said to have lost some money in outside ventures, and went behind. Liabilities about \$4,000-D. Charron, grocer, Hull, Que., is offering 10 in the dollar, on liabilities of about \$2,000. Has been in business for some years, but has had a large family and trade was limited-C. A. Lavigne, grocer, Montreal, already noted, is now offering 80c in the dollar, cash. -Hunt, Barnes & Co., wholesale oysters, Montreal, have fyled consent to assign. They began in 1885, with N. W. Smith as sole proprietor. He had some capital but the trade seems to have been an unprofitable one and sunk his means. He lost considerable on stocks of fish held over, &c. FRENCH FASHIONS IN JEWELLERY.

Narrow bracelets only are shown; linked gold bracelets with several stones mounted on the outer side, rows of colored stones, tinted diamonds, emeralds, and topaz combined and (alas! for the superstitious) opals, chaste foliage, and geometric designs not exceeding half an inch in width. Earrings are no longer worn, even solitaires have gone out of fashion, and it might be supposed they had found their way into the rings, which are set with brilliants and pearls of hitherto unheard of size. The form of ring which is a long S bent into a hoop, the jewels at the extremities lying against each other diagonally, is the great favorite. Hopeful of combating the distaste for earrings, an enterprising jeweller has imagined a new design that may be described as a jewelled tip for the lobe of the ear, fastening upon it with a spring; and that there may be no mistake about the use for which it is intended, the interior of the case inclosing it has an ear embossed in pink velvet upon it. Talking of cases, often very fanciful articles, some of those provided for ladies' watches are made in form of a porte-monnaie; they are convenient, as they may be carried in the pocket.

Chains are extremely fashionable this year, and jewellers are showing them in great variety, but the fine gold chain, with the single pearl every four or five inches has the preference. A pretty chain of a fanciful description is composed of pearls set alternately with olive shaped beads of dull chased gold. Some chains are made of small black agate beads, also separated at



intervals by single pearls. There is a decided fancy for these black agate beads, which are deemed-not without reason-extremely becoming to the complexion; necklaces are made of them, their simplicity relieved by the addition of a diamond clasp. A row of black beads, divided on either side by a long S in diamonds makes a beautiful ornament for the throat. In the gold chains, pink coral beads are sometimes substituted for pearls. Chains are also made of black or blue steel-a metal in as high favor as ever-the pearls introduced as in those of the more precious metal; they are not only used for watches and eyeglasses, but chain perces and other knick-knacks, such as pencil cases, tiny powder boxes, mirrors, and charms, are suspended to them. These, however, must not be worn openly; it is not considered good form to have a bunch of trinkets dangling about the person-to say nothing of the risk-and it must be kept either in the breast pocket of the coat or beneath the folds of the dress, a little slit being provided in the side of the skirt for the purpose. Perhaps it is a feeling of the same nature that has led to the refraining from wearing watches attacked to breast-pins out of doors unless they be in black steel, when they attract little notice. At home, however, and even as a decoration for quite dressy toilets, the dainty little watch, hung to a true lover's knot, or other suitable device, is quite in keep-Severely simple ornamentations are preferred for watches.

In all cases the pin to which they are attached is invariably set with stones or enamelled to match.

LET THEM KNOW.

Inquiries continue to reach us almost daily from subscribers respecting houses in lines of trade not represented or not fully so in our advertising columns. Cases come occasionally to our notice of people sending to the United States and even to Europe for articles they want to buy although these goods are for sale in Montreal, Toronto and other cities of the Dominion by houses who "do not believe in advertising."

Let us urge upon all our readers to put up their signs all over Canada—in the columns of this paper. We have in our mind's eye sad examples of the neglect of this advice. A firm that opened up'in Victoria square, this city, some years ago with what might might be considered fair prospects of success, thought they advertised themselves sufficiently by erecting a staring sign in black and gold. They saw it two or three times a day themselves, and so did hundreds of citizens on their way to their clubs or homes, and the firm thought therefore that the whole world was reading it. Those who should be country customers—the great bulk of their trade—never saw it. The firm soon had to struggle to keep afloat; they finally abandoned the ship. They started again, but no wiser than before, they again



fell behind and a short time ago went into liquidation. It is well known that those who judiciously advertise what they want to buy or sell are almost certain to distance others in the race. Instances are not unknown of failure among judicious advertisers: but the trouble usually with them was that they were not satisfied with doing well, -- they ventured in stocks, they rushed into the wheat "pit" and "foremost fighting fell." One notable example of this is furnished by the square above mentioned, although a bandsome figure has been saved to the senior partner. The following is the last inquiry from readers :---

DEAR SIR,-Could you please inform me where and at what price can I buy an instrument for testing the strength of liquors. SOMETHING NEW IN STOVES.

A stove, which furnishes not only the heat, but also the electrical current for lighting a room, has been invented by Dr. Girard of Chantilly, France, as we learn from the American Manufacturer. This thermo-electric stove has the outward appearance of a cylinder provided with ribs. The ribs serve for the abundant radiation of heat and to promote the circulation of air in the room. In the hollow space between the outer and inner wall of the stove, the elements of the thermo-electrical column are arranged in rings above each other, so as to surround the stove in its entire height. Every one of these elements consists of a flat piece of sheet nickel or tin plate and an alloy, which is mainly composed of antimony and zinc with addition of small quantities of other metals. The mixture is selected so that the pieces obtain the necessary firmness and durability. The proper composition of the alloy is of special importance. Such a thermo-electrical stove with nickel elements is alleged to produce an electro-motoric power of 40 volts and a strength of current of four amperes. This production answers nominal requirements; by reduced heating it is increased correspondingly.

WHERE OUR FOREIGN HATS ARE MANUFACTURED.

Some years ago the great bulk of the straw hats used in Canada came from Luton and St. Albans, England. To-day the great bulk is made in Canada. Our own manufactures have so improved in style and quality that they can now compete fairly with the English market. We have factories in Montreal, at Marieville, St. Johns, P.Q., and Toronto, and these turn out very fine goods. In the manufacture of felt and fur hats, the English still control the markets of the world. This season has been disastrous to the hat and fur trade on account of the mild weather, but we trust that the great majority will pull through satisfactorily.

TRADE AND NAVIGATION.

The differences which beset the Cabinet at Ottawa during the last few weeks had the effect also of diverting attention from the parliamentary and departmental blue books with which we are usually favored at the opening of the Session. The Tables of Trade & Navi-

gation volume is among them. Although much of what it contains has already been given to our readers, it is deserving of more general survey.

The exports have decreased from \$117,524,950 to \$113,638,804; and the imports from \$123,474,940 to \$110,781,682. The imports for consumption fell from \$13,093,983 to \$105,252,511, and the duty from \$19,379,822 to \$17,877,269. Our aggregate trade with Great Britain was \$14,267,396 less than in 1894; with the United States \$7,088,157 more; with France \$1,600,000 less; with Germany nearly 2½ millions less; Italy about \$100,000 less; Holland nearly \$250,000 less; Belgium \$565,000 or nearly 50 per cent. less; Newfoundland about \$570,000 less; West Indies \$1,560,000 more; South America \$650,000 less; other countries about stationary.

Our exports to Great Britain fell off some \$6,600,000; to the United States they increased 5½ millions; to France we exported \$200,000 less; to Germany \$1,420,000 less, but 1894 was an unusually large year to that country; to Spain and Portugal each about \$20,000 less; to Italy we exported less than one-third of 1894; to Holland one-half of the previous year; to Belgium \$457,000 less; to Newfoundland \$493,000 less; to West Indies \$281,000 more; to South America \$90,000 less; to China and Japan \$162,000 less; and to Australia about \$95,000 more.

We bought from Great Britain about 7½ millions less; from the United States \$1,600,000 more (Americans now advertise in the JOURNAL OF COMMERCE); from France about \$50,000 less; from Germany about a million less; from Spain about \$12,000 more; from Portugal \$10,000 more; from Italy \$21,000 less; from Holland \$100,000 less; from Belgium about \$110,000 less; from Newfoundland \$75,000 less; from West Indies about 1¼ million more (West India merchants also advertise in our columns); from South America \$565,000 less; from China and Japan about same as in 1894; Switzerland \$15,000 less; and from all other countries about 1¼ million less.

The percentage of duty on the total value of goods entered for consumption, dutiable and free, during the fiscal year being reviewed is slightly under 17 per cent. (16.99), being the lowest of any year since 1879. It reached its maximum (21.65) in 1889 since which it has been steadily decreasing. The amount of duties paid per head of population was \$3.52 the lowest since 1880. It exceeded this figure in 1874-5 and 6. The maximum was \$5.23, in 1886. The population of the Dominion is shown to have increased during the year from 5,021,476 to 5,083,424.

going figures is largely due to the depreciation in prices which may be said to have reached the lowest level at the close of the fiscal year. During the former six months of 1895 prices were for the most part stationary or drooping, the first sign of a rise not being visible till August. The upward movement continued until late in November when a reaction took place, but the slackness to the close of the year may be attributed to the political complications, international and local, and to some extent to the shipbuilders' strike on the other side of the ocean. In England, whose markets rule the world, the general range of prices is still considerably above those at the beginning of 1895. The articles mostly contributing to the rise during the early half of the year are, cotton and cotton twist, hemp, jute, pig iron, copper, tin, lead, tallow, saltpetre, petroleum, wheat, oats, beef, sugar and rice. The following show a falling off in values: wool, silk. flax, coal, barley, mutton, coffee and tea. The articles showing an advance in the second half of the year are -cotton and twist, wool, silk, pig iron, steel rails, coal, lead, petroleum, barley, beef, mutton and tea. The other articles of the list given above show a decline. The principal demand was for steel rails. The lowest price of cotton (middlings) in England—equal to about 6c per lb,—on the 31st January last year met with a sharp advance, and although this sagged somewhat, the price is still comparatively high. Wool also felt the advance, and the present year is bright with promise.

Among the imports showing the principal falling off during the year are iron and steel and manufactures thereof which fell from \$8,776,533 to \$7,405,923. Leather and manufactures thereof show an increase in imports from \$970,577 to \$1,215,626. Sugar of all kinds shows an increase in imports from a value of \$116,558 to \$937,703. Tea fell from \$175,998 to \$61,327, and wool and manufactures of wool from \$9,490,000 to \$7,950,-000. Tobacco leaf shows a decrease in import of nearly \$400,000 or about 25 per cent. less. There were 20 million pounds less of cotton wool and waste than 1894. We sent coal to the United States to the value \$3,232,825, and we bought coal from that country to the value of about five millions. PREFERENTIAL TRADE.

It would have been a grave mistake to have deprived the Board of Trade of an opportunity of hearing, and the public one of learning, the views of Sir Charles Tupper in regard to "Preferential Trade Relations between Great Britain and her Colonies" because of his having, as it said "re-entered political life." We have never heard of Sir Charles having gone out of political life; his office in England is a political one for it places him in charge of the political interests of Canada in the motherland. If our Board of Trade are

never to be addressed by those who are identified with any political party we shall have no addresses made before such bodies of any public interest, as every man who has experience and talent enough to command such an audience as a Board of Trade provides, necessarily has his convictions on political affairs.

Sir Charles dilated upon his favorite topic at much length, and with the old time vigor and earnestness which has caused him to be dubbed "a war horse," whose nostrils breathe fire, and whose nervous action tells of his "delighting in battle." He made a strong

as one creditor expressed it, "nothing we did not know before."

It will be seen elsewhere that Mr. Kennedy has just been elected Treasurer of the Commercial Travellers' Mutual Benefit Society. Those who remember the approach which the Licensed Victuallers' Association as

a body wished, not long ago, to make towards him as mayor of the Queen City, and how he gave them in return the cold shoulder, may perhaps ruminate a little on the mutability of mundane affairs. point so far as the English side of this question goes, by stating that Great Britain's exports since 1890 had declined \$238,500,000 which was caused by the persistent raising of hostile tariffs by foreign countries. The decline of British agriculture shown by three million acres of land having been changed from wheat-growing to pasture is well known. We are not able to see how this could be remedied, if a remedy is desirable, by England's placing a duty on foreign wheat other than Colonial. Were there a duty placed on foreign wheat sufficient to so far raise its price in England as to make

growing that cereal again profitable, it would proportionately lessen the market for Colonial wheat, and counteract to that extent any preferential benefit given to this country and other colonies which send wheat to the old land. If it is answered that the resumption of wheat growing on three million acres which have been devoted to cattle raising, would enlarge the market for our cattle, we have but to remember how obstinately the British authorities have obstructed our trade in this respect to see that British agriculturists would offer strong opposition to the increased importations of

our cattle. The position would be this: English farmers by growing more wheat would make the demand for our cattle more active, so what benefit they got by enlarged wheat production they would be in danger of losing by increased competition with foreign cattle raisers. The British farmer, we admit, is in a "parlous case," and will continue so until he can secure land on such terms as will place him nearer to an economic footing with the agriculturists with whose products he has to compete.

So far as British exports may be affected by preferential duties in favor of the colonies, we entertain grave doubts as to their being enlarged by such a policy. The idea is to create more trade with the Colonies, to buy more from them and so cause them to buy more from England. The development of our trade with the motherland is an inspiring idea; we should all rejoice over its coming to pass; and no one can refrain from admiring the steadiness with which our High Commissioner has pursued the idea. Our increased business with England in recent years has been very gratifying; at the same time we regard our increased trade with any country as also very gratifying. The storekeeper is pleased to have the patronage of his relations, but to secure their custom he is not prepared to put any obstacles in the way of other customers. Business is business, and the dominant factor in business relations must ever be that of self-interest.

Sir Charles referred to the fact of England's foreign trade being so much smaller with her colonies than with outside nations as a condition that would be reversed, "if preferential trade were adopted." In 1892 the total foreign trade of Great Britain with her possessions amounted to \$895,000,000, and with other countries \$2,682,281,015. That is, for every dollar of trade done with her colonies and India, Great Britain did over three dollars of trade with other countries. With the United States alone England does a trade as large as with the whole of hercolonies, India not being counted. The figures of last year, given elsewhere, go further to bear out this argument. Sir Charles then is remarkably sanguine in expecting preferential duties imposed by England and her Colonies to shift over \$1,700,000,000 of the trade between her and the outside world to the trade with British possessions.

The Saturday Review talks of England as able to half ruin the agriculturalists of the United States by imposing a preferential duty on wheat and other farm products. The Saturday Review would not have spoken so without the book in the days of its brilliance-when the present Premier of England was on its staff. Can anyone believe that the United States would see its enormous produce interests destroyed, or seriously injured, by an English discriminating tariff without striking back, although its fence is already built up to toppling height? Such a policy we believe would be met by the prohibition of English goods, or such duties as would inflict a terrible blow on English industries. Foreign countries might be very inconsistent in resenting preferential duties, but they would not worry about consistency if their interests or their pride demanded retaliation. Sir Charles makes light of the effect such duties would have on the price of bread. He thinks this would not be increased, and even if it were, the British artisans would not object. He has been some time in England and ought to know.

but we are not ready to believe the industrial classes of the old land would see a new version of the Corn Laws imposed with indifference. We suspend judgment until a series of large meetings has been held in the great manufacturing centres, and the voice of the people heard on this proposal to place a tax on bread stuffs. It would be exceedingly gratifying to us to have the foreign trade of Canada developed to such magnificent dimensions as Sir Charles foreshadows, but we cannot see any prospect of this being consummated by preferential duties. At the same time the -subject is of such importance, and its aspects so varied, we are glad to see that a Congress of Boards of Trade, to be held next June, will thresh the question thoroughly, and no doubt will bring out all the points of the argument so as to add a highly interesting and instructive chapter to the discussion.

THE STANDARD POLICY OF NEW YORK STATE.

A Committee of the Board of Trade, New York, has just reported on the "Standard Fire Insurance Policy" of that State. The conditions to which they chiefly object are not confined to policies issued there. Many policyholders nearer home will find it desirable to read over their policies and note if any such conditions exist in them, so that they may be thoroughly advised as to their nature and bearing. Indeed whenever a policy is secured it should be very carefully read over and its provision mastered, so that strict compliance be paid thereto so as to avoid all chance of voiding the insurance by some unconscious violation of the contract.

The objections raised by the Committee are mainly against two clauses. One of these provides that, "If a building, or any portion thereof fall, except as the result of fire, all insurance on this policy on such building, or its contents, shall immediately cease." This clause involves such a risk to the policyholder as renders it in the highest degree inequitable. Suppose for instance the plaster ornament on a parlor ceiling—the "rose," as it is termed-falls, and in its descent upsets a lamp which sets the premises on fire; then according to this clause the policy of insurance in such a case is made void, and no claim can be established for a fire loss against the underwriting company. This form of accident has occurred, and is one to which many dwellings are liable. Against this risk there is no possible precaution except the discontinuance of oil lamps, which is not possible in most country houses. On a larger scale there may happen a fall of some portion of a building which throws stoves over, upsets furnaces, breaks gas pipes, and so causes a fire to break out which destroys the contents of such a building. Yet under this clause, if such an accident take place the insurance policy is voided. It is impossible for those occupying premises where goods are stored to know whether they structurally so safe as to render such an accident impossible. A floor may be over-weighted and fall, by which a fire may be caused. The fire may break out in part of such premises which is not occupied by the same tenant as the one whose overladen floor has given way. Houses, and storage rooms let in flats are liable to this risk. Cases are on record of floors breaking down which dropped the contents of a fire grate, or stove into the room of a tenant underneath who was burnt out by this visitation from above.

To guard against such a casualty is impossible, yet the policy in question is made a dead letter by an accident which the insured person could not avoid. Not long ago a dwelling house was burnt owing to its chimney's being blown over in a gale and the brick's displacing the gas-fixtures, which caused an escape of gas that set the house in flames. Surely it is a very unjust policy which can be made void by accidents of that nature, or such others as we have named.

Another doubtful clause is the one which causes an insurance policy on merchandise to be voided by placing a chattel mortgage on the contents of the insured building. There are millions of dollars worth of property deprived of insurance by this clause unknown to the owner or to the mortgagee, in the opinion of the Chairman of the New York Committee. The equitable course would be to require the insuring com pany to be notified when a chattel mortgage is given, and leave it optional for the policy to be made void or to keep it valid. Any extra risk could be covered by an extra charge, but to cancel a policy on goods as soon as they are mortgaged is certainly not just. A warehouse receipt is of the same nature as a chattel mortgage, vet such receipts do not invalidate insurance on the goods, but are recognized by insurance companies. clause in the policy objected to cancels insurance on any property immediately foreclosure proceedings are begun. This seems very arbitrary and unjust. A loan company manager of many years' experience, who has had to commence a large number of foreclosure proceedings, informs us that, no case ever occurred in his experience of a fire which could even be suspected of being caused by this action. In his judgment the extra risk created by foreclosure proceedings is so trifling as to be unworthy of serious consideration. Incendiaries commit crime to make money, but the owner of a property which is in danger of being alienated by foreclosure cannot make anything by destroying it; he is more likely to punish himself by such a deed. Before a foreclosure can be made, the property must be under mortgage, and the insurance upon it is made payable to the mortgagee, so that if a mortgagor burns his property he simply gives the mortgagee a quicker resource of payment than by foreclosure and destroys his chance of recovering any part of its value over and above the mortgage debt.

The moral hazard then in such cases is not so great as to call for the cancellation of insurance when fore-closure proceedings commence. In regard to the clause which deprives the policyholder of his insurance, if a fire is caused by any part of a building falling, we are not surprised that the Chairman of the New York Committee condemned it "as repugnant to all ideas of equity and justice."

THE MONTREAL MAYORALTY.

As anticipated in our issue of the 17th, Ald. R. Wilson Smith has been elected Mayor by acclamation. We noticed that at the close of the meeting of the members of the Board of Trade on Monday last, Sir Charles Tupper, Bart.,—who remained on the platform to exchange greetings with many old friends,—took occasion to congratulate the new Mayor on his success and to refer to the opportunities of promoting the welfare of all concerned that must come within his scope in his new station.

ELECTRIC TOWING.

The possibility of employing the trolley or other system of electric motive power for the purpose of towing boats and barges along canals, as a substitute for mules or horses, has for some time past engaged the attention of electrical engineers. A report has just been published, the result of a survey and study of the situation to test its application to the Eric Canal ordered by the New York Legislature. The plant erected at Tonawanda in that State for the purpose is known as the Lamb electric system.

It consists of a stationary cableway supported by a line of poles along the canal bank, and electric motor carriages travelling thereon and towing a boat or boats a ttached thereon. The report says:—

"Of the various systems that have been proposed or suggested for canal traction, the towage system seems to appeal most favorably to boatmen, as only the towing facilities require to be changed from the mule or horse to the tow motor. The boatmen would be relieved not only of the uncertainty of the life and health of their animals, but the men necessary to attend the animals (usually one man per team) could be dispensed with entirely, while the space now reserved for the animals on board would be available for other purposes. Having, in accordance with instructions of the Superintendent of Public Works, made an investigation of, and submitted a report on an electric trolley system, as applied to canal traction, towards the close of the year 1893, it seems proper here to draw a camparisou between the general features of the electric trolley system of propulsion and the electric system of towing. The former includes a trolley line erected along or over the canal, supplying current to the motors. In this system either special propellor boats fitted with electrical machinery are to be built, or existing boats adapted to the purpose. The towing system, on the other hand, comprises a sort of cableway or railway erected along the canal bank, and tow motors travelling thereon; this system eliminates the necessity of building propellor boats or of reconstructing old boats for the purpose, as no machinery would be required in the hold of the boat, and no space therein be encroached upon. Another feature of some value is the absence of the wash unavoidable with propellors. The towage system, further, appears to afford greater flexibility of manipulation as extra tow motors could more readily and at less expense be kept in reserve at: suitable points along the canal, to meet odd demands, than would be the case with propellor boats, and boats could be towed even singly or in couples with a fair degree of economy, not necessitating the making up of long trains as with propellors. For trains of boats motors of suitable size and capacity could be built, or two or more motors coupled together to meet any demand."

The consulted engineer has no hesitation in "endorsing" the system as "deserving preference over any other hitherto experimented upon."

CANNED GOODS.

In buying tinned goods an English chemist gives the following instructions: Reject every article that does not show the line of resin round the edge of the solder of the cap, the same as is seen on the seam on the side of the can. Reject every tin that has not the name of the manufacturer or firm upon it, as well as the name of the company or town where manufactured. When the wholesale dealer is ashamed to have his name on the goods, fight shy of him. Press up the bottom of the tin. If decomposition is beginning, the tin will rattle just as the bottom of the oiler of your sewing machine will do. If the goods are sound it will be solid, and there will be no rattle in the tin. Reject every tin that shows signs of rust around the cap on the inside of the head of the tin: if housekeepers are educated on these points, then the poisoning by muriate of zinc amalgam will become a thing of the past.

THE MERCHANTS' BANK OF HALIFAX.

The annual report of the above bank is made up to the close of each calendar year. The one just issued (see table elsewhere) shows indications of a good, profitable business having been done in 1895. The net profits, after providing for all bad and doubtful debts, are \$188,485, which is 12.56 per cent. on the paid up Capital, which is surely a satisfactory result for a year like the last which had so broken a record. The bank realized \$203,544 by premiums on new stock issued which, with a balance transferred from Profit and Loss, raises the Reserve Fund to \$1,003,820, equal to 66.92 per cent. on the Capital. The prospect therefore is good for an increase in the dividend as there is really no need for a large Rest, except it is desired to lay dividends aside for earning purposes in the future. The bank enjoys the use of a large body of deposits, the total it holds being \$6,199,207. It has also a high average of circulation, so that its earning powers are considerable. Its overdue debts are quite trifling, only \$8,116, indicating cautious management for which the Merchants' of Halifax has long enjoyed a good reputation. The amount of business acquired by the Bank in Montreal is doubtless in a large degree due to the care and assiduity of the branch manager, Mr. E. L. Pease.

SIR CHARLES TUPPER IN MONTREAL.

It is rarely that so enthusiastic a reception is given to any distinguished visitor as that which met Sir Charles Tupper on Monday last in the Exchange Hall of the Board of Trade, to listen to his address on our relations to the Empire, to his account of the arrangements made for a fast ocean fleet. already noted in our columns, and other subjects of interest to all classes of our business men irrespective of political bias. The large room and even the corridors and galleries were crowded and the worthy baronet was repeatedly interrupted by bursts of applause. However people may differ as to the early possibility that the mother country may see her way to impose a differential duty, however slight, upon foreign agricultural imports save those from the colonies, there could be no doubt of the genuineness of the feelings which greeted the views so clearly set forth in the course of the address, or of the desire that some practical way may be discovered to solve the difficulties which beset the scheme. time however is likely to come when, with all her coloniesin every quarter of the globe—teeming with an industrious population, England may see her way to enter into such an arrangement. Every fresh acquisition of territory means an additional market, and with the immense areas controlled in Asia, Africa, Australia and in the Western hemisphere, settled and united, the Empire has within itself all that makes for prosperity. The comparison of the union of the various divisions under the flag to the states of the neighboring republic, made by Sir Charles, was an apt one. Though the idea of a fiscal union of the various parts of the Empire is not by any means new, there was certainly the right ring about the way in which it was presented by the speaker and in the manner of its reception by his hearers. We treat the subject more at length in another article.

THE SUGAR SITUATION IN

The condition of the world's sugar markets vis full of interest. Closely following on the reports of shortage in the crops, came the unfavorable news from Cuba, where the prospects are that the next crop will be smaller than ever, numerous plantations of cane having been destroyed. The unfavorable situation was accentuated by supplies of beets being smaller than anticipated. Under these circumstances, the advance in the raw sugar market is not surprising. Latest advices from New York give 33c for centrifugals, 96 test, and 31c to 31c for Brown Muscovados, duty paid. Refined sugars naturally follow the lead of raws, and were advanced by the Trust to 53c for granulated, with a prospect of a further rise. It is a matter for gratification, that Canada can be pointed out as one of the cheapest countries in the world for Owing to the heavy advances in raws, Montreal refiners have had to advance prices fractionally, but even now they compare very favorably with New York. Granulated sells here at 4½c for round lots up to 4½c far smaller quantities as compared with 5½c in New York, while yellows are quoted at 3½c to 4c, according to quality. The prospects are however that a further advance will be made, the raw market still holding very strong.

He has been in business as above, some ten years. He started on a very limited capital and did not prove successful, effecting a compromise in 1800 at 40 or 50c on the dollar. ONTARIO FAILURES.

—WM. LAMB of Ottawa, wholesale shoes, is seeking an extension. He is understood to show quite a large surplus but not in very realizable shape and being unable to make certain arrangements to get advances, found himself unable to meet maturing liabilities. He was formerly of Poaps & Lamb, who dissolved last Sept. He subsequently opened on his own account, was doing fairly but his means were largely locked up in real estate. The firm was rated respectably—G. R. Holmes, carriages, St. Catharines, has assigned. This is a small affair conducted for about eleven years on light capital. ducted for about eleven years on light capital.

-Danford Roche & Co., dry goods merchants of Newmarket, already noted, have compromised at 30c in the dollar.--W. R. Counter, jeweller, Seaforth, has assigned. He succeeded his uncle in 1890 but got behind in '94 and endeavored to arrange a settlement, but did not succeed. He continued but in poor shape with this result---Theresa J. Wakeling of Straffordville, has assigned—Wm., Sutton, Stephen Twp., has assigned—Oswald, Murdoff & Co., jobbers in shoes, Toronto, have called a meeting of their creditors. They have been in business only since Dec. '94, first as Oswald & Murdoff. The style changed as above last July, there has been a couple of changes in partners since start. No figures of liabilities or assets yet obtainable—Willard Fuller, tub factory, Bolton Centre, has assigned with liabilities of \$10, tub factory, Bolton Centre, has assigned with liabilities of \$10,000. In business alone about 4 years; has been gradually going behind—Jos. Belisle of Bonfield Two, has assigned—D. C. Matthews, lumber, Lakeport, is offering 50c in the dollar, has been in business some 18 or 14 years but only in a small way—R. S. Gage, general store, Newbury, has assigned with liabilities of about \$6,400. Coming from Palmyra about six years ago, he was supposed to have some moderate means but the last couple of years he has complained of dull trade which gradually ate up his means—Robt. Wilson of Merrickville has assigned.

Tue recent career of Mr. John S. Douglas, hatter and furrier, Winnipeg, who had been going behind in his payments to firms here for some time past, and who made an assignment some weeks ago, has evidently not been such as to commend him to weeks ago, has evidently not been such as to commend him to the good wishes of his creditors. In the first week of October he failed to meet some notes due here and, to protect themselves, creditors entered action and obtained judgment. Immediately after this Douglas is charged with having given a Bill of Sale to one of his workmen for \$5,100, taking his note for that amount, which note is said to have been disposed of for \$3,500. He next went over the border to visit, as he explains, some family connections, and on returning to Montreal, his old home, he was arrested and lodged in gaol at the instance of certain creditors here. Ball was obtained on the 16th, in \$500 for his appearance in Montreal on the 1st of March next to answer a warrant taken out by Kortosk & Co. here, and \$500 for his appearance in Winnipeg on 2d of May next, on a charge preferred against him by Messrs. Donald Fraser & Co., agents for L. Gnaedinger & Sons of Montreal. A difficulty arose as to where Mr. Douglas should stand his trial first, but as he is held here for an offence against the laws of this Province, and proceedings taken out here, he will be tried first in Montreal. The total of goods in stock at the time of the Bill of Sale amounted to about \$3,000, but the creditors seem of opinion that further enquiries should be made. Goods were rather cheap in Winnipeg during the Fall. The total liabilities are about \$9,000, and the creditors are not likely to get even a cent in the dollar of their clalms. Mr. R. Stanley Weir, advocate, who is acting for Mr. Douglas, is taking steps to Welr, advocate, who is acting for Mr. Douglas, is taking steps to quash the capias.

—Among those taking passage for Venezuela on the steamship "Columbia" of the Hamburg-American line which sails from New York to-morrow, is Mr. Geo. Caverhill, who with his wife is leaving on a voyage of some weeks through the West India Islands, and to the principal cities of that pugnacious little South American republic. It is evident that Mr. Caverhill is not in any degree exercised over the Venezuelan question and it is most likely that he will return—as his many friends in Montreal hope he may—in the belief that newspaper despatches, like the razors of old, are too often made to sell.

—Another instance of the evil of too great a haste to get rich is furnished by the recent career of Geo. J. Robb, city treasurer of Moncton, who is a defaulter for some \$9,000. This is the amount of a check which was passed into his hands to cover civic expenses for water and light and afterwards re-transferred to the city. Robb was receiving a yearly salary and perquisites of about \$1,400. Discovery was made through the suspicious amounts of drafts for pork and grain deals going through the banks. The pelicy of \$4,000 in Guarantee Co. of N.A. had been allowed to lapse.

[LINDBERG & FRANKLIN, brewers, St. Johns, Nfid., have held a meeting of their creditors. They succeeded John Lindberg, sr., in '92, and were doing fairly but depression there last year affected them seriously.

—MR. ROBT STEWART, JR., for many years connected with R. G. Dun & Co., here, has been appointed manager of the Quebec branch of the Agency in place of Mr. F. T. Graham.

—A PETITION for a winding-up order under the Act has been made in respect of "La Compagnie Approvisionments Alimentaires" of this city, dealers in wines and other French goods.

—Mrs. M. Barbour, millinery, Moosomin, N.W.T., has assigned. In business since Nov. '92, always in a small way, and could not get sufficient trade to make a success.

—THE Montreal Board of Trade Building account for 1895 shows a deficit for about \$700.

Financial.

Thursday Ev'g., Jan. 28, 1896.

The week just ended has been one of continually falling price and limited trading on the local Stock Exchange. During the first couple of days there appeared to be a somewhat better feeling but this later gave way to a condition of despondency, with the result that quotations fell even lower than during the recent scare. The principal decline were as follows. Stree Ry. 9, Cable 6½, Gas 8, Toronto Ry. 5½.

The primary cause of "this weakness inthe market is the complete change in the
attitude of the banks with respect to loaning money on call. While it is generally
conceded that money is just as plentiful
now as it was a month ago, it is a good
deal more difficult to borrow, and rates
have gone up from 4 per cent. to about 5
to 5½ per cent., with very little offering.
Naturally this led to realizing or liquidation of stocks held by speculators on small
margins. News from outside markets has
been to some extent of a reassuring nature
although business in general has been dull'

The week closed with a much better feeling, and with more activity. The principal stocks recovered a good part of the decline and acted a good deal firmer.

The week has been a very quiet one in Exchange circles and scarcely a variation has been noted. Quotations now are :- Between hands, 00 days 9% to 9 11-16, demand 10 to 10%, Cables 10% to 10 3-16. Over the counter rates are 60 days 9% to

MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS

Thursday Evg., Jan. 23rd, 1896.

Although some lines during the past-week have shown more activity, complaints are still general with respect to the condition of country roads the recent snowfall having been insufficient to afford good sleighing. This has been the cause of complaints also about remittances, which

are to say the least very unsatisfactory. Values generally continue firm, and as will be seen from our market reports, some decided advances have been recorded. Prospects generally are considered to be considerably brighter than they were, but another heavy snowfall is the desideratum at present.

DRYGOODS—Travellers are again on their sorting trips and reports are that they are experiencing a very much improved business. Country roads are somewhat improved by the recent snow, but in the Province of Quebec are still far from satisfactory. Notwithstanding travellers are sending in orders more freely and at the same time report a very hopeful outlook for the immediate future, and for the spring trade. Another favorable indication is that is less tendency to cancel orders, than there has been of late noted. The most unfavorable feature is that remittances continue very slow, from almost all sections. The city trade is keeping up fairly well and no changes in values are reported.

DRESSED Hogs.-An advance in prices has been noted which is well maintained. Business keeps fairly active. Prices are now quoted \$4.90 to \$5.10 for car-lots, according to weight and condition, while for smaller quantities \$5.25 to \$5.50 per 100 lbs. is the range:

FLOUR.—A brisk business is reported in Manitoba flours, almost wholly however on local account. Cable enquiries for export are being received, but millers claim to be unable to consider them on account of the pressure of local business. Ontario millers report a fair demand, with prices very firm. The meal and feed markets hold steady.

Figh-The feature of the week in the fish trade has been the news of the suspension of one of the best known firms in this line.







The sympathy of the trade is tendered with the hope that the difficulty may prove only temporary. There has been a little more enquiry and prices are steady as follows:—Fresh cod, 3 to 3½c bris. or cases; haddock 3½ to 3½c; fresh herrings \$1.25 to \$1.50 per 100; bloaters, 90c to \$1 per box; tommy cods, \$1.25 to \$1.50 per brl; finnan haddies 6½ to 7c. Salt fish is unchanged.

GROCERIES—The advent of a little more snow has cheered local jobbers and whole-salers but the fall was scarcely heavy enough to bring any substantial improvement in the volume of business.—Tea men report a slight improvement in country trade, there being a better demand principally for low grade Japans. The New York market holds firm, and this has its effect here. Black teas are quiet. Sugarsare strong, granulated being quoted at 4½c for round lots up to 4½c for smaller quantities at the refineries. Guild prices are ½c higher than refineries. The New York market has been a little excited, but is now calmer. An exchange reports; Conditions remain generally strong and the impression holds that rates must be higher. Foreign grades tend upward on the stimulating accounts from Europe, but there is a good demand for spot lots and continued negotiation on parcels to arrive. In molasses there is also a firmer feeling, and with light stocks, advances are probable. Canned goods have had a quiet week, but prices hold firm. In dried fruit the feature has been the increasing firmness of the principal lines. Valencia raisins, prunes and California fruits are rather scarce, indeed there are but very small quantities available at firmer prices. Other lines continue quiet.

Green Fruits — Apart from talk of crop damage in California by frost little new has developed in connection with either oranges or lemons. There continues to be a fair demand for both fruits and prices hold steady. The principal quotations for oranges are as follows: Valencias \$4.00 per case; Messina \$2 to \$2.25 per box, and Jamaicas, \$6 to \$7 per brl.; lemons are selling at \$2.00 fto \$3.50 per box. Other fruits show very little change, pine-apples selling slowly at 20 to 30c, and grapes are quiet at about \$5 to \$6 per keg. With respect to the reported crop damage referred to above, it is learned that only a few of the orange districts were affected and the damage is by no means so widespread as first reports indicated.

Grain.—A fair amount of business is being put through in coarse grains for export, and a noteworthy fact in this connection is that the bulk of the grain now being shipped is going forward by way of Canada's new winter port; St. John, N.B. Some fair sized sales of peas have been put through West for export via this



This is due m a measure to reports of lower prices in American markets, but the steadily in creasing receipts locally, has also a good deal to do with the lower prices that are now being offered. Sales of baled have been made at from 50c to \$1 below the ruling rates of a week ago, No. 1 changing hands at \$14 and No. 2 at \$13. LEATHER & BOOTS & SHOES-Duliness is still the prevailing feature of the local leather market. The position is strong. hides holding firm, but purchasers seem to be holding off in the meantime. Receipts of black leather are light, while for sole, the export demand is good, and shipments are steadily going forward. Prices remain unchanged. Boot and shoe manufacturers report orders on spring account coming in unchanged. There appears to be a disposition to await the 4th March and see how payments are made. PRODUCE AND PROVISIONS.-Pork and smoked meats have met with a steady demand at unchanged prices. For butter the market now wears, a more quiet appearance with slightly higher prices. Creamery is quoted at 20½ to 21c, while dairy is purely nominal. Cheese prices are firm, with a slightly improved demand. Fall makes are quoted at 9½ to 9½c, and summer goods 8½ to 8½c. The egg market holds steady with a fair demand. Boiling stock sells at 18 to 20c. Montreal limed 14 to 15c, and Western 18½c to 14c.

PETROLEUM .-- Decided advances have been recorded in the prices for petroleum during the past week, and the markets still hold very firm at the advanced quotations. The cause of the advance is said to be a scarcity of crude which is becoming more pronounced, and which is likely to lead to a still further advance in prices. TO

MECHANICAL NOTES.

An engine may appear to be keyed up all right, and yet when it is started up the crank pin or some other part may heat because the key was driven too far; therefore all of the parts should be closely watched until it is known that they will run cool.

After cleaning your boilers fill them with hot water if possible. If one of them is fired up, use the steam from that one to heat the water which is going into the others.

Always have a steam gauge on the feed water pipe, and locate it as near to the pump as may be convenient. If the pipe becomes partially choked with sediment the increase of pressure will warn you of it:

Don't put a poor lubricator on a goodengine, or on a poor one either. It will ruin the good one by failing to deliver oil when it is needed, and make the poor one worse for the same reason.

Try the nuts on your foundation bolts occasionally, and see if they are tight: Because they were all right six months ago it does not necessarily follow that they are now.

Remember that if your eccentric gets cut and is worn out or round so that it becomes necessary to put it in a lathe and take one or two cuts off from it the reduction in diameter does not alter the throw of it.

It is better to key up an engine in the morning than at night. If it is done at night what proof does the engineer have that he will be there to attend to it the next morning?

Be sure that your indicator box lid is fastened down before you take it up by the handle, as otherwise you may find your indicator spread out on the floor.
