ALL-CANADIAN CONFERENCE IS SUGGESTED

Duncan Commission Told N. S. Needs Greater Control of Trade

LOGAN APPEALS FOR MARITIME UNION

Thinks That New Deal With-in Confederation Is Necessary

HALIFAX, July 29.—"Rejoicing in the fact that we are Britons, united, unswerving in loyalty to the Crown and Empire, seeking to establish a community of interest and the right to live, each in our own way along natural lines, and seeking also to promote the happiness and contentment of all Canadians, it should not, in my opinion, be too much to hope that eventually the accredited representatives of this province and the representatives of the rest of Canada may, in round-table conferences, seriously consider the question of granting such constitutional terms or economic arrangements to Nova Scotia that will enable the people of this province to live and prosper as well as promote the economic advantage and welfare of the rest of Canada."

So declared Hon. F. B. McCurdy, former minister of public works in the Dominion government, in the course of a statement read today before the Royal Commission, headed by Sir Andrew Rae Duncan, investigating the situation of the Maritime Provinces within the Canadian Confederation. The remedies suggested by Mr. McCurdy for the economic ill of Nova Scotia included a "lower revenue tariff with greater control over her trade and fisheries."

MARITIME UNION URGED. Hence J. Logan, ex-M. P. for Cumberland County, declared that what was needed in the Maritime Provinces was Maritime Union and "a new deal within Confederation."

KEPT IN POVERTY. "As a result of all this Nova Scotia is kept in comparative poverty. Industries idle, villages depopulated, exodus of young people."

HELL FISH RATE. 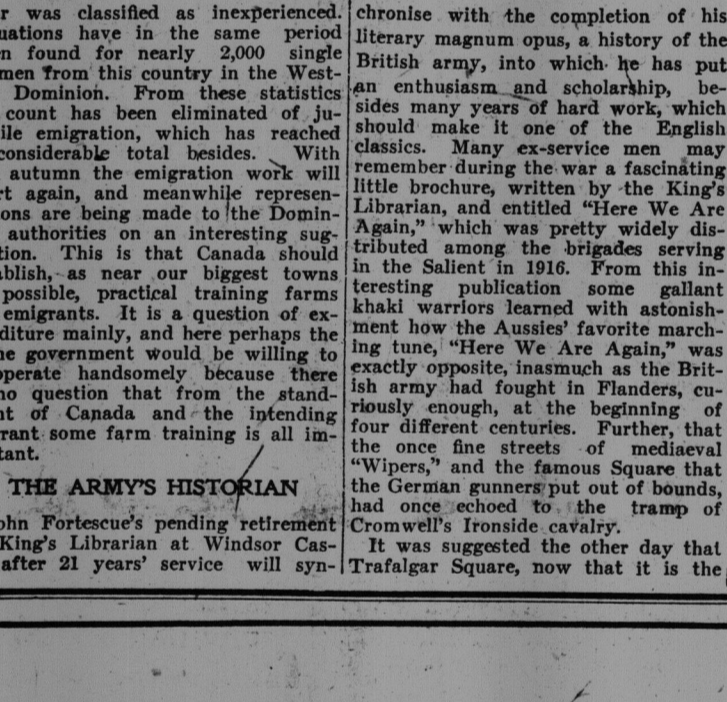

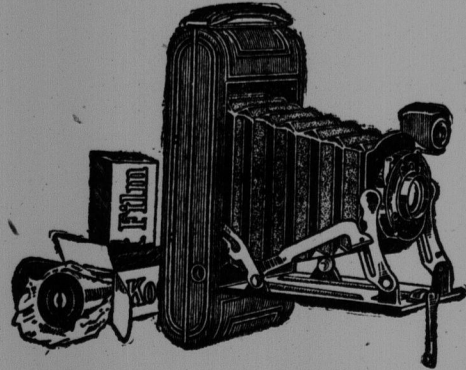

NASSAU BUSINESS CRIPPLED BY HURRICANE; 150 ARE MISSING

75 BOATS SINK;
 PROPERTY LOSS
 \$8,000,000

Residents Suspend Business
 to Aid in Search for Sponge
 Fishermen

WIND HITS VELOCITY
 OF 130 MILES AN HOUR

Canadian Fisher Arrives
 Safely in Port After
 Storm Drops

NASSAU, Bahamas, July 30 — More than 150 persons were believed drowned, damage estimated conservatively at \$8,000,000 was caused and more than 75 boats were sunk or destroyed between Monday night and Tuesday morning in the most destructive hurricane recorded in the Nassau and the Bahama Islands.

Nassau bore the brunt of the damage in the storm which swept out of the eastern end of the Caribbean Sea, wreaking havoc through the entire British group.

With many families homeless, all public utilities paralyzed, Nassau abandoned efforts for alleviating her own pitiful condition to dispatch all available craft in search of the picturesque sponge fleet, numbering between 150 and 200 small sloops and schooners, with which the majority of the 150 persons are missing.

The line of boats filed out of Nassau Friday, heading for the famous beds, lying aside the submerged banks of the western rim of Andros Island, the largest isle of the Bahamas.

WIND MOUNTS

Brisk winds early Sunday, gave first evidence of the approaching hurricane, after meager reports of its advance had been radioed from the tropical radio station near Miami.

Throughout the day the wind mounted in velocity with a corresponding fall in the barometer. Shortly before midnight Sunday, the gale whipped the island of New Providence, shattering numberless windows and uprooting bushes and small trees. Throughout the night the wind increased in fury, disrupting public utility service, and plunging the city into darkness. At six o'clock Monday morning the hurricane reached its peak with a velocity of 130 miles an hour, according to the government record.

The harbor was churned to a boiling rage and waves dashed high over the wharves to Bay street, almost a block inside the city. The gale drove out of the northeast and meted out its portion of disaster. It was at this point that ships were sent high on the wharves and others were sunk while several were known to have been blown out to sea.

50 BOATS GROUND

Captain George C. Roberts, Nassau harbor master, said that 50 vessels had been hoisted on the rocks with untold damage.

Numberless insignificant rowboats and the like, shared similar fate. The sunken vessels include the sloop Hilda, the schooner Colonia, a large government dredge, in addition to the yacht Socoles, and several other unidentified boats.

The power vessels Raven and Francis E. both dragged anchors to the sea and were believed to have gone down. Four members of the Raven jumped overboard and were rescued.

MISSING VESSELS

No check has been available on the crews of the sunken and missing boats. The government mail boats Brontes, with 20 persons aboard, and the Albertine Adoule, with 40 persons aboard, were among the missing craft. Both departed shortly before the storm burst upon the city, the Brontes proceeding for San Salvador and the latter for the island of Inagua. Shortly after the storm jumped to the Florida coast, the Munson steamer Munamar, from New York, and the Canadian Fisher, from Kingston, Jamaica, arrived safely.

The first news of the hurricane beyond the island was brought in late Wednesday by Miami newspapermen who had been lost for six hours on a deserted spot south of Andros Island, when their airplane made a forced landing.

The newspapermen subsequently flew through the outer islands over the two Bimini Islands and Morgan's Bluff, as well as the intervening smaller keys and Great Inca, where the British lighthouse stood in danger of crumbling.

Every island suffered, as did Nassau, only on a somewhat smaller scale. During the late afternoon boats from the Florida coast began to negotiate the still choppy waters.

Government officials stated it would be several weeks before an accurate check of the lives lost and the property damage could be made.

LEMEUX TO PROBE CUSTOMS IN CITY

Will Come to Saint John After Halifax Sitings of Inquiry

QUEBEC, July 29—Sir Francois Lemeux, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Quebec, who has been appointed to continue the customs investigation, has returned here and was at his office in the court house today. To the Canadian Press he stated that he expected to begin at Halifax on Aug. 30, and would later proceed to Saint John, and probably Charlottetown. The Chief Justice will be accompanied by R. C. Calder, K. C., of Montreal, and W. F. O'Connor, K. C., of Ottawa.

Mr. O'Connor was cost of living commissioner following the war.

The investigation in the Maritimes, Sir Francois stated, would probably not last beyond a fortnight. It was the intention of the Chief Justice to sit eight hours daily.

ONTARIO ELECTION IN FALL PREDICTED

Toronto Paper Sees Signs in Prices Co-operation With Ottawa

TORONTO, July 29—An Ontario provincial election in the early part of November is forecast by the Toronto Star today, which says:

The active co-operation of Hon. W. H. Price, provincial treasurer in the Conservative organization, in work for the Dominion election is not a mere indication of the affection of federal and Ontario Conservative parties. It is rather an emphasis on the decision of Premier Ferguson and his colleagues to hold an election this fall. November has been tentatively fixed and the date will probably be not later than the 6th. Contrary statement as to a coming federal contest may be disregarded. Inner Conservative circles have been made aware of the decision both here and in a number of tactical points throughout the province. Today's program consisted of an auto drive and outing to Dixon's Point, near Buctouche, where races and other sports were indulged in. Luncheon was served at the picnic grounds and a clam-bake was enjoyed before their return to the city. During the convention here Charles Robinson, recorder of Luxor Temple, was presented with a handsome gold ring bearing the Shriners' emblem. The presentation was made by T. T. Goodwin.

With the departure of the late trains tonight most of the visiting nobles and their ladies who had not journeyed to the city by auto had left for their homes. The convention was regarded as a highly successful one and the visitors all expressed their appreciation of the fine hospitality extended them.

ONE GIRL BEATEN IS KILLED IN CRASH

Other Near Death; Victim's Condition is Serious at Atlantic City

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J., July 29.—Attacked and beaten by two chance acquaintances, Miss Eleanor Stevens, 22, in a serious condition in City Hospital, and one of two with her last night, is dead, and the other is dying.

The dead man is Thomas E. McCrozy, New York City. The dying

man is Harold Light, Yonkers, N. Y. They were brought in from an automobile crash on the White Horse Pike at Cologne, about 7 miles from where Miss Stevens was left this morning, in a semi-conscious condition in a clump of bushes on Mill Road, Absecon.

Miss Stevens crawled to a nearby house to which the state police and Dr. L. A. Wilson, of Absecon, were summoned. The girl was found to have been kicked in the head, choked, and otherwise beaten by her assailants. The doctor had her removed to the City Hospital.

In her delirium she called for Miss Margaret Tuttle, 23, of Hartford, who is employed in a beach front hotel. Detectives brought the girl to Miss Stevens' bedside and learned that the two girls had been out together on the Million Dollar Pier, where they met two men. Miss Tuttle left them at midnight, Miss Stevens accepting the men's invitation to ride to her hotel in the men's automobile.

When the questioning was going on,

two men were brought in on stretchers. "There's the fellow," cried Miss Tuttle, as her gaze fell on one of them. A dramatic scene ensued. The men were taken to a ward upstairs, and as the ones in whose company she had left Miss Stevens. Police said the men were speeding toward New York, when they crashed with a truck.

One of the men, identified as McCrozy, died a few minutes after reaching the hospital. The other, identified as Light, and who was said by the police to have been at the wheel of the automobile, is not expected to live. Police said it looked like a case of swift and relentless retribution.

300 JAPS DEAD OR MISSING IN FLOOD

8,000 Dwellings Submerged and Thousands of Acres of Rice Destroyed

TOKYO, July 30—Prefectural authorities of Niigata province, on the opposite side of the island from Tokyo, estimate the dead and missing in a recent flood there at more than 300. Seven hundred and fifty houses were washed away and 8,000 more submerged. Several thousand acres of rice fields were destroyed.
