(Leicester Mail.) The Australian wool trade is at the parting of the ways. In June the con-tract under which the Imperial govern-ment bought the whole wool clip of Australia at a fixed flat rate will expire and much discussion is now going on as to the procedure that is to be followed to bring the trade back to pre-war con-ditions. It would be impossible to jump back at a sudden bound to a free mark-eting of our wool here and in London. To begin with, when the contract runs out, there will still be in Australia 1,-000,000 bales of wool which has been both bought and paid for by the Imper-



At present prices this is a huge thing, for the whole world is crying out for Australian merino wool, and the result during the last few months wool has fetched enormous prices prices far in excess of the flat rate at which it was bought by the Imperial government, But while values are now unprecedentedly high, there would be small likelihood of their continuance if the London market was swamped by 2,000,000 bales of "con-tract" wool within a few months, to be followed immediately by our 1920-22 clip, which will be ready for sale at the end of the year.
