SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 13--The Call will say tomorrow: Secretary McCall before leaving for Washington yesterday declared that the state of California is determined to resist the demand of the people of San Francisco, if not the whole state, is opposed to allowing Japanese or Chinese children to mingle freely with Caucasian children in the public schools, and that it is likely that the statute providing that Asiatic children be taught in separate schools will be strengthened at the coming session of the legislature.

DEATH OF GAIN B. TAYLOR RESIDENT OF INDIANTOWN FOR MORE THAN 60 YEARS Gain Bartlett Taylor, one of the oldest residents of Indian town, and a man who held the high respect and esteem of all who knew him, died at five o'clock this morning at the residence of Mrs. J. S. Brown, 34 Adelaide street. Mr. Taylor was for over sixty years a resident of Indian town and no man in the town was more widely known. He was one of the Taylors of Burton, Sanbury county, a well-known old Loyalist family. He was born in Burton in 1819, but removed to Indian town over sixty years ago. Although 87 years of age at the time of his death, he was a man of wonderful vitality, and up to the time of his illness was able to read or work without the aid of spectacles. His illness was of short duration. A few days ago he took cold, pneumonia

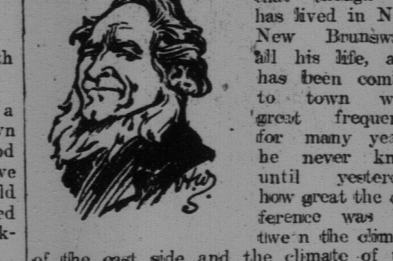
developed and culminated in his death this morning. Mr. Taylor's business was that of a lumberman, but he was also a well-known hunter and guide. A master of wood craft, he was endowed with a retentive memory and many interesting tales could be told of trips through the unsettled portions of this province and Quebec on many years ago. He leaves three sons and three daughters. His sons are Messrs. Albert and William Taylor, engaged with James Holby & Sons, and Gain B., Jr., porter at the residence of Mrs. Taylor. His daughters are Mrs. John S. Brown, with whom he resided, Mrs. Mortimer L. Day and Mrs. Joseph Irvine. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock from the residence of Mrs. Brown.

FERNIE STRIKE IS CALLED OFF The Fernie, B. C., Nov. 13.—The coal strike that has been in force for the past seven weeks came to an unexpected end last evening, when T. C. Burke, representative of the national board of U. M. W. of A., called upon Montreal Manager Lindsey and conceded all that the company had all along demanded.

The agreement which follows vindicates the company completely. Burke was forced into surrender by the unmistakable attitude of the bulk of miners, who opposed the strike from the first.

ALLAN LINERS WILL COME HERE Head Official of Line Says Only First One Will go to Halifax Direct.

Montreal, Nov. 13.—Despite the denial at C. P. R. headquarters, Hugh Allan, of the Allan line, says that the winter port arrangements have been completed for the mail steamers. Barring the first vessel, the Virginia, which sailed on Friday last from Liverpool (omitting the Movie call), the Allan liners will land mails at Halifax and cargo at St. John. The Virginia would not go to St. John, but she will be withdrawn from the route for repairs after the first voyage.

The succeeding steamers, the Parisian and the Tunisia, will go to Halifax and St. John," said Mr. Allan.

When asked about the O. P. R. Express vessels, Mr. Allan declined to make a definite statement, but he intimated that they would probably land the mails at Halifax.

Asked as to the turbine Victoria, Mr. Allan replied that it was hoped to obtain permission for her to undergo the necessary annual overhauling before resuming her position in the mail service.

D. McNeill, vice-president and general manager of the C. P. R., told the correspondents for The Telegram tonight that he could not say whether or not the Express would make Halifax a port of call. "No decision has yet been reached," he said, "but I am sure that we will have nothing further to say," he declared.

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS ARRANGE TO CELEBRATE Final arrangements have been made for the annual celebration of the St. John Council, Knights of Columbus, which will take place Thursday and Friday next. The members of St. John Council will assemble Thursday morning in their rooms in Berrymans' hall, and at 9:30 o'clock will march to the cathedral, where high mass will be celebrated, and a sermon will be delivered by Rev. Dr. Thompson, of Antigonish.

The City Cornet Band will lead the procession on its way to the church and return. Seats in the cathedral will be reserved for the knights, but it is hoped that the church will be filled by the general congregation, for it is the knights' wish that there be a large congregation present. The service will begin at 10 o'clock.

During Thursday afternoon and evening the first, second and third degrees will be exemplified in York Theatre. On Friday evening there will be a smoker in the assembly rooms in honor of the visiting knights, who are expected to come from Nova Scotia, P. E. Island, Maine and other places.

PURSE AND PICTURE FOR REV. DAVID LONG

Rev. David Long, retiring pastor of Victoria street Baptist church, was tendered a farewell last night, the church being crowded to the doors. Two presentations were the order of the evening, one from the congregation—a purse of more than \$100, and another from the choir, who gave Mr. Long a group picture, in a handsome frame.

The following city clergymen occupied seats on the platform: Rev. Neil MacLaughlin, Portland Methodist; Rev. A. H. Foster, Douglas avenue Presbyterian; Rev. A. B. Cook, Brunel street Baptist; Rev. P. J. Stackhouse, Tabernacle, Haymarket square; Rev. Dr. McIntyre, Rev. Dr. Wooden, of Jerningham, and Rev. J. C. B. Appel, Douglas avenue Christian church. G. B. Cromwell occupied the chair.

After the singing of a hymn, Rev. Dr. Warden read a portion of scripture; prayer was then offered by Rev. Dr. McIntyre. This was followed by the hymn Jesus Lover of My Soul. Addresses telling of the great worth of Rev. Mr. Long and of the very high esteem in which he was held by all were delivered by the clergymen present, after which Rev. 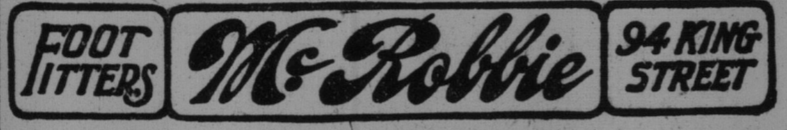

M. SANTOS DUMONT IN FLIGHT

M. Santos-Dumont, who had already won the Deutsch prize of \$20,000 with his dirigible balloon, also won the Archdeacon Cup for aeroplanes. Mounted on his original apparatus, he made a fine flight of 60 metres (200 feet) at Bagatelle on October 23. The above photograph is the only one taken during this flight. It shows that the aeroplane did not rise to a very great height above the ground, only about two metres. This, however, was not the question, the great interest of the experiment being the demonstration that one can succeed in sustaining level flight without the aid of a support lighter than air.

ROOSEVELT TRAVELS IN STYLE ON TRIP TO PANAMA

Special Arrangements Have Been Made for Comfort of the President on His Southern Trip--Great Interest Manifested in Assembling of Next Congress.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 8.—Now that the elections are over and the result known the country will await the next important event in the political programme which will be the assembling of congress in less than a month hence. The elections on Tuesday have made it certain that the administration will have a majority in congress for the remainder of the president's term of office and while the majority will not be as large as that of the fifty-ninth congress, it is probably, indeed almost certain, that it will be more complete accord with the administration and less trouble during the present congress, for, notwithstanding the carried out during the last session, there were some realists members and senators in his own party. Mr. Wadsworth, who opposed the most important bill and defied the president in his own party, has now suggested the seal of a paid attorney has lost his election. The friends of the president and notably his son-in-law, have, I believe, without exception been returned.

The boasts and threats of those sons of labor whose work is marred by their jaws, have come to naught, not a single member of congress, it appears, having been defeated by the labor vote. Eclipsed in New York, but it will be some time before the decent and conservative people of the country recover from this. Radicalism, socialism, anarchy have long been latent and are now rampant in American politics and not until the noxious disease is stamped out should the country state its anxious vigilance.

The president is speeding athwart the flashing brine to examine the great ditch on the spot. It may be imagined that his heart is light and sanguine, optimistic temperament will enable him during the days and weeks of his absence to have hope and faith in the continued welfare and beneficent progress of his administration.

President Roosevelt's visit to Panama will be unprecedented in history and will permanently explode the theory that a president during his absence from office must be a prisoner in the country. When that idea first became one of the unwritten laws which have heretofore hedged presidents about the United States had no outlying possessions and a president in so doing his country had no occasion to go outside of the boundaries of the United States, but circumstances have altered these as well as boundaries and with our widening possessions it would be absurd to inhibit the chief executive from paying calls upon any of them at any time he decided that for their benefit such a visit was desirable. If the president should visit Alaska, Guam, Hawaii or even take a little sail to the Philippines, it would be no rational reason why he should be deterred from doing so merely because of an antiquated superstition that the president cannot go off American soil. On the return trip from Panama the president will visit Porto Rico, and that our interests as well as those of the Porto Ricans cannot but be benefited is clear to everybody.

It must also be regarded as suspicious that the first visit of our president outside of the country would be to one of our Latin-American neighbors, to all of whom we stand in the foster parent attitude but to whom we have been always rather patronizing and indifferent. Secretary Root's visit this summer was followed by increased friendliness on the part of our South American neighbors and it is probable that the president's visit in Central America will create a favorable impression and result in better understanding with the Southern Continent. The president will be accompanied on his trip by Mrs. Roosevelt and their quarters aboard the battleship Louisiana have been fitted up with every comfort.

The president's cabin will be separated from the rest of the ship by a temporary bulkhead which in an emergency can be closed and render that section water-tight independently of the rest of the vessel. The admiral's stateroom will be occupied by the president and the chief of staff. The chief of staff's room will be used as a sitting room while the space around the stateroom has been fitted up for an office and general sitting room for the use of the president and those who accompany him. There have been no added decorations in the quarters but they have been fitted out with desks, easy chairs, wardrobes and such accessories as may add to the comfort of the party.

During the voyage the president is far from being a good sailor and suffers as much and as quickly from seasickness as any ordinary person. Mrs. Roosevelt on the other hand is a good sailor and though she has crossed the ocean a number of times has never succumbed to the malady of the sea. The Louisiana has been fully equipped with a wireless apparatus and the president will be supplied with all of the important news every day during his voyage. A son of Rear Admiral Bob Evans will accompany the party as the president's naval aide.

The action of the president in dismissing in disgrace an entire battalion of the 25th Infantry, consisting of colored troops who refused to disclose the identity of some of their members who had been guilty of violence and murder is an unprecedented in the history of the army and is certain to cause a sensation throughout the service. The troops under General Garlington have been stationed near Brownsville, Texas, and while there some of their number became engaged in a quarrel with some citizens of the town and one of the latter was killed. The companions of the guilty ones refused to divulge names or to furnish any information which would enable the officers to fix the guilt. As a result the president was appealed to and replied that "The people of the United States must be proud of the men wearing the uniform of the army as their protectors and not midnight assassins or riotous disturbers of the community in which they may be stationed, and that as the battalion has refused to furnish information by which the guilt can be fixed the whole battalion should be discharged 'without honor.'" He has also called upon Colonel Pitcher, of the 27th to make a report as to whether the remarks made by the regimentary of the colored troops be true, and directs that proceedings be taken against him if it is found that such statements had been made.

J., for their interest in the commander, his wife and little daughter is intense. The commander is Captain Frank Patten, of Bath, Maine, who has sailed the seas since he was a lad. His wife is a niece of Dr. William P. Melcher, of Mount Holy. The Kineo is named after the largest mountain at Moosehead Lake, in Maine. She is of the schooner type, 2,200 tons.

Quebec, Nov. 13 - The Gaspeian arrived shortly after noon today with most of the 600 shipwrecked passengers of the steamer Kensington aboard, who were landed at the immigration sheds immediately astern of the Empress of Britain.

Several of the passengers and some of the stewards of the Kensington, as well as Capt. Bouchard, of the Gaspeian, were interviewed and their stories agree on almost every point.

The passengers were compelled to put up with many discomforts, chief among these being the want of provisions during the last twenty-four hours.

Deceased was very popular in social circles, her genial disposition and pleasant smile being an inspiration to all.

GOVERNMENT WILL REPAIR BRIDGE

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 13 - Provincial Government Engineer A. R. Wetmore arrived here this afternoon from Fredericton and inspected Hall's Creek bridge abutment which slid from the foundation towards the creek Saturday night.

He says the abutment cannot be saved and will have to be entirely rebuilt. Whether the work of rebuilding will commence this fall he is unable to say at present.

Edward F. Kellogg, of the Foundation Company, which is doing the work, said yesterday that the foundations of the Singer Building would cost twice as much as those of the largest skyscrapers which are on an average half its height, or twenty-one stories.

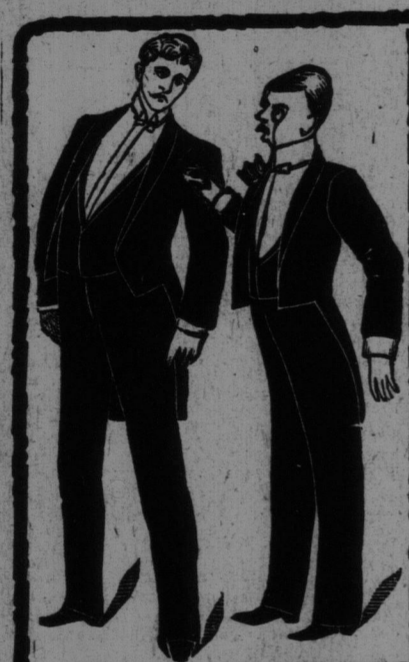

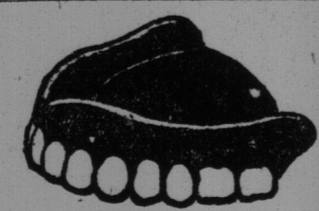

The question of the nationalization of the port of St. John is receiving the attention of sub-committees of the city council and the board of trade. The committee from the council is preparing a statement of the revenues of the harbor which will be submitted to the government. The board of trade committee is waiting for the completion of this report and when it is complete a joint meeting of both will be held.

After all this murky weather and chilling rain Jack Frost will step in and make things good and wintry. Then the old Vic. ice rink will be opened and the true Canadian pastime will be on tap to everybody. But before the immense interior is flooded the rink management will hold a grand series of roller rink entertainments as a fitting close to a remarkable season of summer and autumn skating. Friday night of this week there will be dancing after the regular band programme; Saturday night there will be a programme of races, and next Tuesday a carnival is the feature.

AT THE OPERA HOUSE

The Ellis Stock Company last night produced "Lost Paradise" in a very pleasing manner. It is by all odds the most popular offering the company has yet made and the members of the cast showed to much advantage in it. THE WINTER A BUSY ONE

May Have 130 Steamship Sailings From Port of St. John

SITUATION REVIEWED

Four Steamers Now Loading for Various Ports—Schooners Windbound—Potatoes for West Indies—Big Grain Trade.

Along the harbor front affairs have been rather quiet for the past week, on account of the recent storm along the coast, which has detained sailing vessels of every description.

There are at the present time four ocean steamships in the harbor, all taking outward cargo. The Battle liner Onuxaa is about ready for sea, bound for a port in the United Kingdom with a cargo of deals. The Furness steamship Almeriana is loading for Liverpool with a general cargo. The Donaldson liner Inland is loading a general cargo for Glasgow. This steamer will go via Norfolk, Va., to finish loading. She will sail tomorrow. The Oruro, which landed a cargo here from the West Indies, is at the Corporation Pier taking in a general cargo for the south, including a large shipment of potatoes.

There is also a large fleet of schooners waiting for favorable winds to sail for ports of destination in the United States.

Next week the winter port business will commence to boom. The first vessel will be the steamship Alcides of the Donaldson line, unless the Allan turbine steamer Virginia, due at Halifax next Saturday, should come here. Already grain has commenced to arrive from the west, and a large amount is now in the elevator at the wharf side. Last year nearly seven million bushels of wheat went forward, and the total is expected to reach that or more this season. The indications point that way.

The coming season, no doubt, will be a busy one along the harbor front. Looking at the number of sailings scheduled for different lines coming here, it is estimated that over 130 steamers will leave this port with full cargoes for United Kingdom and other places.

The immigration office here expects to have a busy season. Representatives of the C. P. R. and other lines say the applications for passage are coming in rapidly, and they are preparing for a big passenger traffic this season. The immigration office on the west side is now in the best shape for doing business. A heavy general freight business both going and coming is expected.
