**Daily Hints For the Cook**

**HICKORY NUT CAKE.**  
Cream 1/2 cup butter, add gradually 1 1/2 cups sugar, then, alternately, 3/4 cup of milk and two cups sifted flour, sifted again with two teaspoons baking powder. Add cup of hickory nuts chopped fine and the stiffly-beaten whites of four eggs. Bake in loaf about an hour or in a sheet 40 minutes. Ice with chocolate, icing, decorated with whole nut meats.

**PUMPKIN PIE.**  
MINCE MEAT.  
One bowl of boiled beef, 3 bowls of chopped apple, juice of 2 lemons, 1 orange, 1 pint of cider, 1/2 pound seedless raisins (when making pie scatter in seeded raisins as you like), salt. If too much liquor in meat, boil it down to about 1 pint. Add light brown sugar and molasses, cinnamon and other spices as you like.

One cup of stewed pumpkin, add 1 egg with just a pinch of cinnamon and ginger; salt (scant 1/2 teaspoon), 1 tablespoon of molasses, 1/2 cup sugar, mix well, then add 2 full cups of good rich milk, stir and pour into a greased tin. Add salt to the mixture. Bake in a good crust about 1 hour.

**REORGANIZATION OF THE EVERY DAY CLUB FOR EFFECTIVE WORK**

The Every Day Club was reorganized last evening for effective work. Some changes in the constitution, as recommended by Messrs. Scott, Cotter, MacTavish, Humbert and Brindle were adopted.

Besides an executive of nine members there will be five committees, each of five members to conduct the affairs of the club. Walter Brindle, who has had years of experience as a mission worker in Darwin, England, has been engaged to give three evenings each week and Sunday afternoon and evening to the work of building up the club's work. He will arrange Sunday afternoon meetings for men, the first to be held next Sunday.

Charles Robinson, on behalf of the Men's Brotherhood of St. David's Church, said they were in hearty sympathy with the work of the club, and he felt that all the brotherhood would take the same attitude.

The club will be conducted on broad lines and will be open to all men every evening in the week. Men who are partial strangers in the city are invited to attend meetings of its privilege. The executive has not yet been completed, as it is desired to get a group of men who will be of service to the club. **CRUSADE AGAINST USELESS CHRISTMAS GIVING IS SPREADING**

Chicago, Nov. 25.—A crusade against useless Christmas extravagance is on in Chicago, led by Miss Jane Addams, Dr. Lena K. Sailer, Miss Mary McDowell and Dr. Annie Sage.

Committees will visit the schools, universities, halls of clubs and lodges to urge them against useless giving. The leaders aim to deplore the "commercialism of Christmas" and they plead for the reestablishment of the old time Yuletide spirit, with the exchange of notes and cards of felicitation and good cheer.

The resolution they passed at the meeting where the crusade was launched expressed the plan of its backers. It says:—Whereas, the physical health of many is impaired by long hours of worry and night labor in the preparation of Christmas presents.

Therefore, be it resolved that we in doing and calling in the same Christmas crusade designed to foster and promote a sane and reasonable Christmas; to encourage and inspire in writing and in action, the giving of useful and needy gifts to children and worthy poor; to discourage a further increase in the practice of burdensome and meaningless gifts.

**PLEBISCITE ON LICENSE IN SYDNEY**

**Present Act a Farce, Is Opinion of Mayor Gunn**

**A LIVELY MEETING**

**Looks Like Putting it to the People to Decide—Fifteen Licenses at \$1,000 Each is Suggestion of His Worship**

(Sydney Post.)

The liquor situation as it stands in Sydney today was given a thorough overhauling by the city fathers at council last evening, and from the way they grappled with the situation, evidenced plainly that a change was due shortly.

A resolution passed by a recent meeting of Christ Church branch of the Church of (England) Men's Society, and which was read before council last evening, was the tit bit which set the ball rolling.

**Put Question to People**

"It is time," said His Worship, when the reading of the resolution was concluded, "that the citizens of Sydney were given a chance to vote for license or no license. There is no doubt that conditions in this city are bad, but they are the same as have always prevailed, and will prevail under the present prohibition act. Not only is public sentiment against it, but the act itself is a farce, and may be broken at every turn. It is full of loopholes for the liquor seller."

"So it is about time that the voice of the people were heard through a plebiscite as to whether license or no license is wanted. Then, if we find license is wanted, we can draw up a drastic license act, to be called let us suppose, the Sydney Temperance Control Act, and let us send that to the legislature at Halifax to be made law."

"My idea of a good license law for Sydney would be for fifteen licenses to be granted, \$1,000 to be the annual fee, all liquor to be sold by the glass, and the licensed stores to have large plate glass front windows; any man who sold without a license to be sentenced to a term of twelve months imprisonment without the option of a fine; the owner of any premises rented for the alleged sale of liquor to be similarly dealt with. If a man appeared in the public court charged with drunkenness, he would be blacklisted, and no liquor would be allowed to be sold to him thereafter."

"That is, I think in brief, a workable law and one which would serve to clean out the 'blind pigs' from the city (for the licensed dealers would help in this) and good liquor would be sold, instead of bad, as at present."

The council in general took up the discussion. Ald. Martin and McLeod speaking on the side of prohibition.

Ald. McDonald thought that a committee should be appointed from the council to draft a good license law, or (as some people seem to be afraid of this) the word license, then let us call it control or privileges. Then, that could be submitted to the people, and they might vote either for prohibition or license. If they voted for



**FATHER POWELL SPEAKS ON MISSIONS**

"Foreign Missions" was the subject of an interesting and able address by Rev. Father Powell, S.S. J., of Boston in the Mission church St. John Baptist, Paradise row, last evening. The speaker gave a general outline of the missionary work as conducted in various heathen countries, telling of the grave difficulties met and overcome. In particular he mentioned the excellent headway being made in Terra del Fuego by Rev. Thomas Bridges, who has risked his life many times to tell the story of Christianity to the natives.

The lecturer outlined the situation in the Sandwich Islands where, for many years, the missionaries had to fight hard to gain a hearing as the natives were deeply superstitious and, being afraid of their own gods, refused to listen. Rev. Father Powell outlined Bishop Stringer of the Yukon who was doing excellent work among the Indians and Eskimoes. It is understood that Bishop Stringer will visit this city in the near future.

At the close of the meeting a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the speaker. He will deliver another address this evening.

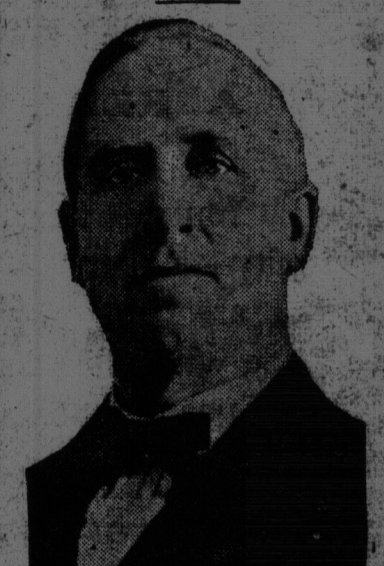

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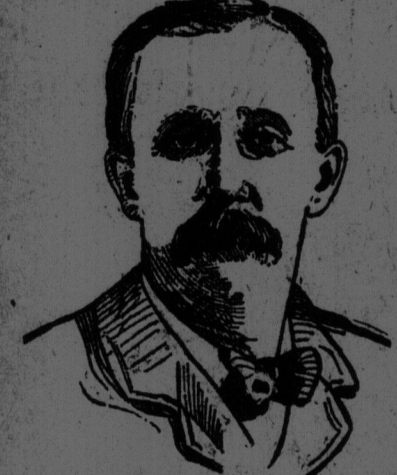

BORDEN AND HIS FOLLOWERS ARE EARLY ON GRILL

Call on Speaker to Save Them As They Withe

MANITOBA OUTRAGES

Uneasy as Misdeeds in Election Are Recounted—Strong Fighting Speech of Sir Wilfrid Putnam in Passion—Searching Questions

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—The first working day of the session ended in a row. Hon. Frank Oliver charged the government, and particularly the Hon. Robert Rogers, with having denied the right of free speech in Manitoba during the recent MacDonald election and with having caused the arrest of respectable citizens for doing legitimate canvassing in the campaign. The story was more than the government could stand and its completion was suppressed by a denial of the right of free speech in Ottawa. Mr. Oliver had told the story of the arrest of Liberal canvassers in Manitoba and their detention in jail without trial or bail until the election was over when they were dismissed because the justice authorities came into court and stated that they had no evidence to offer.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier

Sir Wilfrid Laurier had assigned the government in the afternoon in the first place, he had said that the government's speech from the throne contained only what could not possibly be left out. He said that not much could be expected in the way of trade from the trade agreement with the West Indies, because there was not much trade carried on by the southern islands. He charged the government with having failed to introduce the highways aid bill this session and with having killed it last session because the senate had made an amendment to the bill, which greatly improved it. He had been expected that there would be something said about the naval policy today. The Liberal leader stated that the policy in, because in his opinion the Liberal knows the minds of the ministers, though they do not know their own mind. Still the formation of that policy had developed cross-currents in the government which had caused the ministers to waver and had subverted one of them.

Hot Shot for the Nationalists. "Those who say that we owe nothing to England are less numerous than before the twenty-first of September. I see men on the other side of the house, and even on the treasury benches, who in the province of Quebec before September 21, said that we owe nothing to England. Since that date there has been a mighty change in their views, therefore there is nothing to apprehend."
