

Forty Thousand Killed in Recent Battles in Balkans

More Lost Than in Whole of Previous War—Bulgarians Claim To Have Gained Several Important Victories—Over Two Hundred Thousand Troops Engaged.

[Canadian Press.] Athens, July 7.—The Greek casualties since the beginning of the fighting against the Bulgarians total 19,000 killed and wounded according to official reports. After the battle for the possession of Kilkish the right wing of the Greek army forced the Bulgarians to retire across the River Struma.

[Canadian Press.] Vienna, Austria, July 7.—Eleven thousand officers and men of the Serbian Timok division were killed during the battle with the Bulgarians, in which it was defeated, according to the Sofia correspondent of the Reichspost. The division consisted of 15,000 men, who were surrounded by a Bulgarian army, which outflanked them. Only 4,000 of the Serbians survived, and these were taken prisoners.

[Canadian Press.] Saloniki, July 7.—Part of the Greek right wing has driven the Bulgarians across the River Struma and is now marching on the town of Serros, according to official reports from Greek headquarters.

[Canadian Press.] Buffalo, N. Y., July 7.—Five young men are missing and are believed to have been drowned when their canoe upset late last night in a storm off Windmill Point in Lake Erie, five miles west of here.

[Canadian Press.] Toronto, July 7.—The Belgrade correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says that the losses of both Serbians and Bulgarians are heartbreaking. There is reason to believe, however, that the Bulgarians suffered most, because throughout they hurled themselves on the Serbian positions in close formation with bayonet, regardless of the sacrifices such primitive methods entailed.

[Canadian Press.] Toronto, July 7.—The Vienna correspondent of the Daily Mail learns that Austria has arranged a bargain with Bulgaria and Rumania, whereby Bulgaria will get Saloniki in return for territorial concessions to Rumania.

Garbage Collection Is At Last Under Way

New Department Commenced Today the Gathering of Refuse and Incinerator Starts—Numerous Taxpayers Complain of Unjust Assessment for Garbage Department.

Long expected and much heralded, the London civic garbage incinerator began operations today, and the little tin carts made their rounds for the first time, an evidence of London's attainment to metropolitan rank with Hamilton, Toronto, and other big villages.

Superintendent W. C. Dodd stated at noon that so far everything appeared to be working smoothly. The incinerator was kindled at 1 o'clock, and promised to work satisfactorily.

Big Grain Elevator at Point Edward Which Was Destroyed by Fire, Together with 250,000 Bushels of Grain Which Were Stored in It.

250,000 Bushels of Grain Burned at Point Edward Spontaneous Combustion Blamed for Blaze in Elevator Which Caused a Loss Estimated at \$350,000—No Fire Protection of Any Kind.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Sarnia, July 7.—The big grain elevator at Point Edward, together with 250,000 bushels of grain was destroyed by fire, which broke out with startling suddenness shortly after 5 o'clock this morning. The watchman, Capt. Tedd, had passed the spot where the flames were first noticed only a few minutes before and did not discover any trace of fire. The blaze is supposed to have been caused by spontaneous combustion.

Woman Gagged Tied to a Tree Purse Looted

Young English Domestic Victim of Highwayman on Grosvenor Street.

Takes Savings of Many Weeks

Helps Himself to Fifty-Three Dollars, Returns Three and Escapes.

Seized from behind, gagged, blindfolded and tied to a tree, Edith Bridge, a young English domestic living at the corner of Horton and Clarence streets, was robbed of \$50 on Grosvenor street, in front of St. Joseph's Hospital, on Friday night. She never caught a glimpse of the hold-up artist, who walked softly on the grass behind her.

Her first intimation of danger was when her arms were seized from behind. Before she could utter a cry she had been gagged, her eyes blindfolded, and she had been dragged to a tree, where she was tied. Her assailant then leisurely opened her purse, extracted the \$53 it contained, peeled \$3 from the roll, and returned that amount to the purse. The robbery was evidently carefully planned. It was cool and daringly carried out.

Not only did the hold-up man rob the girl of nearly every dollar she possessed, but he prevented her departure for the West yesterday. Miss Bridge was to have gone to Edmonton to join her brother, but fate, in the form of the robber, intervened and temporarily at least, left her stranded in the city, prevented her meeting her sister at Sudbury, and going with her to their brother, in the west, city.

The money that the robber took represented the girl's savings of months, she had been planning her western trip for some time, and had saved the money for that object. Several weeks ago her "pile" had mounted till she was in a position to leave her employment in a north end household, and move to a boarding-house, where she commenced her preparations for the trip.

Friday she left her residence to say good-bye to some of her old friends in the north end of London. She carried her money with her, for she intended to stop at the C. P. R. station on her return and purchase her Edmonton ticket. Leaving a Richmond car at the corner of Grosvenor street, she proceeded east on that street, but had only gone a short distance before she was seized and robbed.

Just what actuated the robber to return the \$3 is unknown. Whether sudden pang of conscience overcame him, or whether \$50 was all he required is but conjecture. The fact only remains that he returned the odd dollars above the half-century mark.

The theft of the roll meant that Miss Bridge was unable to purchase her ticket, was unable to leave yesterday as she intended, and therefore has missed her sister, who was to join her at Sudbury. She is still in London, and will remain here until money has been forwarded to enable her to purchase her ticket and make her belated trip to the West.

Lady Sackville Gets \$5,000,000 Left by Will

Jury Says She Exercised No Undue Influence or Fraud.

Sensational Case Lasting Eight Days Created Furore in London Society.

[Canadian Press.] London, July 7.—The jury which for eight days has been hearing the suit to break the will made by the late John Murray Scott, by which he left nearly \$5,000,000 to Lady Sackville, today sustained the will. They found no undue influence or fraud on the part of Lady Sackville.

Sir Edward Carson declared that Sir John Murray Scott could have changed his will, made twelve years before his death in favor of the Sackvilles, at any time if he had wished to do so. The only hope of the plaintiffs, the members of the Scott family, was, he argued, in magnifying and exaggerating the trivial quarrels of a long friendship into the appearance of something important.

Would Be Hounded.—If the charges were true, continued Sir Edward, the Sackvilles would be hounded out of society. They were charged both with a crime against the freedom of an individual who was leaving his property, and with a species of robbery of the relatives to whom he might have left it.

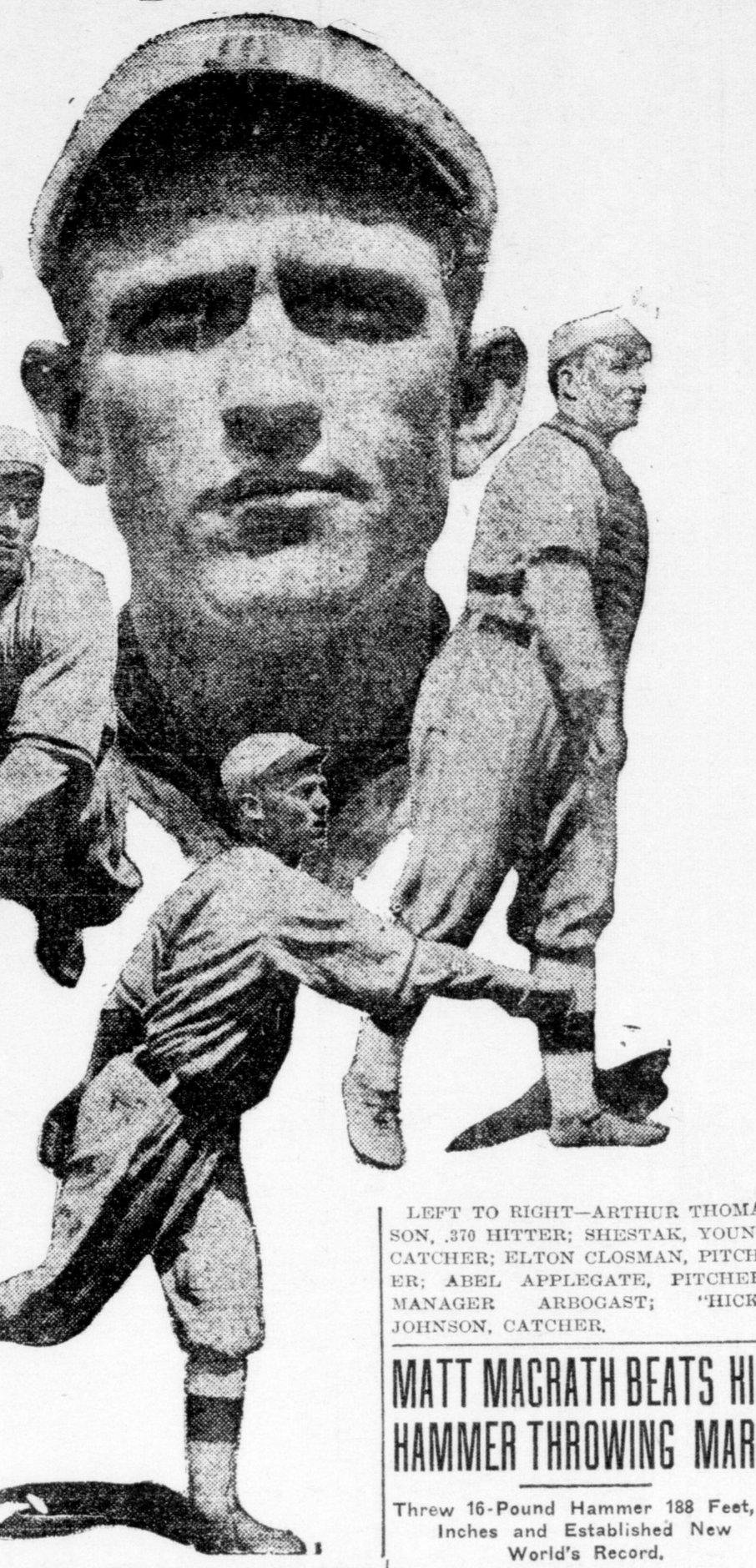

A conservative estimate of the disabled in last week's fighting fixes the number at between 50,000 to 40,000. Thousands of destitute refugees from the scene of the fighting are pouring into Salonika.
