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To the Christian Brethren composing the Eastern New Brunswick Baptist Association.

DEAR BRETHREN,—In glancing at different subjects for your consideration in this our annual epistle, at a time life the present when, to the joy of many, light and knowledge are generally disseminated, we discover no subject within our scope, of more importance for the advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom, and therefore claiming more strongly our efforts as a body engaged for the glory of God and the good of mankind than the advancement of Education, the want of which (considering it with all its namerous train) is one of the most serious obstacles to the advancement of trath.

It is consoling to observe that the prejudice which has heretofore prevailed with many against the efforts of Christians in the discharge of this most important duty is somewhat substding; and a sense of the importance of a well-informed Ministry furnished with all necessary knowledge from the word of God, without too much dependence on the statement of others is prevading the

mind of the greater part of the community.

The plea that many have made against a learned Ministry, that the Apostles with few exceptions were illiterate, is also subsiding, and the fact is more generally considered, that the word of truth was written by divine inspiration, and the Apostles endowed with the miraculous gift of tongues, were not necessitated to learn in the ordinary way a foreign tongue either to understand or to teach the important truths left on record for our instruction. It is consoling also to view the efforts that are now made for the dissemination of useful knowledge by Colportage through length and breadth of this and the sister Province, and also the efforts made for the instruction of the youth by means of the Sabbath School, all of which are of the very greatest importance and claiming the first place in the exertions of the Church of God.

Although we urge strongly the importance of Education, and consider all we can say as coming far short of its claims, we would not intimate that it includes all that is necessary to attend to, but sa that which may be preparatory to every good work by giving a

knowledge of God's requirements at our hand.

As God has instituted his Church for the express purpose of disseminating the light and truth of his everlasting word to the earth's remotest bound, its chief duty not being to seek tts own glory but the spiritual benefit of mankind, bearing in mind what Christ has done for us, and likewise the precious promises he has left on record to bear us up amidst all opposition, and which he has assured us are all yea and amen in Christ Jesus. We would consider it an imfertant duty devolving upon us as the professed

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followers of Christ to deny ourselves of many of those things which we may esteem pleasant and profitable, for the sake of earding the word of God in its parity to the destitute and perishing heathen; not only those bearing that name in foreign climes, but those also who are in reality such surrounding us in our own coantry. Our negligence in this, as well as in many other known important datice is no doubt the cause of so much feanness in many of our Churches and the occasion of God's displeasure, as manifested in his judgments which are abroad in the earth. It is much to be deplored that the hand of Almighty God is so little viewed in the dispensations of his providence; even the professed people of God are too many of them ascribing them simply to natural causes, not viewing God to rule in the armies of heaven and among men; and therefore they are not laid to heart, and the evils for which we are 'titus' visited are not sought out, and repented of, and forgiveness and grace sought to enable us to engage in God's service acceptably.

As God has made it one of the chief duties of his servants, to whom he has revealed his will, to expose those things by which the enemy of souls and his emisaires are deceiving the world of mankind, it is not to be concealed that ignorance has ever been the parent of supersition; and therefore to expel that gloomy fiend, it believes all who wish well to their fellow men to engage not only by the influence and substance that have been placed at their disposal, but by approaching a throne of grace seeking from the unbounded source of wisdom and knowledge those qualifications which are necessary to endow suitably the followers of Christ: We therefore would strive to enforce upon the minds of all who sincerely wish to engage in the services of their great Redeemer the necessity of untiling heart and hand in disseminating useful knowledge through the length and breadth of the earth by every means and indexery way that God may be pleased in discover to ur as being the most effectual method of promoting the glory, of God and the good of mankind.

But notwithstanding the indifference to education which appare ently exists, and the severe commercial depression which the hest year has withessed, the Committee regard with satisfaction the circumstance that the number of Students during the year has nearly equalled that of previous years ; they congratulate the friends of the Society upon this indication of general confidence in the community, and healthy prosperity in the Institution. The Committee cannot in connexion with this subject, refrain from reverting to the loss and disadvantages which accrue from the payment of so large a sum as £35 every year for interest, this sum if allowed to accumulate. would discharge the whole debt in 16 years. The Committee do not imagine that, in the present state of the country, any effort to pay the debt at once would be successful, but it might be possible for some one or more friends to lend the amount upon security of the ground and building either free from interest or at much lower rate than 6 per cent, without the slightest inconvenience to themselves ; were this done the whole could be repaid in annual instalments within a given period out of the funds which are now being swallowed up for intere! They leave this for the consideration of those to whom the Lord has entrusted property with its responsibilities.

A DECLARATION AS A STATE OF STREET Of the Faith. Practice, and Covenant of the Churches of Christ, composing the Eastern New Brunswick Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 1. We believe that there is but one only living and true God, who is a Spirit, infinite, eteres, and unchangeable in his being, wisdom, power, holiness, justice, goodness and truth: Dent. vi. A : John iv 24 ; Psal. xc. 2 ; Jer. x. 10 ; Isa. vi. 3 ; Exod. xxxiv. G, 7.

2. That there are three Persons in the Godhead-the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, who are but one God, the same in

substance, equal in power and glory: 1 John v. 7; Acts v. 8, 4.

3. That the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, in which he has given us our only rule of Faith and Practice: Acts xx 82; 2 Tim. ii. 15—17.

4. That God, who is infinite in knowledge, and perfectly views all things from the beginning to the end, hath forcordained that whatsoever comes to pass, either by his order or permission, shall work for the eternal glory of his great name; Acts xv. 18; Rom. iz. 17—23; Acts ii. 23; Paulma laxvi. 10.

5. That in the beginning God created the heavens and the earth, the sea and all that in them are; and He upholds and governs all things by the word of his power: Exed. xx. II; Heb. I. &; Dan.

11. That the Holy Ghost, and he only, can and does make particular application of the benefits of the atonement made by Christ

That the Spirit of God applies the benefits of this atonement, by convincing us of our sinful, lost and miserable condition ! and then discovering the glorious Saviour, as he is exhibited in the gospel, in his suitableness and sufficiency, and enabling us to embrace him with our whole souls, by which he is made unto us wisdom, righteousness, sanctification and redemption : John xvi. 8 ; 1 Cor. 30.

13. That the life of religion consists in the knowledge of God. and conformity with him in the inward man, which necessarily produces an external conformity to his commands, and brings us to live in obedience to His holy will in all our ways, and in our several places and relations: John xvii. 3; Mat. xxiii. 26; Eph.

ii. 10.

14. That true believers being united to Jesus Christ, shall never perish, but live and reign with him for ever. They have communion with God, and by his Spirit they are united with each other, and have communion one with another, whereby they are made partakers of each other's gift's and graces : John iii. 15, 16, and x. 28; Rom. viii. 17; Rev. iii. 21; 1 John i. 8; Rom. i. 11;

15. That the first day of the week, commonly called the Lord's is the Christian Sabbath : Mat xxviii. 1-6; John xx. 19; day, is the Christian Sabba Rev. i. 10; Heb. iv. 8-10.

16. That God has appointed the ordinance of civil government for defending the poor as well as the rich, in their civil rights, without infringing upon the consciences of any, or attempting to dictate or govern in the worship of the eternal God. which belongs only to Jesus Christ the great law-giver and head of his church Rom. xiii. 1-4; I Pet, ii. 13-15; Luke xxii. 25, 26; Isa. xxxiii. 20-22; Eph. i. 22.

PART THE SECOND.

Concerning a visible Church of Christ and its Discipline.

1. We believe that a particular visible Church of Christ is a number of Saints and people, by mutual acquaintance and communion voluntarily and understandingly covenanting and embodying together, for upholding and promoting the wership and service of God, to show forth his declarative glory, and for their own edification : 1 Pet in 5 ; 1 Cor. i. 2 ; Acts ii 42, 47 d1 ; attack and T .61

2. That Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Ordinances of Christ, to be continued until his second coming, and that the former in requisite to the latter, that is to any, that those are to be southers, and has risen and accorded to the right hand of God,

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People ing to their t and th may n by for a free ber del for any duty; admitted into the communion of the Church, and to partake of all its Ordinances and privileges, who upon profession of their Faith have been baptized by Immersion, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the IIc'y Ghost: Mat. xxviii, 19, 20; 1 Cor. 2i 23—26; Acts ii. 41, 42, and ix. 18—26, and viii. 12, 36, 39; Mat. iii. 6-16; Rom. vi. 4; Col. ii. 12; John iii. 23; John i. 9, 10; Acts viii. 36-39.

 That since none but true believers can rightly partake of the Ordinances, therefore the door of the Church should be carefully. kept against all such who cannot give scriptural evidence of their union with Christ: 1 Cor. xi. 27, 29; Mat. vii. 6, 15—20; Ezek., xliv. 7, 9; Isai. xxvi. 2; l Pet. ii. 5.

4. That a Church thus gathered, hath power to choose, and by Elders to Ordain those officers that Christ has appointed in his Church, viz. Bishops or Elders, and Deacons; and also to depose such officers who walk contrary to the rules of the gospel; and to discipline their members, though in some such cases it may be convenient, and profitable to request the advice of neighbouring Churches of Christ: Acts i. 21-26, and vi. 3-6; Num. i. 10;

Mat. xviii. 15- 18 ; Acts xv.

5. That a Bishop or Elder has no more power to decide any case or controversy in the Church than any private brother; yet they, having superior gifts for teaching and ruling, ought to exercise and improve the same for the benefit of the Church; and the Church ought to be subjected to the gifts bestowed on the Minister from the Lord, while he is rightly administering in his place, whose place it is to lead in the actings of the Church, and to administer the Ordinances of the Gospel, and devote himself to the work of teaching, warning, rebaking and exhorting the people publicly, and from house to house; Mat. xx. 25—29; 1 Pet. v. 3; Mat. xxviii. 19, 20; Acts xx. 20—28, 31.

6. That the Deacon's office or work is to take care of the poor, and to have the oversight of the temporal affairs of the Church,

and to minister at the Lord's Table: Acts vi. 1-5; ITim. iii. 8-14. That every believer is commanded to be faithful, to improve every gift and fulent which is bestowed on him, in order to which, there ought to be such a Gospel freedom that the Church may know where every pirticular gift is, that it may be improved in its proper place, and to its right end, viz.: the glory of God and the good of his people; and the Church ought to be subject to such improvements: 1 Peter iv. 10, 11, and v. 5; 1 Tim. iv. 14; I Cor. 12th and 14th chapters.

8. That there is a mutual obligation between the Minister and People—one to administer in things religious and spiritual, according to the gifts God has given. The Church to communicate of their temporal or worldly substance for his comfort and support, and that by an equality, as nearly as can be ascertained, that one may not be burthened and another eased; but this is not to be effected by force or compulsion, or by the sword of civil power; but it is to be a free will offering agreeably to the scripture truth; and every mem-ber deficient in this matter ought to be disciplined by gospel rule, as for any other breach of covenant, or neglect of performing Christian duty: 2 Cor. viii. 12-13: Lukex. 7: Rom xv. 27: 1 Cor. ix.

We do now, in the presence of the great, all-seeing and most glorious God, and before angels and men, give up ourselves to the Lord Jehovah, Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, and avouch him this day to be our God, our Father, our Saviour, and our Leader, and receive him as our Portion for ever. ways of religion and virtue.

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We also give up ourselves to one another in covenant, promising to conduct towards each other as brethren in Christ, watching over one another in the love of God-reproving, rebaking, and admonishing one another for good as occasion may require; and if we at any time know that any members of the Church are guilty of im-moral conduct, that we will not expose it by tattling it to others, but will faithfully labour with them, according to the direction of our Lord-Math. xviii. 15-17-that sin may be put away from us, and that iniquity may not be harboured in the church.

We engage to watch not only against the most gross evils, but also against all foolish talking and jesting, which are not convenient -vain disputing about words and things which gender strift-disregarding promises, and not fulfilling engagements-tuttling and backbiting, spending time idly at taverns, or elsewhere, and vain, unnecessary worldly conversation on the Sabbath, and whatsoever else is contrary to sound doctrine, according to the glorious gospel of Christ. We promise to hold communion together in the worship of God, and in the ordinances and discipline of his church, according as we are or shall be guided by the Spirit of God in his word-expecting that He will yet further and more gloriously open his word and the mysteries of his kingdom-applying to the blood of the everlasting covenant for the pardon of our many errors, and praying that the Lord would prepare and strengthen us for every good work to do his will, working in us that which is well pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom he giory for ever and ever.
