His Re-Election as President of Irish Republic is Moved

Nothing Now to Prevent Treaty Being Carried Out Says Griffith-Joint Committee to keep peace proposed—DeValera for Continuation of Republican Government-Talk of Early Election,

Dublin, Jan. 9—As soon as the Dail Eireann was convened to-day Eamonn DeValera arose and placed his resignation as president of the Irish republic before the house.

Mrs. Thomas J. Clarke moved the re-election of Mr. DeValera as president of the republic. Liam Mellowes seconded the motion. Michael Collins, one of the leaders in support of the Irish treaty, Member said that no one in the Dail wished to be put in the position of opposing President DeValera.

He pointed out that the Dail was now faced with the problem of taking over the government from the British, and he suggested the formation of a committee whose members be chosen from both sides of the controversy, to keep the peace. Work, and not talk, was now



FORCE OF GROWING PLANTS.

FOR BATH OF ELEPHANT. Soap, Oil and Three Weeks' of Work Are Required.

Washing an elephant is not a Saturday night affair. The operation occuples three men at least three weeks and An ordinary-sized animal will need 120 pounds of soap for his bath, besides no end of sandpaper and oil, says Tit-

For the second time within a relatively short interval the Supreme Court of the United States has ruled upon the legal aspects of strike-picketing and ain the judgment upholds the rights of organized society as against the pretensions of organized labor. The case reached the supreme court upon appeal from an Arizona judgment, and turned upon the constitutional right of the state legislature to enact a statute prohibiting the issuance of injunctions affecting the use of pickets in labor disputes. By a majority finding, the supreme court has declared this statute to be ultra vires because of its conflict with the provision of the federal constitution which guarantees to all citizens equal protection under the law and prohibits the taking of property without equal protection under the law and po-equal protection under the law and po-hibits the taking of property without hibits the taking of property without process of law. A laboratory in child psychology for experimental work with children from to four years of age has been opened by the Child Welfare Research Station at the State University of Iowa. The object from the educational point of view is to provide an opportunity for little children to become adjusted to a formal group environment while still enjoying the characteristic individual activities of early childhood.

From a scientific standpoint the laboratory provides material for observing the reactions of children of an age that has never before been intensively studied because of the difficulty of providing controlled experimental conditions in the home environment. Twenty-four children are in daily attendance in two sections from nine to twelve o'clock.

four children are in daily attendance in two sections from nine to twelve o'clock. The laboratory is under the direction of Dr. Bird T. Baldwin, research professor in psychology, who tells in School Life how children are occupied with a very simple and flexible schedule of singing games, stories and rhythmic exercises and simple occupational projects. A graduate assistant keeps a detailed log book of observations made on the children and notes interesting reactions and the conditions under which new abilities develop.

A variety of mental tests have already been made on each child, and several studies of different phases of the development.

studies of different phases of the development of motor co-ordination are in progress. Physical measurements of each thild are made once a month and invesigations are made as to heredity, home conditions and special characteristics of the families of children as a background for the psychological findings.
