4. Are the proceedings of a municipal council legal if any of the members holding office are not legally elected?

5. Will the qualification for alderman require to be taken from last revised assessment roll or not?

An alderman does not take an oath, but makes declaration of qualification and of office. The former sets forth that he is a British subject and sets forth the required property qualification. The latter is for faithful performance of his duties and that he has not received any payment or reward ity, etc., or undue execution of his office, and is not directly or indirectly interested in any contract with corporations.

The property qualification is that the alderman or his wife be the owner of freehold to the value of \$1,000, or lease hold to \$2,000, and rated for the same on the last above all charges on it, but if the freehold be rated at \$2,000 or over, and be in actual occupation of the alderman, charges on it do not affect his qualifications. An alder-man in No. 6 ward can quanty on the assessment roll of the city proper if he has property in the city, or on the assessment roll of the township, provided his property be within the limits of ward No. 6.

The proceedings of the Council are legal and valid notwithstanding any members may not be legally elected or qualified. Until they are unseated they are members of the Council for all purposes. The property qualifications of aldermen in No. 6 ward must be taken from the last revised assessment rolls of the city and the township of Westminster, but limited as to the latter to the territory now comprised in the new ward, as before stated.

AWAITING DEATH.

Preparations for Kemmler's Execution Completed.

AUBURN, N. Y., April 28.—The career of Wm. Kemmler is gradually approaching its termination, and nothing but a respite from the Governor can save him from the terrible experiment of which he is to be the first human subject. He has no callers and no flowers; there are no sentimental visitors to lionize him and make him the hero of the hour; there are no admiring friends. Not once has he shown any signs of weakening, and in fact he rather courts death than shuns it.

THE DEATH CHAMBER
is about 17 feet wide by 25 feet long and is dimly lighted by two small iron-grated windows about four feet above the floor and from which a view of the main entrance of the prison can be obtained. Between the windows on the east wall is a long board about ten feet in length and three and a half or four feet high. On this board are arranged mechanical appliances for testing, measuring and governing the death-dealing current. At the left is a common electric push button, which communicates with the dynamo room, and is used for signaling. Next on the right is a Cardrews volt meter, a long narrow black walnut box, containing coiled wire and surrounded by a gauge which restores the electoral force in volts. Another box, long and narrow, is on the

which restores the electoral force in volts. Another box, long and narrow, is on the right and contains a reducing coil to diminish the force of electricity before it enters the volt meter or the lamp box on the light. Between the reducer and volt meter is a small switch to turn the current off and on the meter. The lamp box contains 24 sixteen-candle power incandescent lamps and shows when the current is on and running steadily. Then come two switches—one for short circuiting the current and the other ent, and the other

THE FATAL SWITCH,
which carries the current to the wires connected with the body of the condemned.
Two wires at the top connect with a dynamo 1,000 feet away in the north wing of the prison. One of the wires at the bottom will be connected with the metal cap to be worn on the head, and the other will be adjusted to the base of Kemmler's spine. At present these two wires remain dangling from the ceiling. They will be attached to a board three feet square attached to the ceiling, which is already in position, and which is directly over the spot where the chair is to be placed.

CAMPAIGN FUNDS Mr. Creighton, M.P.P., who refused his 4 cents change when buying a school book, in order that he might manufacture a vance against the Ontario Government, has discovered another mare's nest. His paper, the Toronto Empire, prints a circular, alleged to have been issued by Mr. Preston, secretary of the Provincial Reform Association, asking a man who had subscribed to the funds of the association to pay his subscription. Think of it! The crime of asking a man to contribute what he had voluntarily nised! Perhaps the Empire man would have liked Mr. Preston to follow the example set by Sir John Macdonald, who called his monopolist friends together in a Toronto hotel backroom and suggested to them that the hogs ought to be grateful to the man in the tree who shook down the apples. That is how the big Tory bribery fund was obtained. That is how it will no doubt be obtained again. It is different with the Liberal party. It asks no man to subscribe election funds, on the mise that he will be reimbursed out of the public purse. But it does not disguise the fact that it needs money for the management of its cam-paign. We never heard of a party that was conducted without money, and we probably never shall. So long as the money is used for lawful objects, such as the publication of necessary literature, no one can complain. We believe the Liberal leaders are ready at any time to have their books balanced by an independent accountant, provided their opponents are willing to undergo the same treatment.

Mr. Creighton is indeed very foolish if he thinks that by raising this cry he can draw public attention away from the weakness of the case which he advocates.

THE GOVERNMENT OF ONTARIO AND THE FARMERS.

For the year 1868 the Government of On-tario paid the sum of \$64,424 for agriculobjects, made up of \$10,000 to the Agricultural and Arts Association, \$350 to the Fruit Growers Association and \$54,074 to the electoral district societies. For the year 1889 the amount paid for similar objects was \$138,787. In the 21 years omposing this period, during 18 of which the Liberal party has been in office, the agricultural industry of the country has undergone many changes. It has ex perienced its due share of successes and reverses, but in spite of many trials it has man aged on the whole to make a fair measure of progress. How much greater its pros perity might have been had wise cou and liberal policies always prevailed, we can only conjecture. Had the Government at Ottawa been as mindful of the needs of the farmers as the Government at Toronto has been, it is almost certain that the Province of Ontario to-day would be occupied by the most contented and prosperous people on this continent. But un fortunately the efforts of the Local Govern ment to improve the position of the farmers have been seriously antagonized by the course pursued at Ottawa during the last twelve years, and the various plans matured to promote agricultural prosperity have been thwarted in a large degree by the policy of trade restriction and high taxation framed in the interests of a very much smaller class of our people. If, instead of taking an extra \$5,000,000 to \$10,-000,000 a year out of the farmers of Ontario in the shape of taxes and increased cost of products, the Federal Administration had seconded the Local Govern men in its schemes to promote agricultural prosperity, it requires no argument to show that the position of all classes of people would be infinitely more satisfactory than it now is. Let us look for a moment at what the

Local Government has done for the farmers. Besides granting aid to the Provincial and electoral district agricultural societies and the Fruit Growers' Association, it nows aids the Western and Eastern dairymen's associations, the Creameries Association, the Entomological Society, the Bee-keepers' Association, the Sheep-breeders' Association, the Poultry Association, the Agricultural College, the farmers' in stitutes, and various other objects started for the sole purpose of encouraging the

great industry of the country.

Twenty-one years ago the value of our exports of cheese was less than \$500,000, and now it is more than twelve times that The associations so generously aided by the Local Government have done an invaluable work in educating cheese-makers in the best processes, until now Ontario enjoys the reputation of producing the best cheese that enters the British markets. 

The New York associated bank statement is favorable, showing an increase of \$2,008,775 in reserves. This is due to a large curtailment of loans and an increase of \$1,738,400 in legal tenders. The surplus is now \$3,333,250, as against \$1,324,475 a week ago, \$13,424,000 at the corresponding date of last year and \$16,026,625 in 1888.
