THE TROUBLES OF THE SPANISH REPUBLIC -WEAKNESS OF THE MINISTRY-DISOR DER IN THE CORTES-ARMED REVOLU-TIONISTS IN THE STREETS—A NEW MINE

London, June 12.

A special to the London Times from Madrid reports that the crisis in the government of Spain continues, and fears of a serious outbreak in the capital are entertained. The Cortes remained in secret session most of the day yesterday. During their deliberations a party of armed volunteers surrounded the Cortes. A large party of armed police was concentrated at the column of Dos De Mayo, and detachments of troops were posted at their places in the city in anticipation of an outbreak, but their services were not called into requisition. The irreconcilable press openly advocate an armed re volution. The situation is very disquiet ing. LONDON, June 12.

Another Madrid despatch sent from that city last night says the Irreconcilables are opposed to the formation of the Ministry from the Right. Bodies of armed Irreconcilables and armed partisans of the majority of the Cortes respectfully occupy strategic positions in sans of the majority of the Cortes respectfully occupy strategic positions in the city, and a conflict between the opposing factions is feared.
