

New York, June 5 .- Before Justice Smith of the Supreme Court yesterday, the action of Victorine Amelia Herrault Ward, for alimony from Eber Brock Ward, on the ground of abandonment and cruelty on the ground of abandonment and cruelty, was taken up. Mrs. Ward claimed \$2000 a month and a \$5000 counsel fee from her husband, whose income is \$75,000 a year.

Adriàn H. Larkin of counsel for Ward, made the point that, under the rulings of several judges of the court, no alimony could be granted in a separation suit, but Mrs. Ward should be referred to the Magistrates' Court.

"A police magistrate would not allow more than \$5, \$10 or \$15 a week," said counsel for the plaintiff.

"I know nothing of the kind," said Justice Smyth. "I want to know why you ask for \$2000 a month alimony and \$5000 counsel fee."


