Washington, Mar. 4.—Publication of the official text of the German government's reply to the American proposals for an abandonment of submarine war fare, and the shipment of foodstuffs to the civilian population of a belligarent, was the only steps taken by the United States government today in connection with the maritime situation as it affects neutrals.

The State Department declined to give out the text of the American proposals, because they still are under consideration by Great Britain and her allies. Bombardment of Dardanelles Forts Continued.

London, Mar. 5—The British Admiralty issued the following statement late last night:

"The attack upon the fortresses in the Dardanelles continued yesterday (Wednesday). The Admiral has not yet reported on the results obtained within the Straits.

"Outside, the Dublin demolished an observation station on the Gallipoli peninsula, and the Sapphire bombarded guns and troops at various points in the Gulf of Adramyti.

"Six modern field guns at Fort B, have been destroyed, bringing the total number of guns demolished up to forty.

"French battleships bombarded the Bulair forts and wrecked the Kavak bridge."

SEVERE FIGHTING IN PROGRESS IN VOSGES: GERMAN SHELLS FALL IN SWISS TERRITOR

GERMANS ATTEMPT TO CUT COMMUNICATIONS BETWEEN BELFORT AND ST. AMARIN

Basel, Switzerland via Paris, March 4.—Fighting of great severity is in progress in the Vosges. Reports received here show that violent encounters are taking place between Pfetterhausen and Saint Die, and in the Munster Valley near Sutzern.

A French attack on Hartmann-Wellerkopf was precipitated by an attempt of the Germans to cut the French communications between Belfort and Saint Amarin, 18 miles northward.

Shells from German field guns have again fallen in Swiss territory.

Amsterdam, via London, Mar. 4—An interview with Enver Pasha, as given in a copy of the Frankfurter Zeitung, which has reached Amsterdam, is as follows:

"The action which began Feb. 19, so, far has achieved nothing more than heavy damage to some forts at the extreme entrance to the Dardamelies. On the second day the bombardment overturned six guns, killing four men and wounding fourteen, but on the first day only an observation officer was killed, and one man wounded.



London, March 4—There are 450,000 men of Iriah birth or descent in Great Britain who are of military age, and 125,000 of them have already joined the army, according to figures prepared by the Secretary of the Iriah National League. This proportion, he asserts, is much larger than can be shown by any other nationality.

Petrograd, March 4—The following official communication from general headquarter was issued today:

"Our offensive along the front, between the Niemen and the Vistula, is progressing on the roads from Olita (north of Grodno). The enemy is maintaining his ground in the lake passages near Simno and Seree.

"In the region of Grodno, our troops have made fresh progress. Near Ossowetz a stubborn artilery duel is proceeding.

"To the east of Jedwabne, our troops have reached the line of the enemy's trenches, and in the neighborhood of the villages of Mocarze and Siestrzanki (on the west bank of the Bobr river) the fighting has been hand to hand.

"In the development of our success near Kerza, where a German brigade was dislodged, we increased the number of our prisoners to 21 officers and 600 men,

"Between the rivers Orzyc and Vistula there have been engagements of a particularly desperate character between Milawa and Hoozele.

"In the Carpathians, between Ondawa and San rivers, the Austrians continue, day and night, fruitless attacks against our positions, notwithstanding their immense losse. Our troops drive them back with hand grenades and by counter-attacks with the bayonet, in the course of which we have succeeded in capturing many prisoners and machine guns."

"In Eastern Galicia, Austrian rear guards are endeavoring to maintain themselves on the river Lukwa, and further along as far as Jezupol. In the course of the day we captured, in the Carpathians and Eastern Galicia, 47 officers, 3,000 men and sixteen machine guns."

FRANCE

Infantry have occupied a new trench in advance of our line.

"In Champagne we have continued to make progress. We have strengthened and widened our positions, notably to the northwest of Perthes and to the northwest of Mesnil, capturing about one hundred prisoners.

"On the ridge to the northwest of the latter village the Germans have made fresh counter-attacks, which have been repulsed. Prisoners confirm the seriousness of the losses austained by the two regiments of the guards in the fighting yesterday.

"In the Argonne, in the Four De Paris district, a German attack was repulsed as was also one at Vauquois.

"Near Verdun, at Fort Vauz, a German aeroplane was brought down within our lines, and two aviators were taken prisoners."






