Providence, R. I., Sept. 23—The Providence Journal says:—

It is stated on positive authority that the full capacity of the German shippersels for trades are beat to not more than three a month, but that even if Germany were able to replace her submarines as fast as they had been destroyed, the most grave situation she faces in regard to this method of warfare is the actual destruction of the morale of the officers and crews of such ve ssels."




