### THE WORKING OF THE I. C. C. PENSION SYSTEM

One Hundred and Seventy Four Employes Now Receive Monthly Sums-Large

Amount Being Paid Out.

MONCTON, N. B., July 21.—That one hundred and seventy-four employes of the Intercolonial and Prince Edward Island railways are now enjoying pensions rafiging in amount from \$20 to \$68.42 is shown in a statement prepared by Acting Deputy Minister of Railways L. K. Jones for Senator Peter McSweeney of this city, in answer to inquiries concerning the pension fund recently made by Senator McSweeney in the senate. Twelve of the pensioners are from the Prince Edward Island and one hundred and sixty-two from the Intercolonial. Monthly there is paid to these pensioners the big amount of \$4,493 in allowances. Since the first of January there have been forty-five applications for pensions.



COUNSEL EXONERATED Rojestvensky Dies From Heart Disease

SIXTY YEARS OLD

Heart Affection Caused by Wounds Received in Battle

BAD NAUHEIM, Germany, July 20 .-Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky, who commanded the ill-fated Russian geet

Sinovi Petrovitch Rojestvensky was about sixty years of age and for many years bore the reputation of being one of the most cool-headed and scientific naval officers in the Russian service. He distinguished himself in the Russo-Turkish war in 1877 by an attack on a Turkish ironclad in a gunboat, the

ordered early in August, 1904, to have his squadron in readiness to proceed from the Baltic around to Vladivostok. This proved to be one of the most removable.

markable voyages ever made, and resulted in the annihilation of the Russian Baltic fleet. The start was made from Libau on October 16 of that year and, passing around Denmark, the Rus-sians encountered the British North Sea fishing fleet off Dogger Bank. The warships fired on the fishermen, mis-taking them for torpedo boats, which led to a strained state of affairs between Great Britain and Russia that at one time threatened to result in hostilities between the two countries. An international commission of inquiry, however, which met at Paris, after a complete investigation excused the admiral for his action, while condemning

It may add to the interest which events in Persia are creating if it be remembered that the Persian belongs to the same great division of the human race as the peoples of Europe. He is an Aryan, and, despite all the changes of the ages, he retains much the same national character as he had in the days when his country was ruled by Darius and Xerxes, and was one of the great world powers.

The modern history of Persia may be said to have begun in the seventh century, when, together with all the neighboring countries it was overrun by the Arabs. Until then Zoroastrianism had been the national religion, but in Persia, as elsewhere, the Arab brought with him the religion of his prophet. Fire-worship was destroyed, a few of its more determined devotees fleeing to India to found the sect of the Parsees (or Persians) and Persia became a Mahometan country.

The founder of the present reigning dynasty, Aga Mohamed Khan, came to the throne in 1794. He was succeeded by his nephew, who fought two wars with Russia, and lost his Circassian provinces, and who was the great-grandfather of Nasr-ed-Din, who reigned in Persia from 1848 to 1896. Nasr-ed-Din was followed by his son, Muzaffar-ed-Din, who died last year, the present Shah, Mohamed All Mirza, being his eldest son, Nasr-ed-Din was a man of great energy and force of character, but in all respects he was an Oriental.

INFULENCE OF RUSSIA.

He inherited almost overwhelming debts and the fact that Russia was the chief creditor of his country led to difficult international complications and to predominant Muscovite influence within his borders. The power of the Persian Shahs had been unlimited. "No law exists in Persia," Professor Vambery said two years ago, and Lord Curzon in his "Fersia and the Persian Question"

The Constitution was originally signed both by the Shah and the Crown Prince on December 30, 1906, ten days before Muzaffar's death, but although Mohammed Ali was induced to add his signature to his father's it has been recorded by Professor Vambery that from the beginning he was bitterly cpposed to the whole thing.

During his father's life he was at the head of a reactionary association that declared that the copying of European methods of government was obnoxious to the faith of every true believer. Since his accession his opposition to the Parliament has been stimulated by the efforts of the half-million parasites who draw Government pensions and salarles.

It has been often said that Russia has always had ambition to include at least the northern part of Persia within her dominions, and that she has therefore secretly conspired against the foundation of a stable popular government. There is little foundation for this allegation, particularly since the signing of the Anglo-Russan agreement.

LONDON, July 20.—The House of Lords tonight passed the second reading of the old age pension bills, thus insuring its becoming a law.

In the course of the debate on this bill, Lord Rosebery and Lord Cromer, both visiously attacked the measure on the ground of its Socialistic tendicy, both predicting that it would eventually involve the country in a policy of protection.

Lord Rosebery described the measure as the most important bill submitted to parliament in forty years, and instanced the pension system in the United States as an example of what such a measure might lead the country to.

Lord Cromer startled the house by declaring that it was the first duty of the government to prepare for the European conflict which probably would be forced upon Great Britain before many years. 


