EMPIRE REPORT IS TRIUMPH FOR CANADA

MOMENTOUS PAPER ON CONSTITUTIONAL PROBLEMS RELEASED

Warm Praise Given Canadian Delegation in Highest Circles in London for Tact and Skill

IRELAND AND SOUTH AFRICA SATISFIED

Governors-General to Have Status of Viceroy is One Result of Lord Bynng's Precedent Established at Last Elections Here

LONDON, Nov. 20.—The report on inter-imperial relations, drafted by Lord Balfour, which is one of the most momentous documents ever issued by an Imperial conference, is a triumph not only for Canada's national attitude towards the constitutional problems of the British Empire, but also the tact, skill and constitutional knowledge of the Canadian delegation.

This is the opinion expressed in the highest circles today. Not only has Mackenzie King obtained for Canada all that he wanted, but he has also supported the aspirations of other Dominions like Ireland and South Africa, thereby solidifying the unity of the Empire as well as exerting a restraining influence over elements that threaten to disturb Imperial unity.

The case of the future powers of the Governor General is an example in point. Without referring to Lord Bynng's action by name, the Canadian Premier has persuaded the conference to elevate the position of the Governor General to that of Viceroy and at the same time has reduced to their powers as channels of communication between the home government and the Dominions.

TO REPRESENT KING. In future Governor-Generals will be the personal representative of the King and have all the status of a constitutional monarch in the Dominions. They will follow in all political crisis the same procedure as that of the King and have all the status of a constitutional monarch in the Dominions. This means the disappearance of the Governor General as a separate office and the substitution of the King himself as the head of the Empire. This is the direct result of the conference and opens up a way of direct communication between the home and Dominion governments which will be established both in London and in the Dominions.

ALL EQUAL IN STATUS. Australia has pointed out that for the last two years they have had direct communication with the home government. In defining the equality of status of the Dominions, Mackenzie King has followed the trail in the constitutional development of the Empire which was blazed by preceding Canadian Premiers. Under the new arrangement, no Dominion will be subordinate to another and a British Governor is only equal in status with each of the Dominions. In dealing with foreign powers an interlocking arrangement of common allegiance to the crown and freely associated as members of the British Commonwealth of Nations.

CHANGE KING'S TITLE. The reports described equality of status as the root of the principle governing inter-imperial relations. It then proceeds to apply this political theory to the common needs, observing that nothing is to be gained by attempting to lay down a constitution for the Empire. The report opens with a discussion of the relations between the various parts of the Empire.

REPRESENTATIVES HAPPY. The representatives of the Dominions are very happy over the result of this part of the conference. The conference was described today by one of the delegates as "hard work" where the old ideas of making sentimental speeches about Imperial unity has been replaced by a desire to achieve something practical and to turn Imperial sentiment into channels which will guide the future of the Empire. In this way, it is believed that the conference will prove the greatest of all these assemblies.

Foreign Relations. With regard to relations with foreign countries, the report seeks to give full application to the resolution on the negotiation of treaties which was adopted. It recommends that in future treaties the British ministers shall sign for Great Britain instead of for the Empire, with each Dominion signing for itself, Canada signing immediately after Great Britain.

Given Freedom To Make Film Canada's Part In Great War

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 20.—A big production of the dramatic story of the Canadian Corps in Italy, planned by Lt.-Col. W. F. Clarke, well-known New York producer, who commanded the Manchesters on the west front, and who is now in Toronto doing preliminary work. "This picture," said Colonel Clarke, "will be, in fact, the 'Big Parade' of Canada, and war film will be authentic, having been taken in the heat of battle by official photographers, some of whom lost their lives in the attempt. It will mark the first serious Canadian effort to produce pictures, and the cast will be one of the strongest, selected from leading American-trained British stars, directors and technical men."

LAKES SWEEP BY FURIOUS STORMS

Nine Vessels Overdue Although Anxiety Not Great For Their Safety

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 20.—Storms which lashed Lakes Michigan and Superior the greater part of the night and day, and which have been reported, however, that the storm was subsiding. The vessels, including the Monroe C. Smith, the David Z. Norton, the W. H. Fitzgerald and the Sam Mitchell, early today had not been heard from, although long overdue here. Many of the vessels had been put into shelter to wait until the storm's fury abated. The steamer Colton today was a mass of twisted wreckage held fast on the rock of Lake Superior's shore 22 miles up from Sault Ste. Marie, where it crashed Monday night when borne by a wind of 60 miles an hour.

PREDECESSOR, N. B., Nov. 20.—Reports received by L. A. Unseating Hearing Declared Irregular

MONTREAL, Nov. 20.—Alleging that the proceedings taken to unseat Leslie G. Bell, Federal member-elect for St. Antoine division, were irregular and illegal, a motion was presented to Mr. Justice Bruneau in the Practice Court yesterday asking that the petition for the action be dismissed. Argument on the motion will take place Monday. Today's action follows the unseating proceedings brought by Andrew Vallant, an elector, under the Dominion Contravention Elections Act. The petitioner charged that Mr. Bell's election was irregular.

out the definite assent of their own governments.

In the change recommended in the King's title, the term "United Kingdom" disappears. The change, it is explained, is necessitated by the Irish Free State becoming a dominion. The new title will read:

"George V., by the grace of God, of Great Britain, Ireland and the British Dominions beyond the seas, king, defender of the faith, emperor of India."

On the position of a governor-general, the report observes, "in our opinion it is essential consequence of the equality of status existing among the members of the British commonwealth of nations that the governor-general of a dominion is a representative of the crown, holding in all essential respects the same position in relation to the administration of public affairs in the dominion as is held by His Majesty the King in Great Britain, and that he is not a representative or agent of His Majesty's government in Great Britain or any part of that government."

The report recommends, however, the appointment of a special committee to consider statutory provisions authorizing disallowance of dominion legislation; the competence of the dominion parliaments to give their legislation extra-territorial effect; the practicability and most convenient method of giving effect to the principle that each Dominion Parliament should have power to give extra-territorial operation to legislation, where such operation is ancillary to the provision for peace and order and good government of the dominion; the principles underlying the colonial laws, the validity of the act of 1865 and the extent to which any provisions of that act should be repealed in the light of the existing returns between the various members of the British commonwealth.

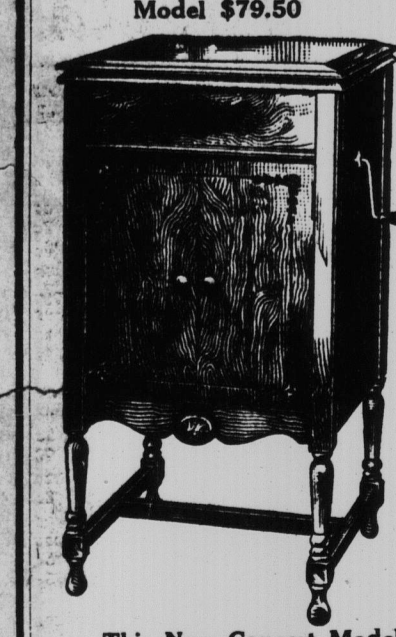

Canada To Renew Passage Scheme

LONDON, Nov. 20—Canada has agreed both to renew the assisted passage scheme for farm worker emigrants and to extend the present land settlement scheme. It was revealed when the report of the land settlement committee was adopted by the Imperial Conference today. The assisted passage scheme, which has been in force since January 1, 1926, will be, with an amendment, extended for two years. Canada's 3,000 family settlement scheme, says the report, is proving so successful that "it has been decided to enter into a further scheme for the settlement of emigrants on crown lands and privately owned lands in Canada."

EIGHT KILLED

BALTIMORE, Md., Nov. 20—Pulsating search of the cooling ruin of the Norwegian tanker Mantilla, rent apart by an explosion in its hold, while in drydock at Sparrowpoint, early today had accounted for only eight of the sixteen men believed killed. A check made by Captain Nils Danielsen indicated that the death toll included 12 of the Mantilla's crew of 38. Four unidentified bodies were apparently those of seamen. The other bodies recovered were believed those of employees of a ship cleaning company. Of these the body of Amiel Peterson, of Baltimore, was identified.

CLAIMS CORRUPT ELECTION

HALIFAX, Nov. 20—A petition under the Dominion Controversial Elections Act, alleging corrupt and illegal practices in the conduct of his candidature in the recent general election, was filed shortly before one o'clock today, against Hon. John G. Douglas, member for Antigonish-Cape Breton, and a former attorney general of Nova Scotia. The petitioner, John A. Macinnis, of Harbor Centre, Antigonish.

FRANC HOLDS STEADY

PARIS, Nov. 20—The franc, reflecting the overnight improvement in value in New York, opened in the early trading today at 26.91 to the dollar and 130.30 to the pound sterling. This is the highest quotation in many months. Yesterday's closing price on the bourse was 28.27 francs to the dollar.

Season Just Closed Has Increase Record Over 1925

ALL CANADA ALSO SHOWS GAIN IS MADE

Crops Value Estimate of \$74,194,000 Is Somewhat Lower

NEW BRUNSWICK led the whole of the Dominion in the average yield of potatoes per acre this season, according to a report which has just been issued by the agricultural division of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics at Ottawa.

The season's figures show a distinct improvement over 1925, when the yield in this province was 108.8 hundredweight and in P. E. I. 119.2 hundredweight.

CANADIAN FIGURES.

The figures for the whole of Canada also show a distinct improvement, according to the estimate. The total yield for 1925 is placed at 50,646,000 hundredweight from 545,172 acres, or 92.9 hundredweight per acre, as compared with 42,373,000 hundredweight from 545,891 acres, or 77.6 hundredweight per acre in 1925.

The total value of the crop for 1925 is estimated at \$74,194,000 as compared with \$58,914,900 for last year.

By provinces the average yields in hundredweight per acre are as follows:

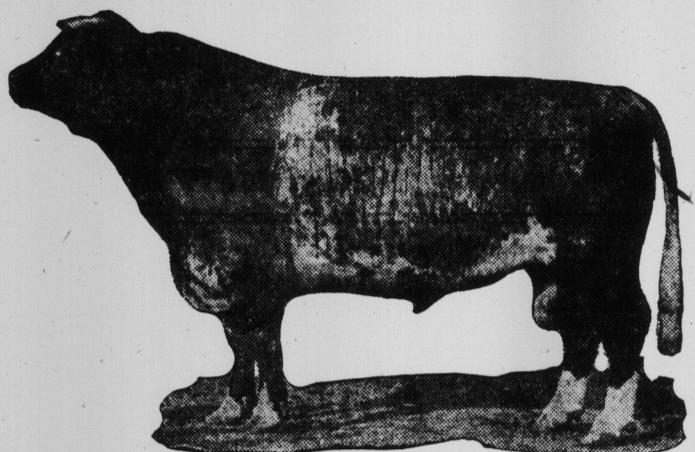
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HERD OWNED BY DR. TAYLOR WINS 17 TROPHIES

GRAND CHAMPION AT ROYAL FAIR

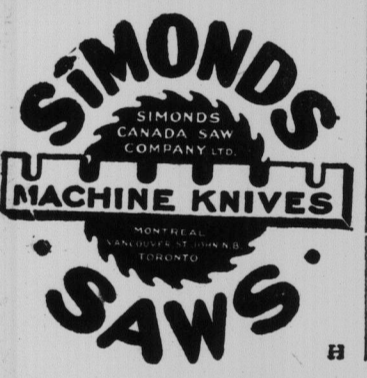

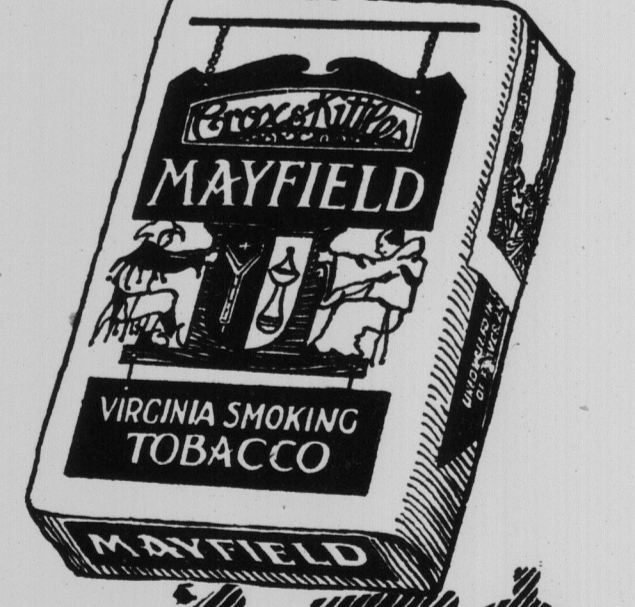

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DR. FARRIS TALKS ON TUBERCULOSIS

Gives Interesting Address to Members of Trades and Labor Council

At the meeting of the Trades and Labor Council held last evening with C. H. Stevens, president, in the chair and a very large attendance of members, Dr. H. A. Farris, superintendent of the County Hospital, spoke on the campaign against tuberculosis, appealing for the co-operation and support of the labor organizations in the interests of humanity and community welfare. He told also the Christmas seals sale which will be conducted to finance the work of the local Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis.

"I will never forget how the captain kept his head," said another sailor, Drey, related when questioned. "He seemed to be bent on sinking with the ship and his face was a picture of despair. 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£2 ASSISTED PASSAGE RATE TO THIS PORT

Cut of £1 Made in 2-Year Agreement With Britain

Ottawa, Nov. 19.—Renewal for a period of two years of the assisted passage agreement, arranged last year for farmers, farm laborers and domestics is announced by Hon. Robert Forke, minister of immigration, here tonight. He further announced that the rate of three pounds sterling had been further reduced to two pounds sterling. This means the following reduction in assisted passage for immigration from the Old Country to: Halifax, Saint John and Quebec, from £3 to £2; Toronto, from £4 10s. to £3 10s.; Winnipeg, £5 10s. to £4 10s.; to Regina and Saskatoon, from £6 to £5; to Calgary and Edmonton, Alberta, from £6 10s. to £5 10s.; to Vancouver, B.C. from £9 to £8. Nearly 20,000 persons took advantage of the assisted passage rates to

Canada from the United Kingdom last year. These included family units, farm laborers and domestics. Of the 3,000 families planned for settlement in Canada, some 1,200 came out this year and the selection of next year's quota is now going on. Perhaps 1,400 or 1,500 families will be brought out next spring. It is hoped that a still greater number of farm laborers and domestics will be able to migrate to the Dominion under the new rates, and that the assisted passage scheme will eventually tend to reduce the regular ocean fares to other classes of British immigrants.

NEW BATTERY CO.

The Willard Battery Service, 102 Duke street, formerly owned by J. C. Sherwood, has been taken over by a new company called the Battery and Electric Service, Limited. The new management have enlarged the premises and there is more facility for handling battery and electric service departments. New equipment has been installed for repairing generators and starters. A. E. McEneaney, formerly with the Willard Battery Co. of New York, is in charge of the battery department. C. W. Perry, a capable auto electrician, formerly with the Victory Garage and Supply Company, is associated with them.

TRURO GIRL KILLED

TRURO, N. S., Nov. 19.—Miss Bertha H. Holmes, 35, was instantly killed on Prince street this afternoon when an automobile driven by Mrs. Henry Norris, of River John, mounted the curb and ploughed through pedestrians on the sidewalk and finally crashed into a parked car which stopped its flight. An inquest will be held tomorrow.

THREE PAPERS AT UNIVERSITY CLUB MEETING

Science Group of Women's Organization in Charge At "Beatty" Session

The University Women's Club of Saint John heard with great interest three very instructive addresses given at its regular meeting yesterday afternoon in the Admiral Beatty Hotel when the program was in charge of the science group. The first paper was given by Miss Florence Estabrook, president of the club, whose subject was "The Quantum Theory." She stated that this theory showed a tremendous advance in the knowledge of the composition of matter. She defined the quantum as a unit of vibratory motion. This theory, she said, explained the line spectrum. Without the quantum there would be no vibratory motion and light and heat would cease to exist. Miss Estabrook reminded her hearers that until 1897 the atom had been considered indivisible but the discovery of radio activity had proved this theory untenable and by 1908 Sir Ernest Rutherford had worked out the conception of an atom as a miniature solar system.

ENERGY NOT LOST

The quantum theory states that energy is not lost continuously but in bundles. Einstein just before his death had said that space was a vast electrical magnetic field, Miss Estabrook stated, in closing. Miss Susan Ganong, of Netherwood, was the next speaker and her subject was "The Mendelian Law in Relation to Education." According to this law, she said, it was shown that heredity determines character, although environment has a strong influence. She related how the Austrian monk, Mendel, had grown peas in his monastery garden to find out what he could about heredity. Miss Ganong explained Mendel's discovery by means of diagrams and stated that Mendel's law would have more to do with man's destiny than any other force.

LAW OF MUTATION

Speaking of the law of mutation, Miss Ganong said that if the chromosomes were stable for very long periods then for some reason that was not known, variation took place. Miss Ganong went on to say that it was a

good thing heredity was so stable. If the chromosomes in human beings contained good factors there was the possibility of creating a race of supermen by segregating all the undesirable. Realizing how much heredity meant gave much more sympathy and understanding and in teaching allowance for heredity should be made. Miss Ganong recommended two books of study on this subject, "Fruit of the Family Tree," by Edward Wiggton, and "Mechanism of Mendelian Heredity," by Thomas Hunt Morgan. The last paper of the afternoon was given by Miss Mildred Black, who gave an outline of radio, which she described as the practical scientific accomplishment of the 20th century. She outlined the experiments which had led up to the present state of accomplishment in radio science and said that to the scientist radio meant only one thing, oscillation or matter in motion, which to the scientist was the basis of all life and its processes. Miss Black recalled that the first broadcasting of spoken words had been made in 1920.

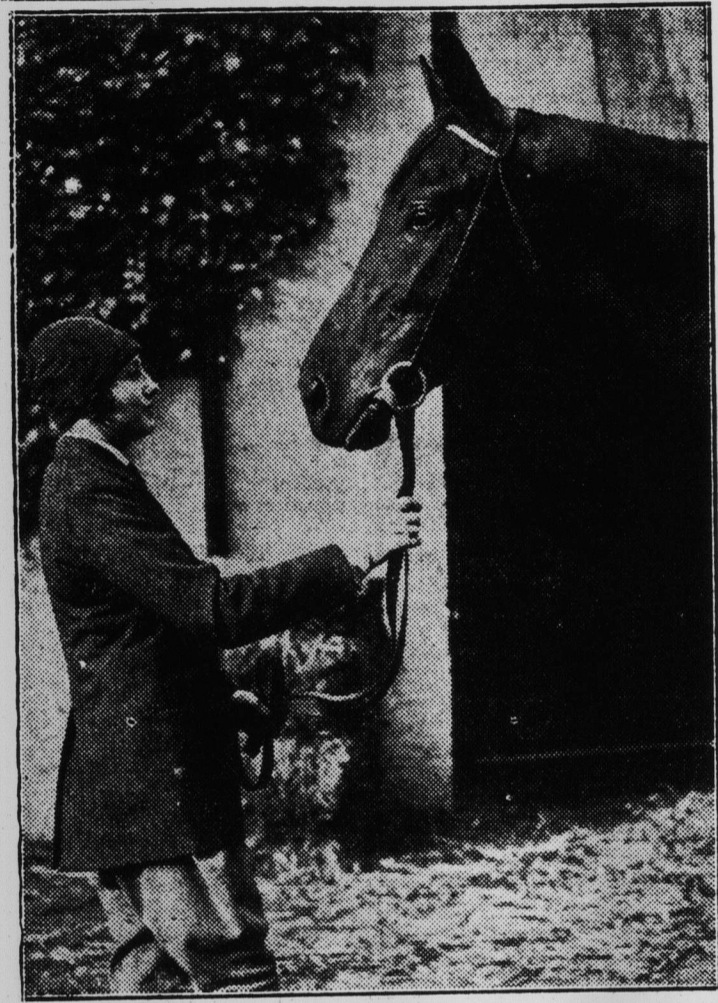
