



This applies roughly also to the United Kingdom, (3,721,600) for the increase in Scotland was almost neutralized by the decrease in Ireland. But besides adding 3,721,600 to the kingdom's population, 898,000 went as emigrants to colonies and foreign lands. Thus the natural increase during the decade was 12 per cent and the actual increase 11 per cent.

It is this rate of increase concerning which complaint is made. Yet if that rate of increase is maintained and that emigration increases proportionately to population, the population of the United Kingdom will have doubled in slightly less than 70 years, and the census of 1971 will show a population of 83,000,000 in the British Islands.

Can the United Kingdom support that vast number? Obviously it cannot unless some change that it is not possible to foresee comes over the conditions of life. And the farther the calculation is carried on, the worse becomes the congestion. 



We miss in 'socker' football, that delightful smashing and bashing of flesh against flesh which so fascinates and thrills us in our own game; we miss those charming heaps of wriggling, squirming and also breathless and motionless bodies which are piled up before us every two or three minutes in the American Rugby. We miss the blithe attendants running out every little while to drag from beneath the hoofs of the teams some inanimate and blood-bolted three hundred pounder who happened to catch for himself the medicine he was trying to administer to someone else. 'Socker' football is nothing but football; there is not so much as a whiff of the abattoir or railroad accident about it. Could anything, then, be more preposterous than the effort to introduce it to the American public and to the favorable consideration of our institutions of learning?" SHOT THE CZAR

Says a Letter From One in the Imperial Palace.

THEY QUARRELED OVER CYRIL

Witte in Despair, but Still Attempting to Stop the Tide of Anarchy.

New York, Dec. 7. - In a special dispatch from St. Petersburg, the World's correspondent declares that the Czar has been wounded by Grand Duke Vladimir, and is kept secluded in his palace. The dispatch reads: Here we are, cut off from all Europe, isolated, alone, save when an infrequent dispatch brings news from the outer world. Our letters lie by the million in the railway station; we cannot obtain them. But news that thrills the city comes from nearby, from the Czar's palace at Tsarskoe-Selo. A report that the Czar was shot and

wounded by his uncle, Grand Duke Vladimir Alexandrovitch, during a personal quarrel, has not been officially denied, and is accepted as true. The quarrel was deliberately pro-

voked by Grand Duke Vladimir, with the design of inciting a palace revolution and open revolt of the Imperial Guard. Th pretext for the quarrel was the

Czar's humiliation of Vladimir's eldest son, Grand Duke Cyril, who scorned the Czar's order and married his divorced cousin, formerly the Grand Duchess of Hesse.

The pretext for the quarrel was the Cyril's disgrace had infuriated his father. The purpose of the quarrel failed, but no one has yet learned how or

The editor of the Novosi sent three representatives to Tsarskoe-Selo. They ound the palace silent, impenetrable. devoid of any sign of life beyond the soldiers, who guarded all approaches

The truth is that the capital has heard nothing of the Czar or of the imperial family for four days. But this is not strange, as the Czar's purpose at the moment is to remain as silent and secluded as possible. This seclusion probably gave rise to the widespread report that the Czar and his family departed from Tsarskoe-Selo on Tuesday. But Count Witte, when questioned today, said:

"I saw the Czar yesterday. There is no one in this wretched country so collected in the face of danger. Poverty and hunger stalk in the streets here. 


