#### FALKENHAYN DECLINES TO GIVE HIMSELF UP

BERLIN. - General von Falkenhayn, former German chief of staff. in announcing to the newspapers that he assumes responsibility for the decisions and commands of former Emperor William from Sep-tember, 1914, to August 1916, declares he has no intention whatever to voluntarily placing himself at the disposal of the allies. The

general's statement says that if he surrendered himself to the allies he would recognize a procedure, which, he considers, "mocks all sense of justice."
