Had this course been pursued in the past the taxes this year would have been 18 mills or less instead of 22.



the country of young cattle commonly "stockers" or "store cattle," but called "stockers" or "store cattle," but probably more have gone from Ontario this past season than ever before. On returning from a recent tour of Canada, Prof. Robertson, dairy commissioner, had this to say on the above subject: "I dare say that a very large percentage of the fat cattle being shipped from the Northwest go out in about as good condition as they can be put into there. The larger proportion of store eattle, however, that go abroad—that is, cattle with the frame only, and not sufficient beef to make them fit for butchering—go from Ontario and Quebec, from the farms of those who ought to know better than to continue that deplorable practice. The bulk of our trade in cattle with the United States has been made up of that class, not counting in thoroughbreds. The most intelligent and prosperous farmers of Ontario, who have made profits from cattle feeding, have made them by finishing their cattle for the butcher before they were offered for sale. Many of them have even gone into the back townships of Outario and Quebec and purchased store cattle, which they have fattened with profit upon their high-priced lands and upon grain dearer than the same quality in the sections from which they brought the cattle. The shipping of lean cattle does not merely remove from the farm its fertility for a small return in cash, but it immiles the selling of the coarser probably more have gone from Ontario this past season than ever before. Beef is a very concentrated product, and a smaller per cent of its value, as paid for by the consumer, is absorbed by the transportation charges than when bulky and cheap products like grasses, grain or hay, are sent abroad. The shrewd farmers of Scotland and England have not been slow to profit by the mistake of our stockmen in sending their store cattle across the Atlantic. The fact that upon the exceedingly high-priced lands of the British Isles, with their more costly grains, the feeders can make a profit above the value of their grains through finishing our cattle, ought to enlighten our farmers to the conclusion that the larger profits should be gained and retained by them.

Best Milk for Cheese-Making:

Mr. D. M. McPherson, the well-known Eastern cheese man, after an experience of 21 years in the business, which should be a pretty fair guarantee that he knew what he was talking about, made the following observations at a New York State farmer's institute a few days ago: "Cheese-making consists simply in changing a fluid into a solid. This on the surface may seem to be a little thing, but it is in reality a very intricate thing to do. But one thing is added—rennet, not counting salt; and one thing taken out—whey. Fermentation is the chief chemical factor. To control this agent, is the most difficult thing to do and have its work just right. The first requisite is a uniform condition of the milk. Without uniform milk we cannot have uniform cheese. Temperature, moisture and time are most important. "When I first began my work I conducted a number of experiments—first to check the growth of the fungus on corn; next to see if I could produce it (in order to help my studies), and lastly to see if it was directly poisonous when fed. Soaking the corn in numerous solutions, some of which were so strong as to kill the corn, seemed to have no effect whatever. Planting a double handful of smut with each hill of corn did not increase the smut at all. We fed the smut to one cow until she refused to eat it; to another cow we fed it until she at a peck a day of carefully cleaned smut. This cow was not carrying a calf and was dry. For a time she fattened, but suddenly died, due, I am certain, to disturbance in the brain caused by smut. I may say by way of parenthesis that the cow got it back on me, for in making a postmortem examination I was blood-poisoned and csme near being put under the ground almost as soon as the cow. The subject is one of vast importance, but from my own investigations I believe is so difficult that it would require a corps of trained investigators years to work it out."

On general principles there is no doubt about the soundness of Prof. Pauton's advice to sow clean seed. Too much care cannot be exercised in the selection of seed grain.
