Macaulay, the Sun Life managing director, meets directors of the smaller company to settle a few undetermined questions. Until the negotiations are terminated and ratified officials of the companies affected refuse to give details of the financial arfuse to give details of the financial arrangements made. It is quite likely, however, that the amount involved will reach two million dollars. John A. Tory, Ontario supervisor of the Sun Life, said last night that negotiations had been progressing for two or three weeks, but he had not been advised that they were pradically completed, as The World heard yesterday. Home Life officials declared the policyholders were being fully protected in the deal. The transaction for the Home Life

The transaction for the Home Life is entirely independent of the Union Life Assurance Company and the National Agency Company. The three companies have the same directorate with H. Pollman Evans president of each; the only exception being that J. K. McCutcheon is managing director of the Home Life. The deal, it was declared, was entirely separate from the affairs of the Union Life, although the two companies appeared to be interlocked.







There is a little article, commonly known as a "pacifier" or "mother's comfort," that causes harm out of all proportion to its size. To see pacifiers in use one has only to talk a walk in any park or sunny street where babies are taken for an airing. It will be no-ticed that about two-thirds of these little children are placidly sucking away on a black or white rubber nipple, sometimes having a bone or ivory ring attached. Often the pacifier is tied around baby's neck with a ribbon, or it may be fastened to some part of his carriage with a string; then, when baby occasionally drops it from his

Numerous other diseases may be caused by the pacifier; sprue or thrush is often directly traced to its use. Constant suction overworks the little glands in the mouth that produce salia, and all this liquid that is intended o be mixed with the food and help digest it is wasted on the pacifier, so that when it is needed for the fo

that when it is needed for the food there is little left; indigestion and chronic dyspepsia follow.

In many families, where there are a number of little children of the pacifier age, one nipple will do service for several children; the mother hands it around, or the older members of the flock take it away from the beats. flock take it away from the baby. Tonsilitis, diphtheria, tuberculosis other diseases may easily be started in this way. I have even seen mothers and nurses first put the pacifier into their own mouths "to clean it" and

### CREAM PUFF SECRETS

NY one who pretends to cook and does not know how to make cream puffs surely wants to learn how, for the puffs are not difficult to make, and the filling is only a custard or a little whipped cream stiffened with gelatine.

This morning's man brought a letter from a reader who says: "Please tell me how to make the crust for cream puffs. I asked my baker about this and he says no baking powder is used. I suppose he did not want to give away the secrets of the trade."

The baker was quite right-cream puffs are made from what is called choux" paste. If Mrs. James and other ambitious cooks will look in their newest cookery books, they will find a chapter headed "cream cakes, eclairs

and gauffres" or "fancy pastries."

If you glance over the recipes, you will see that these mixtuers are all leavened with eggs. Choux paste is used for most of them. Today I will give directions for cream puff paste and follow it with other forms and fillings.

To make chour paste use 1 cup of water, 1 tablespoon of sugar, 2½ tablespoons of butter, ½ teaspoon of salt.

When this boils up add a cup of sifted flour. Stir it into the boiling water and butter bravely; it will not lump, but will make a fine smooth paste if you stir it well.

Cook it until it leaves the sides of the pan; then remove from heat, When partly cool add the eggs; one at a time, unbeaten, until you have whipped in four. The batter should be smooth, yellow and of a consistency that will not spread.

Too many eggs will make the mixture stringy, but if the flour is very dry or the eggs small, five may be used to a cup of flour. The longer you beat the eggs and the flour mixture together, the lighter will be your puffs. Have ready tin sheets, or shallow pans, well buttered. Put in the paste into a pastry tube and press out on the tins in balls one and a half inches in diameter. If you have not a tube use a spoon, dipping it in cold water each time. The tube, of course, gives a better shape to the puffs.

This quantity will make eighteen puffs and you must put them on the tins at least two inches apart, as in baking they swell to three or four times

American stocks, in London, which had shown general advances, weakened abruptly before the opening here, and some of the early selling in this market was for foreign account. Before midday the list stiffened, but in the afternon active selling was resumed, culminating in a vigorous drive during the last hour, which forced the market to the low point of the session. Selling appeared to be chiefly in the nature of bear pressure.

Steel Statement Poor.

The quarterly statement of the Steel Corporation, which came out shortly after the close of the market, was less favorable than had been generally predicted, total earnings of \$34,426,000, comparing with forecasts of \$36,000,000 to \$38,000,000. While the average of prices received for steel was higher than in the December quarter, the gain derived from this source was offset by extensive flood damage and the increase in operating expenses resultant on the advance in wages established Feb. 1.

The expected announcement of an issue of New York City bonds was made today, the city offering \$45,000,000 at 4½ per cent. Outstanding issues were depressed by the announcement, some of them touching new low prices. The bonds sold "when issued" on the curb at 100½. 
