WORLD CONTROL CAMPAIGN FUNDS

Alcorn Bill Proposes to Shut Off Gifts From Corporations or Govt. Contractors

OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—(Special).—The introduction of a bill by Mr. Alcorn (Cons., Prince Edward Island) to provide more effective means to prevent electoral corruption, and the discussion of a resolution of Mr. Sinclair (Lib., Guysboro, N.S.), declaring that "in the opinion of the house it is advisable to appoint a standing committee on fisheries," occupied nearly the whole of the afternoon in the commons to-day.

absence from the act of a clause to show the qualifications of the fishers and, it claimed that we had a practical monopoly of lobster industry of the world, our output realizing about \$3,500,000 a year. As to the whole output of fish there was realized last year about \$25,000,000, there being a considerable increase in the value of the business.

In Nova Scotia 25,000 were employed in the deep sea fisheries, while the number in all Canada was 85,421. There is a surplus of \$1900 was transferred to the board of works. EARLSCOURT SCHOOL HAS TAKEN A FORWARD STEP

Board of Trustees Decide to Furnish Pupils With Free Books —York County News.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Jan. 22.—The open letter, just published, of Chairman Leitch of Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, to Premier Whitney, is of especial interest to residents of the Junction at the present time, in view of the application pending before the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board, on the 28th inst. It is fortunate for Junctionites that the Toronto Street Railway is not operated under a Dominion charter, declaring it to be for the general benefit of Canada. Had such been the case the provincial railway board could not apparently give any relief for breach of the agreement between the railway and the municipality, in the matter of a sufficient distance north of the present boundary.

The additional territory that the Junction hopes to acquire by being incorporated as a city will not only increase the acreage of the town, but will add probably 2000 to its population. The southern boundary of the new territory will run from Elizabeth-street to Jane-street, and the northern boundary will be Jane-street, and the northern boundary a sufficient distance north of St. Clair-avenue to take in the district known as Scarlett's Plains.

The Coal Company proposes to go direct to the privy council instead of first appealing to Ottawa in order to save time in reaching the court of last resort. Security for costs will be asked for in \$500.

Stole \$8000 Silver Nugget.

COBALT, Ont., Jan. 22.—Between the hours of 10 and 1 o'clock last night, when the watchman at the King Edward mine was some distance from the ore house, it was broken into by thieves and a nugget worth \$8000 was stolen. SECOND FIRE MYSTIFIES.

No Sign of It When Building Was Vacated at Midnight.

Just how the fire got going again yesterday morning in the Dominion School Supply Co.'s premises at 20 Temperance-street is puzzling Chief Thompson and his aides.

The first fire, on Tuesday night, broke out in the cellar and, altho the smoke was very bad, the firemen groped their way into it and soon had it under control. The chief remained until 10.30 p.m., and made an inspection of the building to satisfy himself the blaze was out, while Captains Russell and Sweatman of Bay-street, and Inspector Gane of the fire department, were on duty at the time.

At 2.40 a.m. employees of the Orle restaurant next door discovered the second fire, and the firemen were called out on an alarm and got to a fire in the quickest possible time, and 10 minutes later the alarm went in yesterday morning there were five streams of water flooding the building through second and third storey windows, and five minutes later there wasn't a sign of glare.

Because of first appearances Portland and Dundas-st. sections were brought down by telephone, but were not needed.

Richmond-street hose made the discovery that a hydrant opposite the Simpson building was dry. It seems that it was shut off some weeks ago when the main was weakened by a washout, but the fire department were never notified.

Altho no criticism can be attached to the fire department for the second outbreak, Chief Thompson says that in future he will make assurance doubly sure and, in cases where there is a possibility that fire may recur, will leave a watchman.

It might be mentioned that in the American cities where the insurance patrol, or salvage corps, operate, in case of a fire like that of Tuesday night, men would be left on duty to clean things up and afford protection to the property after the firemen leave.
