It has lately been noticed that liquors kept in colorless bottles exposed to the light soon acquire a disagreeable taste, while those contained in brown or green bottles remain unchanged even if placed in direct sunlight. Dr. Morselli finds that during the change from cold to heat inspring suicides are more numerous than at other seasons. Very curiously, suicides are more frequent everywhere during the first third of any month than in the second, and during the second third than in the last. Protestants are far more inclined to self-destruction than Cathol. ic ; men, than women; unmarried, than married; the young, than the old. 
