BROADENED TRAINING LAWS TO ASSIST DEVELOPMENT
Hon. Frank Cochrane at Important New Ontario Ceremony Tells of His Policy.

North Bay, Sept. 10.—(Special).—Two thousand people from the town and district attended the corner-stone laying at the site of the Montreal Renning & Reduction Co.'s plant, at Trout Lake, this afternoon.

While smelters and refining plants are very desirable they are not regarded as the most pleasant of neighbors, and Trout Lake, several miles out of town, on the line of the T. & N. O. railway, has been selected as the site.

As was pointed out in the civic address which Mayor Purvis presented to Hon. Frank Cochrane, who, in the presence of the Mayor, the Hon. J. H. McPherson, and other officials, was the guest of honor at the ceremony.

Mr. Cochrane, in replying, said that since assuming office he had endeavored to put the mining laws on a broader basis, but they were not yet entirely satisfactory, not even to himself. His main object in the new act had been to secure more development, as the more development the better the country showing the greater the advantage of the miner with a claim to dispose of.

The lack of capital works was being overcome, and he hoped as great success would follow the rearing and smelting industry as had followed the building of the T. & N. O. Railway.

He also hoped that before many years had passed Ontario would not only be refining, but also marketing its own ores.

A. G. Browning, president of the local board of trade, presented the president of the company, E. Leonard, M.P., with a lease of the site of the plant.

Mr. Leonard, Hon. Nelson Monteith, F. D. Monk, M.P., Chas. McCool, M.P., Mr. Labrosse, M.P., and the company's engineer, Mr. Brown, spoke. The proceedings terminated with a banquet.

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS
MR. CARSCALLEN'S WORSE CONDITION AGAIN CRITICAL

Street Railwaymen Object to Company's Choice for Arbitrator—Happenings.

Hamilton, Sept. 10.—(Special).—Henry Carscallen, K.C., M.L.A., has taken a decided change for the worse. During the past 24 hours his condition has been extremely critical. No very great improvement was noticed by his physician to-night, although Mr. Carscallen appeared to be a little brighter.

THE END OF THE FAIR.
Official Statement of Receipts Will Be Ready Next Month.

It was get-away day at the exhibition yesterday. It will be six weeks before a financial statement as to surplus will be ready.

The dog and cat shows have shared in the general prosperity, and in the case of the former \$317 has been taken in, as against \$252 for 1905, and the pussies drew a larger crowd than last year, 1640 representing the receipts, being an increase of \$104 over those of last fall.

Park Commissioners' Chambers will not permit any of the exhibition concessionaires to leave their booths standing until the next exhibition. The chemical engine of the fire department on duty at the exhibition grounds left yesterday, but the hose section will stay awhile longer and may remain for the Oddfellows' campment next week.

The exhibition management has expressed a warm feeling of appreciation for the work of Capt. Swift and his men. This has been the busiest fair for the firemen yet. The fine process building seemed especially threatened, the men being called there four times.

In addition to the city firemen, two ex-firemen, Captains Charlton and Ford, were also on duty for the exhibition management. After the grand stand performance each night two men patrolled the grounds around the grand stand, and a constant watch was also maintained through the night.

In fact, each night after the crowds had gone, Manager Orr and other officials made a tour of all the buildings to make sure that no fire was lurking danger from fire or trespassers.

An effort may be made to increase the number of firemen next year. It is said that there should be a hook and ladder truck on the grounds, and also an engine. The water mains are small and the pressure in case of a serious emergency not to be too strongly depended upon. The suggestion has also been made that a permanent fire station be located there in view of the value of the property now represented.

**WILL WAIT ON COMPANY.**  
**East Toronto Council to Negotiate for Extension.**

East Toronto, Sept. 10.—For the first time in its history East Toronto town hall was to-night graced by the presence of a number of ladies at the regular meeting, the occasion being the well-known purpose of the north end residents to force the railway extension over the bridge to a conclusion. Ward 3 residents were represented by Postmaster Nimmo, who presented a resolution requesting that council express themselves as favorable to the extension of the street railway to the easterly limits of the town. On a vote this motion was unanimously passed. Mr. Nimmo then introduced another, asking council to appoint a committee to wait on the management of the Street Railway Company, making the terms possible, and advising the committee to grant the statutory allowance respecting a franchise, and that the fares remain the same as at present. The sentiment of the council was so distinctly opposed to the main conditions involved that the mover permitted the withdrawal of the resolution, and another was submitted according to the appointment of a committee, composed of Messrs. Nassar, Berry and Johnson. The clause relating to the granting of a franchise for the statutory term is eliminated.

**\$4,000,000 IN BINDER TWINE**  
**Farmers Have Paid \$500,000 More for It Than Last Year.**

Winnipeg, Sept. 10.—On one of his trips of investigation into the binder twine industry, J. L. Haycock, binder twine inspector for the Dominion government, stated that never before has such a quantity of binder twine been used in Canada as this present year.

**FREIGHT WRECK AT GALT.**  
**Six Cars Derailed and Line Blocked for Many Hours.**

Galt, Sept. 10.—(Special.)—The derailing of six freight cars belonging to C.P.R. freight train No. 50, bound for Toronto, two miles west of here, occurred about 8 o'clock to-night. The wreck was blocked for eight hours. The Detroit express, which left Toronto at 7:50 p.m., was delayed here until daylight, but which time the wreck was cleared. An auxiliary, brought from Toronto Junction, did good work. The cause of the derailment is not yet known. Of the six cars buried from the rails two were up-ended and thrown into the ditch, the bulk of the contents being destroyed. The other four cars remained beside the track and were little damaged.

SCHOOL NEWS.

Edinburgh Inspector Here—Removal of Overcrowding Nuisances.

School Inspector Fraser of Edinburgh is in the city, and yesterday called on Inspector Hughes. He will be in the city a couple of days, and will be shown around.

In the early part of October an exhibition of the work of the pupils of the kindergartens will be held. Two new rooms were yesterday opened up in the city public schools, one in the King Edward and the other in Perth-avenue school.

The two combined will afford accommodation for about 100 more scholars.

Chairman Shaw, Trustees Levee and Rawlinson, Superintendent Bishop, Secretary Wilkinson, Mr. Gray of Jarvis-street, Principal Hagarthy of Harbord-street, and Principal Smith of Jameson Collegiate Institute visited Harbord-street, Institute yesterday with a view to securing the names of the difficulty regarding the accommodation for the pupils. It was decided to open up a class room in each of the two gymnasium rooms, putting 45 seats in each and thoroughly heating and ventilating the rooms, and to open the assembly room with 45 seats. In Jarvis-street Collegiate a room will be opened providing against all overcrowding there. Principal Hagarthy will ascertain the names of pupils from outside the district attending his school, and unless some special cause warrants it they will be required to attend Jarvis-street.

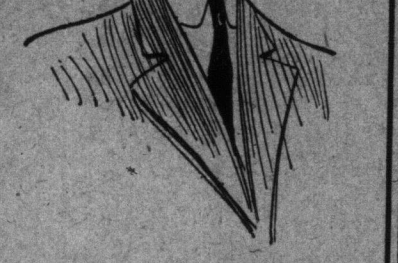

A GREAT MUSICAL SEASON ASSURED AT MASSEY HALL

Leoncavallo, Famous Italian Composer, Will Be Heard Thanksgiving Night.



The coming of Yvette Guilbert, the famous Parisian singer, and Albert Chavaller, England's most distinctive humorous artist, will be the beginning of the musical season proper at Massey Hall. They will appear on Oct. 8. Since Guilbert was the rage in the musical halls of two continents she has ascended the musical scale and has re-ventured herself chiefly to the interpretation of old French songs, and has sung them with the accompaniment of instruments of the period in the delightful manner which has appealed to the Toronto public in the persons of the Dolmetch trio.

Following close after will be Edward Branscombe's Westminster Abbey Glee Party of London, Eng. Since the party last appeared here they have made a tour of the world. The present is their sixth British empire tour. They sailed from England Sept. 7 and begin their tour in Quebec, and traversing Canada, sail from Vancouver to China and Japan. The party is composed of Edward Branscombe and Edward Dailzell, tenors, both of these having been vicars choral of Westminster Abbey; Frederick Brown, baritone; and Haydn Fraser, for six years a soloist at Westminster Abbey, male alto, and "Madame" Madras, Marie Hooten, contralto, accompanies them, and so does Harry Ivimey, a well-known entertainer of London.

On Oct. 10, 11 and 12 there returns the Bess of 'n' Barn brass band, whose instrumentation is unique to this side of the Atlantic.

A very notable attraction has been secured by Stewart Houston for Thanksgiving Day (Oct. 12) in Leonca Cavallo, the great Italian composer and author of "Pagliaccio" and other famous masterpieces, who comes to America with the La Scala Orchestra from Milan, numbering sixty players. Assisted by eminent Italian vocalists the maestro will present selections from his own works and other modern Italian operas.

On Oct. 25 Mr. Houston has arranged for the New York Symphony Orchestra under the direction of Walter Damrosch. Of all the great prima donnas appearing before the public to-day there is no contralto to approach in popularity or magnetism Madame Schumann-Heink. Her coming here in recital early in November will be eagerly anticipated.

Of pianists who will cross the Atlantic this season 11 but exceeding Eugene Derewski, who will play a few engagements in concertos with the Boston Symphony Orchestra only, the greatest is Moritz Rosenfeld. This will be his first appearance in Toronto.

A contract was made for a recital by Yvette Guilbert, the famous Parisian singer, who has developed to prevent his coming to America next season. A very fine violinist, however, will be heard in the person of Arthur Hartman.

All those who heard Gertrude Peppercorn of London, Eng. here two years ago will welcome her return. She is easily one of the most brilliant pianists before the public to-day. She will come here on Nov. 17.

The Toronto Festival Chorus, under Dr. Torrington, will be heard first in their annual Yuletide production of "The Messiah," and afterwards in "The Cross of Fire," a late work by Max Bruch.

The National Chorus and New York Symphony Orchestra will unite in two concerts on Jan. 14 and 15.

The Shiloh Oratorio Society's date is Jan. 31.

The Mendelssohn Choir and Pittsburgh Orchestra will give four evening concerts on Feb. 4, 5, 6 and 7, prior to their appearance in Buffalo and New York.

The Schubert Choir, under H. M. Fletcher, assisted by the Chicago Symphony, will be heard on March 12, and under the same direction, on March 13.

Mr. Houston also has a number of engagements pending for March and April.

Ex-Crown Attorney J. Walter Curry, K.C., and Hartley Dewart, K.C., acted as counsel for the defence in some of the cases.

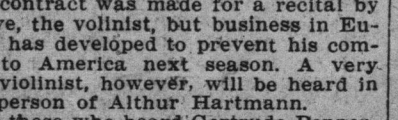
THE GIRL HE LEFT BEHIND SUES FOR BREACH OF PROMISE

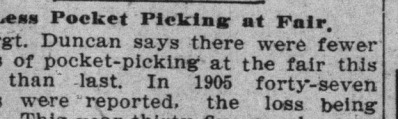

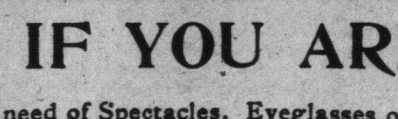

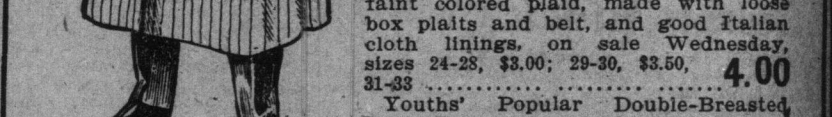
