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

HISTORICAL MEMORANDA.

On the 10th March, 1875, 111 members of Zion Church withdrew from that fellowship, for the purpose of forming a new Congregational Church under the pastoral care of the Rev. J. F. Stevenson, LL.B., one of the joint-pastors of Zion Church. On Sunday, March 14th, 1875, after an appropriate service conducted by Mr. Stevenson, the Church was duly organised, and Mr. Stevenson was unanimously chosen Pastor. At the same time the Church, by formal Resolution of the united brotherhood, received the name of "Emmanuel Church." As the Church possessed no local habitation of its own, the public services on the Lord's Day were held in the Montreal Gymnasium Building; and on week-evenings, in the Lecture-Room of Erskine Church. In the month of June, 1875, ground was broken for the erection of a new church-edifice, on a site occupying the corner of Stanley street and facing St. Catherine street.

On April 15th, 1876, the corner-stone was laid by the Pastor, assisted by the Rev. Dr. Wilkes. To the Pastor a silver trowel was presented, bearing the following inscription:—

Presented to the
REV. JOHN FREDERICK STEVENSON,
On the occasion of his laying the
Corner-stone of EMMANUEL (Congrega-
tional) CHURCH, Montreal.
April 15th, 1876.

"Except the Lord build the house, they
labour in vain who build it."

The jar deposited in the corner-stone contained the following:—

1. An Historical Sketch of the origin of Emmanuel Church.
2. A copy of the Church Manual for 1875.
3. A list of the names of the Building and Finance Committee.
4. The names of the Architect and Contractors.
5. Newspapers.
6. Starke's Almanac for 1876.
7. Canada Congregational Year Book for 1876.
8. Various current Coins of the Realm.

On January 14th and 21st, 1877, the building was opened for Divine Service with Special Dedicatory Services.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF
EMMANUEL CHURCH, 1881.

The Annual Meeting of the Members of Emmanuel Church was held on the evening of January 17th, 1881, in the Lecture Room of the Church.

The Pastor, the Rev. Dr. Stevenson, occupied the chair.

1. Devotional service and Pastor's address.
2. The Report of the Board of Trustees, together with the Treasurer's Statement, was read; and, on motion, received and adopted.
3. The Church re-elected by ballot the following brethren to serve on the Board of Trustees for the current year:—Messrs. J. S. McLachlan, Wilson and Scholes. Mr. Porteous was elected in the room of Mr. L. Cushing who, much to the regret of the Church, had been compelled by serious illness to resign.
4. The Report of the Ladies' Aid Society was read and adopted. It reported that during the year \$1,295.05 had been raised for various purposes, of which \$1,225 had been handed over to the Building Fund. Whereupon,
 5. It was, on motion, *Resolved* unanimously:—
"That the Church has heard with much gratification the Report now read, and desires once more to record its grateful appreciation of the valuable services again rendered by the self-denying and untiring efforts of the Ladies' Aid Society."
 6. The Annual Report of the Church Board was read; and, on motion, was received and adopted. (For Report see page 8.)
 7. The Rev. Dr. Cornish was re-elected Church Secretary by a standing vote, the Church at the same time again expressing its cordial thanks to him for his services continued during the past year.
 8. On the question of the mode of appointing brethren to serve on the Church Board, it was *Ordered*:—
"That a Nominating Committee be named by the Chair, to present a list of names for election by the Church."
 9. The Pastor nominated Messrs. Theo. Lyman, C. R. Black and Wm. Reid as the said Committee, who withdrew, and returned with the following list of names for presentation to the Church; viz.:—Messrs. J. D. Dougall, J. M. M. Duff, John Porteous, F. F. Blackader, H. Sanders, C. T. Williams, H. K. Ritchie, James Taylor, and Donald Campbell.
 10. On motion, it was *Resolved* unanimously:—
"That the nomination now submitted be received, and that the brethren therein named be elected to serve on the Church Board for the current year."
 11. The Report of the Sunday School Committee was read and received, and the Committee for the present year was appointed.

12. The Report of the Committee on Psalmody was read. It reported satisfactorily on the regular attendance and diligence and good progress of the members of the choir in all matters appertaining to the Psalmody of the congregation; and recommended the re-appointment of Mr. Hecker as organist and choir-master for the present year.

13. On motion, the above report was received and adopted, and the following were appointed as the Committee on Psalmody:—Messrs. Learmont, Henry Lyman, Gurd, Dr. Andres, C. M. Alexander, A. C. Lyman, Porteous, and C. F. Williams.

14. The Report of the Young People's Association was read and received. This Association was organised in November last, and its objects are:—"The advancement of the cause of Christ and the interests of our Church; also the promotion of Sociability and Literary Culture among the young people of the Congregation."

15. The Pastor and Messrs. Alexander and Linton were re-appointed the Committee on the Use of the Church Building.

16. Mr. Reid, the Secretary-Treasurer, in the absence of Mr. Henry Lyman, the President, through indisposition, made an oral report of the proceedings of the Building Fund Union during the past year, and submitted the Treasurer's Statement, which was received, and is given on page 15.

17. On motion, it was *Resolved*:—

"That a Church Directory be published, as heretofore, but with the Report of the Church Board in full, under the care of the Church Secretary."

18. On motion, it was *Resolved*:—

"That the above minutes be, and are hereby taken as read and confirmed."

After prayer, the meeting adjourned.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH BOARD FOR 1880.

It is with great gratitude to Almighty God that your Board present this, another Annual Report, forasmuch as the year of which they have now to submit an account has been one, in many ways, of marked prosperity with us. Is has been a year of growth in respect of numbers; and, there is good reason to hope, of growth also in spiritual power and influence for good. Death has made no inroads on our ranks; and what is better still, these have not been weakened nor broken by any root of bitterness

springing up to trouble and divide us, but peace and harmony have prevailed. Our beloved Pastor has been favoured with such a goodly measure of health and strength, as that there has been no interruption in the regular discharge of his public ministrations among his people. And these ministrations have been characterised by an increasing acceptability, efficiency and zeal, whilst there has been a corresponding growth in the appreciation with which they have been received and regarded by the Church and congregation, which has found expression in various forms. Nor should the fact remain unmentioned, that beyond the limits of our own circle there have been accorded to him gratifying tokens of the high appreciation in which his character and his abilities are held, by the fact that his services have been sought frequently and in divers places, and that one of the Universities of recognised standing in our land has, in spontaneous recognition of his worth, conferred on him the highest academic distinction in the gift of a University. It is then no more than meet and right that we, his people, should rejoice with him in this prosperity, and count ourselves honoured in honour done to him; and should stand more and more united together to strengthen his hands and gladden his heart in all the ways in which we can do this. But this should not be forgotten by us, that as we grow in numbers and in strength, and as larger means and appliances for larger usefulness are placed in our power, so our responsibilities increase upon us in a solemn proportion to be all and to do all that is implied in loyal allegiance to Christ our Master, to the Pastor who has been set over us, to our own Church, to the Holy Catholic Church, and to the wide world.

Your Board have to report, that in accordance with the By-law, the Church Roll has been carefully examined and revised, and that the statistics of the year are as follows:—

Thus there has been a clear gain of *twenty-two*, leaving a membership at present date of 209. A very gratifying feature in the additions of the

year now reported, as also of the previous year, is the fact that most of those who have been received on profession have been young people from the families of the Church, and members of the Sunday School. This is as it should be, for there can be no permanent growth where young life and vigour are not taken in and appropriated to the Church's uses and wants. It is proper also to note, that among those received by letter has been Rev. Dr. Wilkes, the honoured pastor of the parent Church, together with his family.

There has been likewise a marked increase in the numbers of the general congregation, especially at the morning-service of the Lord's Day; and the number of new sittings taken has been larger than in any previous year. Your Board deem it their duty, at this point, to say a word touchingly the Sunday-evening congregation. This is not what it might reasonably be expected to be; not in respect of strangers, however, but of our own people. Were all who could come present, the evening congregation would, as a rule, be larger than that of the morning; instead of which, we find it to be much smaller. Now, this should not be, and in most other churches it is not the case. There are three classes of absentees; viz., those who would come, if they could, but are prevented by sickness or some other legitimate cause; those who could come, if they would, but prefer to stay at home, satisfied with the one good sermon they have heard, and, let us charitably hope, profitably engaged in marking, learning and inwardly digesting the same; and, lastly, there are those who, forsaking their own, go wandering into other pastures. Will such as these bear the word of kindly remonstrance and warning as to neglected duty, to say nothing of neglected privilege? As a Church we owe something better than this to our Pastor, who puts forth his best efforts for our instruction and profit at the evening-service as well as at the morning. There is a great deal of human nature in ministers even, and an array of seats unoccupied by those who should be in them, is not the most stimulating sight in the world.

In response to the invitation of the Pastor and Deacons, the Rev. Prof. Fenwick has again kindly formed an Adult class for the study of the Scriptures, which meets on Sunday afternoons. The attendance at this class is increasing, showing that this service on the part of Prof. Fenwick is held in value by many among us; and your Board are pleased to add, that tokens of the Divine blessing have not been wanting to it. Mrs. Stevenson and Mr. Hague likewise continue to conduct their classes in connection with the Sunday School. To one and all of these friends are the best thanks of the Church due for their self-denying exertions to promote its welfare.

The Committee on Psalmody will report on the matters entrusted to their charge; but your Board must not omit to recognize the valuable and regular services of the Choir, which deserve grateful and honourable mention in this Report.

The Church is again under great obligation to the Ladies' Aid Society for their zealous efforts and timely pecuniary assistance in aid of the Building Fund, of which an account more in detail will be given in their report. The amount raised by the Association was \$1,295.

The Annual Meeting of the Congregational Union of Ontario and Quebec was, for the first time, held in this Church, in the month of June last, and was largely attended. Messrs. Henry Lyman and Sanders were appointed the Delegates of the Church thereto, and they duly discharged the duties of their office. A Committee of the Church to make arrangements for the entertainment of the members of the Union was appointed, with Mr. J. M. M. Duff as Convener. The arrangements made were very complete and successful, and the Committee reported that the Ladies' Aid Society and Mr. and Mrs. Hague had rendered essential service by their cheerful co-operation with them; to all of whom the Church accorded its warm thanks.

In accordance with minutes 9 and 10 of last Annual Meeting, the B. F. U. was fully organised early in the year, and went into immediate operation, and with what gratifying results, their own Report, to be presented at this meeting, will show. The machinery thereby provided for its special object has hitherto worked well; let us see to it that it be kept going, until the debt shall have crumbled away under its steady and penetrating working.

During the year the C. C. of B. N. A. has taken up its abode under our roof, the Church granting one of its large rooms for its use as lecture-room and library, which is found to be well suited for these purposes. The Board of Directors have, by special resolution, gratefully recognised this action on the part of the Church.

A Young People's Association, in connection with the Church and Congregation, has been organised, and is in successful operation. The Church is anxious that this should be joined by all our young people, of both sexes, who can join it, for its meetings and proceedings may be made the means of much profitable enjoyment and usefulness.

Social meetings have been held during the year, and have been found to be pleasant occasions for mutual talk and stimulus in matters appertaining to our common Church-life and work. The Board are not unmindful of the labour and anxiety demanded from the ladies to make

these meetings successful; but in these times of numerous engagements, public and private, whereby so many spare hours are occupied that the social element in our Church-life is in danger of being wholly lost sight of, more occasions like these which serve to bring us together face to face are greatly to be desired, and their good results amply compensate for all the time and trouble spent on them.

The operations of that very important department of the Church's work, the Sunday School, will be duly reported by the Committee of the School. The Church is under large obligation to the Superintendent and other officers and teachers of the School, for all the labour and time and thought which they expend thereupon. It is now an acknowledged fact, that the prosperity of the Church depends largely upon the efficiency of the Sunday School. This being the case, the relationship between Church and School should be of the most intimate character; in short, the School should be a recognised part of the Church-organisation, controlled, sustained and fostered by the Church. Hence, it is the bounden duty of the Church as a whole, and of every individual member, to accord to the School a generous support and kindly interest and oversight, in order to its maintenance in a high degree of efficiency and usefulness.

This, with the amount of receipts acknowledged by the Treasurer of \$7444.98, gives a grand total of \$14,603.25.

Not the smallest matter for thankfulness and congratulation is the Report of the Board of Trustees, which shows that the finances of the Church are in such a healthy condition as to have a balance on the right side of the account; a rather unusual phenomenon in these days of

Church debts and deficits. For this result great credit is due to the systematic and persistent care of our esteemed Treasurer.

And now, in concluding this Report, your Board would call upon you to unite with them in thanksgiving that the past year has been, in so many ways, a year so prosperous to us as a Church, and that at present the outlook for the future is so auspicious and encouraging. Let us find in all this stronger and stronger grounds for a whole-hearted consecration to God, and to one another; and we shall have, as the years roll on, a history ever richer in honour and usefulness, and fraught with larger blessings both to ourselves and to others.
