TWENTY-SIXTH YEAR

SIR WILFRID SAYS HE WILE JAC FOLLOWERS PREPARE FOR HUMILIATION

Public Hostility to Autonomy Bill Has Far Exceeded His Expectations and Premier Gets Ready to Introduce

a Sweeping Compromise That Will Include a Reference of Constitutional Features

to the Courts.

Ottawa, March 15 - (Special.) - The debate on the autono bill was anticipated again in the house to-day. A discussion ensued, which was strong at both ends and weak in the middle. R. L. Borden led off with a reference to certain questions arising out of Premier Haultain's letter to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He asked a number of questions pertinent to the situation, none of which the prime minister deigned to honor with a definite reply. The premier's speech was characteristically evasive. But it was more than that. It was full of gloom. It was especially pessimistic in its reference to the amendments which are to be made to the bill.

Sir Wilfrid conveyed to the house the distinct impression that the bill, as introduced to the house, cannot be put thru, that the separate school clauses are to be amended, and that the government is prepared to go as far in this direction as may be necessary to ren-

The tone of the premier's speech was depressing and it so affected his followers, who gathered from it that the government is about to make a humiliating back-down in the matter of the educational clauses. Sir Wilfrid's speech prepares the public for almost any kind of amendment to the autonomy bill. Guarded as the premier was in his language, he made it known that public hostility to the autonomy bill has far exceeded his expectation, and that he is prepared to agree upon a compromise. Your correspondent reiterates the opinion that the compromise will be in the nature of a reference of the constitutional features of the question to the courts.

The debate precipitated by Mr. Borden on the motion to go into committee of supply flagged at 5 o'clock in the afternoon, only to break forth with increased intensity at 10 o'clock to-night. At that late hour, George Eulas Foster proceeded to discuss the question, and he was successful in drawing the minister of justice.






