Molasses Co. President Blames Freight Rates for Drop in Business

HALIFAX, N. S., July 30-H. R. Silver, president of the Dominion Molasses Company, Limited, and a former president of the Halifax Board of Trade, this morning told the Royal Commission, investigating the ills of the Maritime Provinces, how his business had been adversely affected by increased freight rates and contended under cross examination by the chairman that in order to properly implement the confederation pact the basic industries of Nova Scotia should be assisted to the extent that their products could be laid down in the markets of Central Canada in fair competition with the products

It is anticipated the commission will adjourn today to meet at Saint John nday morning. From Saint John the commission will proceed to Char-lottetown, returning to Halifax at a later date.

This morning F. C. Cornell, freight rate expert, completed his presentation of the case for the Halifax Board of Trade, with the contention that an effort should be made to furnish the port of Halifax with an even flow of tonnage, inwards and outwards, twelve

He was followed by Mr. Silver, who testified that the plant of the Dominion Molasses Company was operating on part time, employing from seven to ten men, whereas under normal conditions it would be employing from 35 to 40 men, largely on account of the increased freight rates. Under examination by the chairman he explained that it cost fifty per cent. more to land molasses in Halifax today, than in 1914. This he ascribed to conditions in the main over which the Halifax merchant had no control. Similarly it cost 56 per cent. more to land molasses in Sherbrooke, Que., than in 1914, the added six per cent. being due to increased freight rates.

He admitted that it was probably costing the railways a great deal more to move freight at present than in 1914, but still held that the rates should be restored to a commodity rate basis

E. A. Schofield Suggests Plan For Monthly Payment of City Taxes

E. A. SCHOFIELD, former Mayor and continuously in the forefront of constructive citizenship, is an out-and-out supporter of a new method for collecting civic taxes. His scheme—which, by the way, he urged upon the financial department of the city when he was in the Mayor's chair—is a monthly installment plan, same as is employed by the New Brunswick Power Co., the New Brunswick Telephone Co., large mercantile houses, landlords and others, in issuing their bills. The city has a list of chout 17,000 tax payers but this is not a much greater of about 17,000 tax payers, but this is not a much greater number, perhaps, than some of the concerns just mentioned, and even if it is, that is no argument against the scheme.

IN MR. SCHOFIELD'S discussion of this vexed tax question, he said:

"If a change is to be made, why not get right down to present day business methods, and have monthly bills and collections. The days of one bill a year on credit account, half yearly or quarter yearly, are all gone by, and practically every one who has credit nowadays makes a settlement once a month. This enables most people to keep up with their debts, as every one has some income at least every month. This debt the citizen owes the city is no different from any other account—he owes it from January 1 every month throughout the year. If most of us got an account once a year from any grocer, butcher or dry goods merchant, for each month's purchases, it would tie a good many of us up, whereas, with an account each month, one could figure on liquidating the same.

THAT DISCOUNT SCHEME

"The question of putting a discount on in order to give some one 5 per cent. off is, in my opinion, only fooling ourselves in the question of taxes. All that should be allowed is the bank value of the money. To put this plan into effect, let us assume the council is to live within its appropriation for this year. The council then makes up its budget from November 1 to 30 for 1927. They pass this to the assessors on December 1, and on January 1 the assessor strikes the rate, and by January 30 he sends out the tax bills.

It one wishes to pay the total for the year at once, he may be allowed to do so, and the discount be fixed at whatever rate the money is worth to the city through the bank, the same thing to apply to the man who pays his preceding month before the 10th of the following, and so on throughout each month. At the end of the second month, if the first month is not paid, the bill is turned over to the tax collector, just as it is now at the end of the year, and with the carrying charges added, there should be a good chance of his collecting this.

WOULD GIVE STEADY INCOME

"This should give the city a steady income month by month, and without any overdraft with interest at  $5\frac{1}{2}$  or 6 per cent. It might require an extra clerk or two to write receipts daily, but it might require an extra clerk or two to write receipts daily, but it would be worth that. As it is now, the most of the tax money is rushed in at a certain date—this year July 22—and the bank account is in credit at 4 per cent. till about the end of the year, though of course the credit gradually is getting smaller, and as a rule, soon after the new year, an overdraft is started and gradually rises to from \$500,000 to \$800.00 with interest at 5½ per cent. Why not save this?

LONDON, July 15—Though his face rather gives the secret away, neither Lord Birkenhead's vigorously erect agure nor his enviably dark hair betrays the fact that His Lordship celebrated this week his 55th birthday. A healthy open-air habit and a zest for athletic exercise that continues even in middle-age explain the ex-Lord Chancellor's still youthful vigor, despite a life that has certainly been one both of strenuous work and strenuous amusement. Those who imagine that Lord Birkenhead's gifts are purely superficial know little of his brilliant Oxford career, and still less of his great legal prowess. It may have been the lucky delivery of a sensationally able malden speech in the 1906 House of Commons that put the golden ball of fame and fortune at his feet, and paved the way for one of the quickest and most glittering careers in our history, but behind the more spectacular gifts of Lord Birkenhead, including a genius for sardonic humor, there are real scholarship and immense ability, as well as a dauntless valor of spirit. 


